

Museum Traces 'Family Tree' Of Shaggy-Haired Plains Bison



LINCOLN, NEB.-The "family tree" of the Great Plains bison is being given its first geologically scientific appraisal by the University of Nebraska state museum. Research completed in the past eight years reveals that ancestors of the shaggy-haired creatures, which in the 19th century numbered millions and draw hunters from over the world to the plains of Kan But they increased in numbers

First, the great grantduddy of them all who came to this continent from Asia was characterized mainly by huge horns which averaged 80 inches from tip to tip. But the body of this ereature, known scientifically as "superbison," was less than a foot tailer and a foot tonger than the present buffale, Succeeding generations showed only one significant change; size of the horns. They steadily shrank to today's average of 23 Inches from tip to tip. The body remained nearly the same.

Second, the blaon, unlike other prehistoric animals found in North America such as elephants, chines, horses and camels, first appeared on our cumtiment as a large animal and decreased in size.

The University of Nebruska scientists also beliave, on the basis of lation has had its "ups and downs," The first bisen, they may apparently was relatively few in numbers since only a few scattered skeletal remains have been found thus far in Kanaus and Nebraska.

Woman of 75 Finds New Career in Art

CLAHISSA, MINN, - Her duties as a wife and mother kept her occupled for most of her 75 years but now Mrs. Mabel Radobaugh has a new career as an artist.

While visiting a son in Portland, Ore., four years ago, Mrs. Radabough ottended art clames spensored by the city. Her interest centered on the painting of pastel floral prints, which are created by working a chalk-like substance into a mat or convas.

Now Airs Radabaugh has a "workshop" in her home here,

Clothes to Be Made From Protein of Soybean Oil

Because of reperior methods for extracting soybean oil, which were developed in this country, soybean oil meal became available which was extremely rich in protein and in which the protein had not been rained by too much heat or improper processing techniques. This provided a low cost protein that dried, stored and put in a form practical for an industrial raw material, secording to Robert A. Boyer of the Soybean Research council.

Considerable work was undertaken to make this protein suitable for the manufacture of a fiber, the first protein fiber to be made commercially that does not stem from an animal origin. This fiber has been produced for several years on n pilot plant busin. Now a plant is being built to produce the soybean fiber in large volume.

As a result of this work, the lexthe industry has found that fabrics made from a blend of soybean fiber and rayon or cotton are practical and of unique quality. The Federal Trade commission, recognizing the potential and increasing importunce of man coude protein fibers, ims adopted for them the generic turne "asim," following the same pattern of using the word "rayon" for all man-made religious fibers.

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Fruit Preserving

This is the year many women have waited for-the year when they could obtain unlimited quantities of sugar to put up all the fruit in their orchards, and berries in their patches.

For many of us, it has been so long slace we put up fruit in any

quantity that a surplick brush-up of methods is essential. As in all tilg undertakings, the underlying organ-izational work is most important, and this can be done the day before.

The day before you begin actual canning, check on equipment to be sure that it works properly. For fruit and berry canning you will need a water bath, which may be a large kettle or broller, fitted with a rack, and a tightly fitting cover. Or, you also may use a pressure cooker for processing, but this is not as essential for fruits as it is for vegetables.

You will need several large pans and kettles for preparing the fruit and for making the syrup. You also will need to prepare jars, checking them for cracks and imperfections. and washing them in hot soapy suds. Make cartain you have enough covers or lids.

Estimating Amounts

Although truits and berries vary in size and moisture content, it is still possible to make some sort of estimate as to how much syrup and the number of jars you will need

For sweet fruits, you will use a syrup made of 2 cups of sugar to 4 cups of water; for slightly acid fruit, use 2 cups of sugar to 3 cups of water; for acid fruit, 2 cups of sugar to 2 cups of water is simple. If the fruit is very seid, 2 cups of sugar to 1 cup of water is essential.

The ayrup is made simply by adding the sugar to the water and boiling together for 5 minutes.

If you are canning large fruits such as peaches and pears, allow

I plut of syrup to a quart jar of fruit. For small fruit, or berries, you will need only a half pint of syrup to the quart.

The amount of fruit usually de-

pends upon the size, but ordinarily we count 2 pounds of truit for the quart jar. This will sid in estimating your yield.

Method of Packing

Some fruits and berries are hotpacked, but most women prefer using the cold pack method for preparing fruit for canning as it takes less time. If the fruit is carefully acked, there will be little floating.

Wash and clean the truit, peeling and coring, slicing and atoning when necessary. Pack into sterile jara and attach the lid, using manufacturers' directions.

Process by placing the fruits in a boiling water bath, making certain that the water comes to two inches above the jurs. If the water tends to boil away during the processing time, it's a good idea to have a kettle of boiling water near by from which the supply can be readily replenished.

Count the processing time from the time the water starts boiling.

When processlig time is finished, remove jars (with a jar lifter to prevent burning the fingers) and place on thick layers of newspaper to cool.

For many of the new type lide, the manufactures does not approve inverting the jar to test for leaks.

Use This Time Table

If you are using the water bath, which is recommended by most experts, you will want to observe

fully. The following fruits are processed for 20 processed for 20 minutes; apricots, blackber-

ries, blueberries, cherries, currants, gooseberries, peaches, pears, plums, ruspherries, rhubarb and struwber-

Apples and pineapple, processed in the same type of water hath, will require 30 minutes, while quinces require 35 minutes.

If you are using the pressure cooker for processing keep the indicutor between 5 and 10 pumils pressure and process all fruits, except pineapple and quinces, for 10 minutes. The two exceptions will require 15 minutes processing,

Queries Answered

How high should fruit be packed for canning? Pack fruit and syrun to within one inch of the top.

How much salt should by added to water in which peeled fruit in placed to prevent discolaration? Add one tempoon of salt to each quart of water used.

What mokes fruit and tomatoes float? Too much processing, too heavy a syrup or too loose a pack may be the causes.

Why should fruit for canning be uniform in size and riponess? Fruit should be evenly ripe and about the same size so that processing will be

Can I can over-ripe fruit? No. it's too difficult to get a good prod-uct. Use over-ripe fruit and burries for fruit butters, as the fruit will have to be mashed and there is enough sugar to act as a preservative.
