An autopsy report indicated that Steven Allen, 31, of 50 Maplecrest, Newmarket, died from a combination of smoke inhalation, body burns and a self-inflicted stab wound to his abdomen, according to Assistant Attorney General Mark Zuckerman.

Allen's badly burned body was discovered by a hunter Saturday morning in a densely wooded area off of Jenkins Road, Zuckerman said.

Although initially labeling the incident a suspicious death, Zuckerman said it had been deemed a suicide since the manner of death was conwith a suicide note Allen had make to his home, Zuckerman said. Allen was last seen Oct. 28 at his

home, and relatives received the **n**ote Oct. 30, Zuckerman said.

Newmarket police were made aware of the note Oct. 30 and filed a missing person's report to law enforcement agencies, he said.

An autopsy report released by state Chief Medical Examiner Roger Fossum said Allen probably died Oet. 29.

Allen's body was found in a privately owned wooded area less than a half mile from the roadway.
