Police would not say what part of the bus struck her.

No charges have been pressed against the

driver, Harold V. Frampton, 69, of 730 Islington St. in Portsmouth.

Frampton is employed by Berry's Transportation Co. of North Hampton. A spokeswoman for the company would not comment on how long Frampton had been employed with the company.

Howard Hemeon, chief inspector of the state Safety Department, which handles school bus accidents, said this morning that Frampton had an "excellent record."

All school bus drivers receive special driver training and must obtain a special permit to drive a school

bus, Hemeon said.

This is the first fatal school bus accident in the state since the late 1950s, according to Michael Coltin, director of the Pupil Safety Department.

When state and local police are finished with the investigation, it will be turned over to the Department of Safety, Hemeon said. Inspectors are already working on the accident with police, he said, and were scheduled to revisit the accident site.

The two main areas to investigate will be equipment failure and driver error, Hemeon said. The bus has been taken off the road, and will be

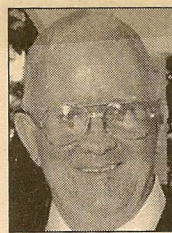
