

Wajda Makes His Mark In Poland

NEWMARKET - Charlie Wajda may be thousands of miles away from his native Poland, but his generosity still makes his presence felt in the country of his birth.

Since returning from a two-week visit to Poland to visit Wajda's brother and sister in 1977, Wajda and his wife Janet have been sending packages of food and clothing to needy Polish families. Wajda, 61, and a janitor at Newmarket High School, recently said of his efforts, 'It's a lot of hard work, but it's worth it.'

That hard work includes the collection and sorting out of numerous articles of clothing, all washed first by Janet before placing them into boxes. Some of the packaged food stuffs mentioned by Wajda include coffee, flour, rice, cake mix, and even popcorn. He added that it would cost him over \$1,000 if he had to buy what is given to him.

Wajda said donations are received from Polish residents in town, relatives in Maine, and from unclaimed items in the high school's lost and found collection left during the summer. Janet also receives material from people in Exeter, where she works.

'It's better than throwing it away,' Wajda said of collecting the material. 'They can use it over there.'

The packages are sent an average of twice a year. Wajda said it takes a long time for the packages to reach their destination, pointing out he has to send Christmas gifts in July for them to be on time.

The method of transportation explains the slow process. The packages are first loaded onto a ship in Boston, then travel to Poland, where they are inspect-

ed again and sent by air to Krosno, where they are picked up by Wajda's brother and sister. The packages are then taken back to Korcynia, where his brother and sister live, and are distributed to previously selected needy families. Wajda said the Polish authorities have fully cooperated with the process, and have never withheld any of the packages.

When the project first began, Wajda first had to take the material to Boston for shipping himself. Now, however, he takes the packages to a Polish national organization in Manchester, which handles the transportation. He also has to pay for the postage of the packages.

Wajda's contributions to his former homeland reflects his strong ties that war and hard times failed to diminish. As a teenager, Wajda was forced to work as a laborer in Nazi Germany in 1941, two years after Poland was invaded by the Germans. Wajda was freed by American troops in 1945, but with the Soviet occupation of Poland, decided not to return home, because 'I knew Poland would never be free.'

He then served in a Polish unit in the U.S. Army stationed in West Germany, until he came to America in 1951 and was reunited with his brother Walter in Newmarket. Although he has had strong feelings towards his homeland, it was his visit to Poland seven years ago that spurred he and his wife to help Poles less fortunate than themselves.

Wajda said he is always willing to accept any donations from area residents. Those wishing to do so can send them to his home, located on Bay Road, Newmarket.

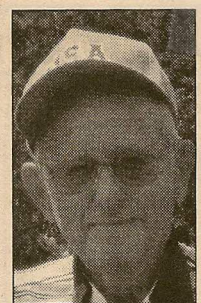

SALEM — Veteran jockey Henry Wajda, 38, of Hollywood, Fla., and Raymond, died early yesterday at Bon Secours Hospital, Methuen, Mass. after injuries received at the start of the second race at Rockingham Park here Saturday.
