REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT.

DISTRICT NO. ONE-VILLAGE.

The schools in this district have been good. The teachers have manifested an earnest desire to advance each and every scholar placed under their care, and their success has been apparent to every careful observer.

The Primary School has again been taught by Miss MARTHA S. TOWLE (with the exception of a few weeks when her place was well supplied by Miss LIZZIE CHAPMAN.) The kindness, patience, skill and perseverance which she has always manifested for the little ones placed under her care, merit for her the warmest gratitude of parents and guardians, as well as the highest commendation in this Report.

The moral instruction and lessons in deportment here fixed as first impressions of school days, must, of necessity, enter into the very composition of future life. This seems to have been realized and met, while successful efforts have been made to instruct in the primary branches of learning.

The number of scholars in this school, 106.

The Intermediate School has been taught by MISS SARAH E. LEAVITT. Under her instruction scholars have made rapid progress in their studies. Kind feelings, excellent order and thorough lessons have manifested the faithfulness and ability of the teacher, and also the deep interest the children have felt in their books. The examination at the close of the third term was highly satisfactory to a large number of visitors. The number of scholars in this school, 60.

The Grammar School has been under the instruction of Miss Lizzie

A. MEADER.

This school is in some respects the most difficult to manage of any in town. The scholars, as a class, being of that age when parents begin to allow them more latitude in deciding important questions for themselves, are not usually very slow to take advantage of such liberty, and thus a very heavy burden is imposed upon their teacher in enforcing the restraints necessary to good order and diligence in the school room.

The earnest and persevering efforts of the teacher, however, to overcome such obstacles have met with very commendable success, and the school is in much better condition than when she took charge of it.

The examination at the close of the year gave unmistakable evidence of study and effort on the part of both scholars and teacher.

The number of scholars in this school, 47.

The High School has been taught by Miss Susan B. French.

Though small the school has been pleasant and interesting, and there is no doubt but that the scholars have made as much progress in their studies as during any of the several years past. Latin, Algebra and Book-Keeping have received the usual amount of attention; while the more common branches have been very thoroughly explained and understood. The respect which the scholars have manifested for the teacher and the prosperity of the school is deserving of remark, and their proficiency in their studies should be an encouragement to those who are especially interested in their welfare.

DISTRICT NO. 2.—PINE HILL.

The scholars seem to have appreciated their privilege, and have done much eredit to themselves by promptness, diligence and respect for their teacher. One scholar was not marked for absence or tardiness, and did not fail to mswer correctly a single question during the term. Others made a very fuvorable approach to this standard, and all have made good advancement in their studies. With proper efforts on the part of parents to obtain and sustain suitable teachers, this school, though small and brief, may rank among the first in town.

DISTRICT NO. 5.- PLAINS.

The achool in this district was taught the first term by Miss Bell S. Hours, a former teacher, and the second term by Miss Annie E. Gile. Under the tuition of Miss Hoitt the school fully sustained the reputation obtained in a former report. Miss Gile is quite young, and posnessing an easy temperament with quiet, gentle manners, though well qualified in the text books, failed in some measure to sustain proper order, but succeeded in winning the kind regards of the scholars, and in maintaining a fair interest in the several classes. This school demands an experienced teacher and it is hoped no other will be employed. Number of achillars in the district, 29. Length of school: 1st term, 7 weeks. 2nd, 1112 weeks. Amount of money appropriated, \$98 54.

GENERAL REMARKS.

I hope it may not be inferred by the favorable reports I have been able to give the several schools, that the school system in New Market is very nearly perfect. When we consider what is necessary in order to secure to our children the greatest possible benefit from the eight to ten years usually devoted to common school education, we may easily discover many defects.

A great improvement may be made in the selection of teachers; and may I not be permitted to suggest here that the election of Prudential

Committees is a very important matter in every school district?

We need teachers devoted to the work as well as competent to teach. The great question with the Prudential Committee should be,—not is he or she a relative or special friend to be favored, but is the applicant fit to take charge of the school? The manifest motives of a person's life may be a safe standard by which to decide this question. To teach for the sake of the position and pay alone is a motive so sordid and unworthy that it may be condemned at a glance. Little innocent ones, whose habits of thought and mental action are to be affected forever by the contract, should be thought of in each case, for this is a business of responsibility! Thoughtful and affectionate parents are interested in this matter!

Money, sufficient to enable the Committees to secure good and efficient teachers in every school, should be raised for the coming year. One thousand dollars, at least, should be added to the amount raised last year.

It would also be a great improvement if some parents could be effect-

ually reminded of their duty to the school while in session.

Various methods have been adopted by the teachers and Superintendent during the past year, to secure punctual and regular attendance. But in some instances, particularly in the village, they have met with a total failure. Notwithstanding all that has been said and done, scholars have been allowed to stroll about the streets and shops, and visit the school-room only when they pleased. Such ones not only fail to be benefited, but become a serious injury to the schools. They impede the progress of the classes, and dissipate the interest of the industrious.-Their example makes others truants. No teacher can succeed under such circumstances. Regulations made to-day must be explained to half a dozen, who were absent, to-morrow; or they are sure to be violated and broken down. This takes the time of the teacher, and the attention of the whole school. A difficult problem explained in a class to-day, must be explained again to-morrow to absentees. This time and effort should have been spent on an advance lesson. Many regulations and exercises necessary to the interests of the school cannot be made at all effectual, by reason of such irregularities.

Now the large majority of parents in town are desirous that their shildren may obtain a good education. For this they should spare no pains. And the question arises, must their efforts be thwarted? Must they be imposed upon? Must the means afforded their children at such expense, be rendered in any degree useless, by the careless indifference of a few? Every worthy parent must feel called upon to protect their own and their children's rights. The laws of the State which protect us against all gross injustice are available in this case, and should

be carried into effect.
