Brevity of space and minuteness of detail in the presentation of a report of the Public Schools are incompatible, nevertheless a faithful discharge of duty compels us to state somewhat at length, facts in relation to the government of schools during the past year.

#### DISTRICT NO. 1.

The Primary and Intermediate schools, have been taught by the same teachers as last year. An assistant in the Primary school lightened the labors very materially.

Eminently successful spoken by us, adds nothing to the lustre of these teachers, but expressions of gratitude from every parent, and the love of every pupil speak volumes.

The Grammar school contrary to the usual custom has been taught by a female. This school in many respects is the most difficult school to govern, requiring not only brains, but musele, to make it respectable. We are happy to state this teacher succeeded beyond our most sanguine expectations, knowing as we knew, the difficulties to be surmounted not only in the schoolroom, but also from external influences.

The High School was especially unfortunate in the selection of teachers. During the first term nothing occurred to interrupt the harmony of the school; but the teacher having secured a more lucrative situations withdrew at its close.

After considerable delay another teacher was obtained and with many misgivings the machinery was again set in motion. Repeated explosions convinced us that our Engineer was incompetent to run the machine and his resignation was accepted.

Another teacher was procured for the third term, amply competent in respect to literary ability to teach but deficient in experience and executive power.

Discipline is what is most needed in this schoool, and we hope the time will come when presumption, impertinence, insolence and low cunning shall cease to be classed among the requisites of culture.

### DISTRICT NO. 2.

A want of adaptation and experience detracted much from the success of the first teacher. The remark that "a Poet is born, not made," applies equally well-to teachers.

During the last half of the second term the school appeared to better advantage under the management of another teacher.

#### DISTRICT NO. 3.

No material change was noticed in this school from the report of layear, the same teacher having been employed. This is the easiest of a jour schools to govern.

#### DISTRICT NO. 4.

This district formerly sustained rather a poor reputation, but we are pleased to witness the happy change which has come over this school under the direction of the present teacher. No pains were spared to render the tasks agreeable to the pupils.

The token of regard presented to the teacher is conclusive evidence that her labors were appreciated.

#### DISTRICT NO. 5.

We think we do not exaggerate when we say that this school never appeared so well, or made more rapid progress, than it has made during the year just closed. We congratulate the Prudential Committee upon his good fortune in having secured so competent a teacher.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

The attention of parents is carnestly invited to the condition of ou, Public Schools.—There is a marked declension in the number of the



pupils, as well as in the interest formerly felt for the education of the children.

Regularity of attendance is indispensable to a good school, and children who are allowed to absent themselves from study for every trifling cause, or are compelled by parents to exchange the school-room for the work-shop, or the factory, are soon distanced by their more fortunate schoolmates and all interest in study is forever lost.

The general appearance of the school-rooms in the stone building has been very much improved by the prompt action of the Prudential Committee. Grateful for small favors, we wish still greater improvements might be made.

To the citizens of District No. 3 and 4, we suggest the propriety of uniting their school-money; thereby continuing their school throughout the year. Dist. No. 4, is sadly deficient in outline maps,—will not some one make an effort to supply the deficiency before another year is spent, provided no change is made?

Again we urge the necessity of raising larger sums of money for school purposes.

Teachers will not work for less wages than can be obtained from other pursuits.

Grievous complaints are often made in relation to the government of schools by many persons who never darken their doors, and consequently know nothing of their perplexities. To such we say:—risit the school-room, surprise by your presence your children; learn by observation the trials of a teacher; extend the right-hand of friendship, cheer and support by your counsels, rather than discourage by your faultfinding.
