The law requires the School Committee to make an annual report of the condition of the schools under their care. The facts necessary to determine such condition will be found in the reports made to us by the District Treasurer and Superintendent, which are annexed, and to which reference is now made.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

Agreeably to a law on the statute book of this State, requiring the Board of Education, or some member of it appointed by them. to report annually as to the condition of the Public Schools, the following report is respectfully submitted. The purpose of such a report is to inform the public, and must of necessity be merely the opinion of the person or officer appointed to perform such duty. This is all very well, provided such person or officer is thoroughly competent, and is not influenced or induced to make other than a true report as to the condition, progress, and wants of the schools in the future; and the people are content to abide by such opinion or decision. A more satisfactory way however. we think, would be for parents and all tax-payers to visit the schools personally, and see for themselves the way and manner in which the schools are conducted. And we would suggest that in the future your visits to the school room be more frequent, as the you would not only see for yourselves and become more and more interested, but the teachers would be encouraged to put forth their very best efforts and a new incentive would be given the pupils to be more industrious and to apply themselves more closely to their respective studies, so that in the near future we should see larger and better results. We do not wish to be understood that no interest in our schools is now manifested by parents and taxpayers, for that is far from being true, as the large and appreciative audiences that have attended the graduating exercises of the High School, and the liberal sums of money you have so freely appropriated for their support, the comfortable and commodious school buildings you have erected, clearly demonstrate; but that by frequent visits you would be enabled to exhibit that interest and hearty sympathy, encouragement and co operation, which all teachers need, however thoroughly furnished for their responsible and difficult work they may be.

Since the last report made by Mr. I. T. George, a class of seven have graduated from the High School, with honor to themselves and to the school, which was then under the successful management of Mr. F. L. Smith, who during the summer vacation received an invitation to take a school with larger salary at Needham, Mass. He of course accepted the offer, and Mr. Ralph A. Parker, a graduate of Bates College, was elected to fill the vacancy, and entered upon his duties the commencement of the fall term. He comes to us well recommended as a man of correct habits, a very superior and successful teacher, being very popular wherever he has taught. He appears thus far to meet with good success here, having good discipline in and about his school building, his pupils doing good work. The High School is increasing in members and its good name appears to be still maintained. One other new teacher, Miss Merrill, fills the place made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. F. L. Smith, 1st Primary. Miss Merrill seems to possess that honesty of purpose, as well as capacity and a will to work, which are the important requisites in all departments of business to attain the best results. The other schools in the village remain under the charge of the same teachers as last year, and the good work they have done in the year that has past, and some of them for many years, having met the approval of parents and all interested, of Superintendents and School Boards in the past, needs no eulogistic comments from any one. A good teacher is a power, and not to be found in every one. They are supreme in their sphere, and while they occupy the position of teachers they should be upheld in their supremacy. In order to teach a little, the teacher must know much. It is not enough to possess just the amount of knowledge the pupils are expected to have; unless the teacher be educated far beyond that small amount, her instruction is next to worthless, because, unable to see beyond, she must necessarily make information the end and aim of her instruction, which dwarfs the development of the mental activities. Other things being equal, the broadest education will accomplish the best teaching. A studious teacher will have a studious school. A broad-minded teacher means broadminded pupils, and vice versa. For an inexperienced teacher to take charge of a school is fatal to the best progress of the school. The teacher learns at the expense of the pupils, whose time, therefore, has to be partly wasted, while the teacher is acquiring her methods by experience. The public schools were established

to the benefit and advancement of the child, not of the teacher. To place girls who know nothing of school room methods in charge of a class of twenty or thirty, is giving the benefit to the wrong party. Hence the necessity of trained teachers, graduates from training schools, who understand the details of school routine; who have learned to teach the different subjects according to the most approved methods; and who, when placed in independent positions, will know at once what to do and how to go to work.

Schools outside the village have been run as formerly. The Pine Hill taught by Mr. F. R. Alley, the Plains by Miss Edith B. Kelsey, two terms of ten weeks, twenty weeks at each place. These schools have been well taught, and good progress has been made. These are much better teachers than can usually be employed for the salary paid. Miss Kelsey, having attended a training school, is well fitted to have charge of a much larger school, and can command a much better salary. We predict a future before her as a successful teacher. A school at the Four Corners of fifteen weeks, also fifteen weeks at the Grant, both sections receiving the benefit together of thirty weeks. The first term of ten weeks at the Grant was taught by Miss Melissa Young, an experienced and successful teacher, and well qualified to do excellent work. The other two terms have been under the charge of Miss Mary Gage, a High School graduate of the city of Dover, who came to us well recommended. We believe Miss Gage has endeavored to do honest work in the school and has tried hard to do her very best for all her pupils, and if the school has fallen short of what it ought to have been in any way, is it not just barely possible that there is lacking in this part of the town an earnest effort on the part of those who ought to be the friends of the school to stand by the school at all hazards, making the best of everything, making teachers feel at home, and not make them feel as if their every effort was to be criticised. No person can do their best, when there is a feeling that their best may not give satisfaction. What makes a good school is when scholars are found in their places every day, with a full belief that the teacher can and will instruct them in those things which they come there to learn, and this they can never have, so long as the teacher is in any way criticised by their parents in their presence.

#### SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

The school buildings and rooms are all that we need to aecommodate the pupils at present, in fact one room in the Durham
Side building has not been occupied as yet. The Plains school
house has been repaired, and needs to be painted, and we would
recommend that all the school houses, viz., the Plains, Four Corners, Grant and Pine Hill, be painted and be put in good order;
no other repairs being needed, except we would advise that new
seats and teacher's desk be put in the Grant. We believe in taking care of the school buildings the same as an individual would
take care of his house or other buildings. It will cost but a small
sum and would be money well expended.

#### FREE TEXT BOOKS.

An act providing for the furnishing of free text books and school supplies to the pupils was passed last June session of the Legislature, which reads as follows:

Section 1. The school committee of every city and town shall purchase, at the expense of such city or town, text-books and other supplies used in the public schools; and said text-books and supplies shall be loaned to the pupils of said public schools free of charge, subject to such rules and regulations as to care and custody as the school committee may prescribe; provided, that in purchasing the first supply of text-books under this act the school committee may effect a change in the text-books previously and then in use upon any subject.

SECT. 2. Pupils supplied with text-books at the time of the passage of this act shall not be supplied with similar books by the committee until needed.

The experience of those who have had the benefit of the free text book law, in Massachusetts and elsewhere, is that it economizes time and material, and increases the attendance at school. The question of economy of time becomes a very serious one when we consider the average length of time pupils attend school, it being only thirty-three months. At the beginning of each term much time is wasted because all are not supplied with the necessary books, and some go on several weeks without them. Now the town furnishes the books, and the schools will be ready to begin work the first morning of the term. The best educators and all who are familiar with school work say it is the part of wisdom to secure the best teachers, give them well furnished

tooms and in every way make the condition favorable to success. It it is wise to educate our children, it is also wise to give them the best material to develop their minds. Improved text books, books of reference, in fact every needful supply that shall tend to the most rapid progress and the most thorough scholarship; and these cannot without detriment be dispensed with, any more than our great manufactories can dispense with the modern improvements in machinery, and produce the largest amount of valuable fabrics. The natural results of a free text book system are in this direction.

The cost of furnishing books, stationery and all necessary supplies the first year will not probably exceed \$2.00 per capita, and less than \$1.00 a year the succeeding years. A special committee from the Dover School Committee in 1884, after a careful inquiry, gave the following estimate as to the annual cost to parents of providing their children with books and supplies.

The average cost to parents of this town cannot be far from \$3.00 per annum, while the cost per capita for the town will probably be less than one dollar after the first year. Publishers and wholesale dealers generally give greater discounts to cities and towns buying their supplies direct, than they are willing to give local dealers.

#### TEACHERS' MEETINGS.

In larger places than this it is the custom among teachers of the graded schools to hold meetings occasionally, where matters pertaining to all grades of work are discussed. By this means our schools would be greatly benefited. In this way the teachers could compare notes, and each school would make about the same relative progress. If one teacher invents a device that assists her in her work she has here an opportunity to give all the benefit of her experience and to have an intelligent criticism upon its merits from different stand-points. The utility of such frequent meeting for the interchange of thoughts on school matters is unquestioned. And in our opinion if such a course were adopted by our teachers the schools would be greatly benefited.

#### IRREGULAR ATTENDANCE.

Irregularity of attendance is a serious evil in some of our schools, and some stringent method should be adopted to prevent it. Sickness from prevailing diseases, and inclement weather, are of course sufficient reasons for non-attendance. But there are many cases in which there seems to be no appreciable cause. Parents allow their children to absent themselves from school, not once thinking what the result will be. Scholars who are frequently absent, not only keep themselves back in their studies. but keep their classes back and an irreparable injury is done. Irregularity of attendance is a most formidable obstacle. We do not wish to be unjust but it not unfrequently seems as though the school was secondary to everything else. If an errand is to be done, no matter how small, or a demonstration of any kind happens, no matter of how little import, the school must suffer. We would ask all parents to act with the teachers in securing more perfect attendance during the coming year.

"If there is one virtue that should be cultivated more than another by him who would succeed in life, it should be punctuality; if there is one error that should be avoided, it is being behind time."

#### MUSIC.

Some attention is now given to music in nearly all of our schools. No one denies that singing should find a place in every school, to enliven the spirits of the pupils and make the work more cheerful and interesting. Fifteen minutes each day would be time

profitably spent in this branch in each of our schools. And if one lesson a week could be given by a musical teacher in each one of our schools, it would be of great benefit and wonderfully declop the scholars' falent for music. Music is refining and elevature in its tendencies, more so than any other study, and wisely directed becomes one of the most effective means of discipline.

"Since nothing so stockish and full of rage, But music for the time doth change his nature."

#### APPROPRIATION.

The liberal sum which you have in the past years voted for your schools, you will doubtless deem wise to continue in the future, for no money which you expend will yield so large a dividend of good results. Liberally support your public schools, and thus qualify your children and youth to be valuable citizens; and besides this, the discipline and knowledge which your public schools give their pupils cannot, like material wealth, be taken away from them. Stand by your schools, encourage and sustain them, and you will find your reward in results above the value of figures in crowns of success for your children.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE

## PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

1. The Public schools of Newmarket shall be divided into the following grades: Primary, 1st and 2d, Intermediate, Grammar, 1st and 2d, and High.

#### SCHOOL HOURS.

The time for opening and closing the village schools will, II. for the present, be regulated by verbal directions from the School Committee. When there is a severe storm of rain or snow, the janitor will ascertain whether, in the opinion of the School Committee, the weather is such as to render it imprudent for the children to attend school. If it is so considered he will strike three signals on the Congregational church bell, each signal to consist of three rapid strokes of the hammer followed by an interval of rest. The "No School Signal" may be expected at 7.45 o'clock, A. M. and at 1 o'clock, P. M. The signal at 7.45 does not affect the afternoon session. If, on account of the weather the schools do not keep in the morning, but do keep in the afternoon, the afternoon session for that day will be three and one-half hours, in the High School building, and three hours in the Primaries, with a suitable recess. The morning session will always close at 12 o'clock, M. The teachers will not dismiss their schools or change the school hours except by permission of the School Committee.

#### ATTENDANCE AND GENERAL DUTIES OF TEACHERS.

Teachers are required to be at their respective school rooms at least ten minutes before the commencement of the sessions both morning and afternoon. A strict observance of the hours of commencing and closing is required. No teacher shall be absent from the school without the consent of the School Committee. No teacher shall ever introduce a substitute into the school without the express sanction of the School Committee. The teachers are required to observe and carry into effect all the regulations of the School Committee in relation to the instruction, discipline and general management of the schools, and to consult him freely on occasions of serious difficulty, to the end that all parties may work in unison and be of mutual support.

#### OPENING EXERCISES.

IV. The morning session shall be opened with the reading of the Scriptures.

#### SCHOOL REGISTERS.

V. Every school shall be furnished with a record book, in which shall be registered the names, ages, absence and tardiness of each scholar, and the daily average rank in recitation and deportment, and the register shall be open for the inspection of visitors.

#### ABSENCE, TARDINESS, DISMISSALS.

The names of pupils who are habitually absent or tardy shall be reported by the teachers to the parents, the School Committee, and also to the truant officer. In every instance of absence or tardiness a written statement or personal explanation shall be required of the parent or guardian on the return of the pupil to school or at the next session, that the teacher may know whether the cause is legitimate or otherwise. No pupil shall be allowed to leave school before its dismission, except for satisfactory reasons, without a written or personal request from parent or guardian.

#### SCHOLARS LIMITED TO SCHOOL GROUNDS.

VII. No pupil shall leave the school-grounds during school hours, except by permission of the teacher.

#### CLEANLINESS OF SCHOLARS.

VIII. Personal cleanliness must be required of every pupil.

Teachers are expected to rigidly enforce this rule.

#### GOOD MORALS.

IX. Good morals being of the first importance to the pupils, and essential to their highest progress in useful knowledge, instruction therein shall be given in each of the schools, and the principles of truth and virtue faithfully inculcated upon all suitable occasions. The pupils shall be carefully instructed to avoid idleness and proprofanity, falsehood and deceit, and every wicked and disgraceful practice, and to conduct themselves in an orderly, courteous and respectful manner; and it shall be the duty of the instructors, so far as practicable, to exercise a general inspection over them, in these regards, both in and out of school, and also while going to the same and returning home.

#### VENTILATION.

X. Teachers shall give special attention to the ventilation and temperature of their school rooms, both in summer and winter, and see that the air is thoroughly changed at each recess and at the close of each school session.

#### SUPERVISION OF PRINCIPAL.

X1. The Principal of the High School shall have general supervision of the buildings and yard in which he teaches, and shall be held responsible for all school property, and for the general discipline of the schools in his building outside their respective rooms. He shall also assist the several teachers, when necessary, in the enforcement of rules of discipline and order; and it shall be the duty of the several teachers to co-operate with him in the discharge of his general duties.

#### CARE OF SCHOOL PREMISES.

NII. Teachers shall be held responsible for any want of decorum or neatness about the school premises, and also for all damage done to the school property in their respective rooms during school hours. Any pupil who shall write any indecent language or draw any obscene or indecent pictures or representations on any part of the school premises shall be liable to expulsion.

#### BOOKS AND UTENSILS REQUIRED.

 XIII. Pupils shall not be allowed to attend any of the public schools unless they are furnished with the books and utensils required in their respective classes.

# SUBJECTS TO BE EXPLAINED AND INSTRUCTION TO BE THOROUGH AND PRACTICAL.

XIV. The teachers are required to illustrate and explain the subjects of study in such language and by such methods of their own as shall find the readiest access to the understanding of the pupils. And the instruction should be thorough, and made practical by showing to the pupils distinctly the various applications to the common affairs of life that may be made of the knowledge they are acquiring at school.

#### NON-RESIDENTS.

XV. Non-residents shall not attend school in any district except by consent of the local committee and the payment of such tuition as shall be determined.

#### DETENTION OF PUPILS.

XVI. No pupils shall be detained in the school room during a full session of the school; if deprived of recess from any cause, a reasonable absence shall be granted sometime during the session.

#### GOVERNMENT OF THE SCHOOL.

XVII. The discipline of the schools shall be of parental character; such as a kind, judicious and faithful parent would exercise in the family. Corporal punishment shall be resorted to only when other means fail.

#### SUSPENSION OF PUPILS.

XVIII. Scholars will be suspended from school for persistent disobedience, and when so suspended will not be allowed to return without permission from the School Committee.

#### ABSENCE FOR HALF A TERM.

XIX. Any pupil who shall from any cause absent himself from school for half a term shall not be allowed to rejoin his class without satisfactory evidence of proficiency in the studies pursued during the absence being presented to School Committee.

#### CONTRIBUTIONS, SUBSCRIPTIONS, ADVERTISE-MENTS, &C.

XX. No contributions or subscriptions shall be introduced into any school; and no person shall be allowed to occupy the time of a school by giving any notice or advertisement to the pupils or teachers, and no person not connected with the schools shall be permitted to address the pupils on any subject not pertaining to their studies, except by permission of the School Committee.

#### PROMOTION.

XXI. Promotions will be made at the commencement of the school year, but any pupil who shall excel in scholar-ship may be promoted at any time upon passing a satisfactory examination by the School Committee. In determining promotions a yearly average of 70 per cent. of correct answers shall be required for entry to the High school, and for promotion from class to class therein. But no scholar shall be promoted who shall rank less than 50 per cent. in any study. Promotions in the Grammer Schools shall be determined in the

same manner, excepting that the required average shall be 66 per cent. and not less that 50 per cent. in any study. In the High and Grammar Schools daily recitations shall be ranked, and considered in finding the general average, equally with written examinations, and an oral examination shall be taken at the close of each school year, and considered likewise.

#### DIPLOMAS.

XXII. Diplomas shall be awarded at the close of the school year to such pupils of the High School as shall have completed the prescribed course to the satisfaction of the School Committee. Certificates of graduation will be awarded to all pupils who satsfactorily complete the course of study in the Grammar Schools, but no such certificates will be awarded to pupils whose average per cent. is less than 70 for the last year.

#### COPY OF REGULATIONS TO BE KEPT IN SCHOOL.

XXIII. A copy of these regulations shall be kept upon the desk in each school room, and teachers are required to read them before the school at the commencement of each term, and allow visitors to freely consult the same.
