SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The law requires the School Committee to make an annual report of the condition of the schools under their care. The facts necessary to determine such condition will be found in the reports made to us by the District Treasurer and Superintendent, which are annexed, and to which reference is now made.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

During the past year nothing has occurred to mar the general interest and harmony that has seemed to prevail in all our schools, and we take pleasure in again announcing to the people of the town that the schools are generally in a prosperous condition, and much good work has been done. Comparing the present condition of our schools with the past, we believe that advancement has been made, and the indications are encouraging for the future.

It has been well said that "the public school is the Nation's college." Here the larger proportion of the people have received, and must still receive, their intellectual training. Here are the ministers, doctors, lawyers, teachers, mechanics and farmers; the brain, bone and sinew of the next generation. And we believe that no institution should be more jealously guarded or more generously supported.

Three elements are essential and absolutely necessary for the highest success in any school; viz., a competent and faithful teacher; constant, interested and faithful pupils; and the earnest support and co-operation of interested and watchful parents. The home holds the balance of power for good or evil; it always has; it always will. From the home, then, come those influences

that are principally responsible for the success or failure of the public school. The best teachers will fall far short of full success if they fail to secure the active co-operation of the parents. Irregularity of attendance is, perhaps, the most serious obstacle to all true development in the public schools, and this is as directly under the control of parents as is the matter of food and clothing. An inconstant pupil cannot sustain his standing in class; and when he finds himself falling behind, he invariably complains that the lesson is too hard, the task too difficult, seeks every opportunity to absent himself from recitation; becomes indifferent, careless and discouraged; soon drops out of the class, and most likely out of the school. The parents are now in a position to censure the teachers and school management most unkindly, when they themselves are, without doubt, wholly responsible. We would not be unjust, but it must appear to a close observer that the school and all its interests are, in many instances at least, made secondary to every other consideration, however trivial.

We feel that absenteeism would be corrected at once if it could be fully understood what an irreparable injury the child sustains, not simply by losing his place in his class, but as he must necessarily do, in losing his self-respect, his self-dependence, his courage, his pride, his ambition, and in openly admitting that the pupils of his own age, who were formerly hardly admitted to be his equals, are now unquestionably his superiors in every scholarly attainment. If the parent could fully realize what a tremendous reactive influence this kind of treatment must, of necessity, have upon the whole subsequent life of his child, then most certainly the evils of absenteeism would be corrected at once.

IMPROVEMENTS IN SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

During the past year we have been compelled by the large number of children attending the Primary School on Durham Side to furnish desks and other furniture for the upper room to

accommodate the pupils. This involved considerable expense. We also thought it economy to paint the outside of the building; so now we have a school building on that side of the river of which the people feel proud, and think a great improvement has been made in their locality. These two schools are so graded that pupils on leaving them enter the Intermediate School in the High School building.

Repairs have also been made on the school buildings at Plains, Four Corners and Grant, such as shingling, painting, etc. We would recommend that another year the old brick school house be provided with new windows, as the old ones have become badly broken and so loose that it is almost impossible to keep the rooms sufficiently warm in cold, windy weather.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.

There appears to be quite a large number of children who do not attend school at all. We wish to call your attention to Chapter 91, Section 14, of General Laws as amended:

“Every parent, guardian, master, or other person having the custody, control, or charge of any child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, residing in any school district in which a public school is annually taught, for the period of twelve weeks or more, within two miles by the nearest travelled road from his residence, shall cause such child to attend such public school for twelve weeks at least in every year, six weeks at least of which attendance shall be consecutive, unless such child be excused from such attendance by the School Board of the town or district, or the board of education of a special district, upon its being shown to their satisfaction that the physical or mental condition of such child was such as to prevent his attendance at school for the period required, or that such child was instructed in a private school or at home for at least twelve weeks during such year in the branches of education required to be taught in the public schools, or having acquired those branches, in other more advanced studies.”

We would recommend that the law above be more strictly enforced the coming year, for the reason that our public schools

are now more thoroughly equipped than ever before. The law requires but a comparatively short attendance annually. The love and desire of attending school should be so instilled into all children by the parents and teachers, as well as all promoters of education, that this statute would not need to be enforced, but all children would be anxious to attend the school. Our free schools and free text book system now place all pupils on an equality, so that the poor need feel no embarrassment in sharing its mutual benefits.

“There is no royal road to learning.” All must encounter the same difficulties in the struggle. Some brains are more active than others, yet hard work and patience, with encouragement from friends, will improve the dullest intellect.

HIGH SCHOOL.

It is now nearly nineteen years since the graded system was established in our schools, and our High School has gradually increased in numbers each year, the past year the register showing an attendance of fifty pupils, the largest number for any year. The school is thoroughly equipped with apparatus, enabling the teacher to do satisfactory work in teaching the natural sciences. The principal could accomplish much better results if provided with an assistant. Three classes in school, requiring twelve recitations daily, gives the time devoted to each recitation an average of only about twenty minutes, which is not enough to obtain appreciable and satisfactory results. This matter may be discussed and acted upon during the coming year. This school is doing a far greater work for good in this community than many realize, and if provided with an assistant would do still better work.

It is to be hoped that this school (as well as all the schools) will continue to be supported in the same liberal manner and their present high condition be still maintained. Our schools stand better to-day, generally, than we have ever known them before, and with proper care and management can easily be

raised to a level with the best schools of the State. We have endeavored to secure teachers suited to the needs of each school, and faithful work has been done. Few, who have not taught themselves, realize the nervous strain upon teachers, or the real work there is for them to do. It is not confined to the six hours in the school-room; our successful teachers spend hours each day outside of the class-room in preparation, in correcting written lessons, and in planning the details for the next day's work. The great amount of oral instruction required, in these days, necessitates much general reading, also, on the part of teachers. The teachers the past year have all, we think, realized the responsibility resting upon them, and have made commendable improvement in their methods of instruction.

In conclusion we say briefly, watch your schools; continue to support them liberally, as you have done in the past. If we are wise citizens, we shall open opportunities to our children beyond those we now have. We shall endeavor, by advancing the educational privileges of our town, to leave it better than we found it, thereby placing a stepping-stone to enable the next generation to mount higher.

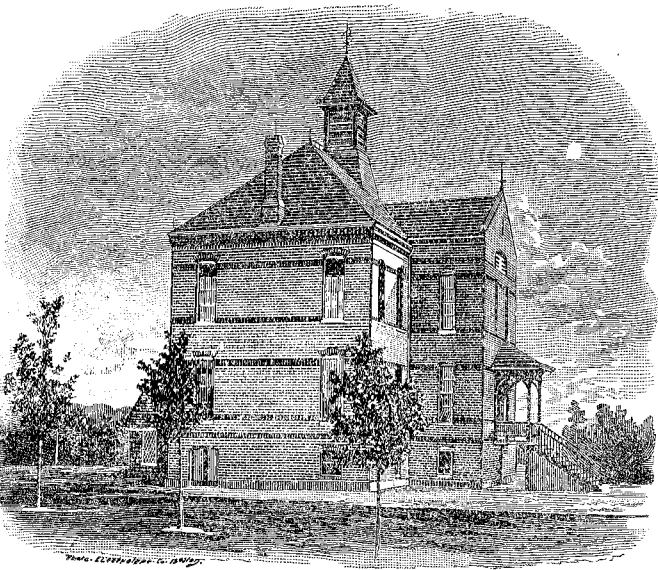

RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

I. The Public Schools of Newmarket shall be divided into the following grades: Primary, First and Second, Intermediate, Grammar, First and Second, and High.

SCHOOL HOURS.

II. The time for opening and closing the village schools will, for the present, be regulated by verbal directions from the Board of Education. When there is a severe storm of rain or snow the Janitor will ascertain whether, in the opinion of the Board of Education, the weather is such as to render it imprudent for the children to attend school. If it is so considered he will strike three signals on the bell, each signal to consist of three rapid strokes of the hammer followed by an interval of rest. The "No School Signal" may be expected at 7.45 o'clock A. M. and at 1 o'clock P. M. The signal at 7.45 does not affect the afternoon session. If, on account of the weather, the schools do not keep in the morning but do keep in the afternoon, the afternoon session for that day will be three and one-half hours in the High School building and three hours in the Primaries, with a suitable recess. The morning session will always close at 12 o'clock M. The teachers will not dismiss their schools nor change the school hours except by permission of the Board of Education.

ATTENDANCE AND GENERAL DUTIES OF TEACHERS.

- III. Teachers are required to be at their respective school rooms at least ten minutes before the commencement of the sessions, both morning and afternoon. A strict observance of the hours of commencing and closing is required. No teacher shall be absent from the school without the consent of the Board of Education. No teacher shall ever introduce a substitute into the school without the express sanction of the Board of Education. The teachers are required to observe and carry into effect all the regulations of the Board of Education in relation to the instruction, discipline and general management of the schools and to consult him freely on occasions of serious difficulty, to the end that all parties may work in unison and be of mutual support.

OPENING EXERCISES.

- IV. The morning session shall be opened with the reading of the Scriptures.

SCHOOL REGISTERS.

- V. Every school shall be furnished with a record book, in which shall be registered the names, ages, absence and tardiness of each scholar, and the daily average rank in recitation and deportment, and the register shall be open for the inspection of visitors.

ABSENCE, TARDINESS, DISMISSALS.

- VI. The names of pupils who are habitually absent or tardy shall be reported by the teachers to the parents, the Board of Education, and also to the Truant Officer. In every instance of absence or tardiness a written statement or personal explanation shall be required of the parent or guardian on the return of the pupil to school or at the next session, that the teacher may know whether the cause is legitimate or otherwise. No pupil shall be allowed to leave school before its dismissal, except for satisfactory reasons, without a written or personal request from parent or guardian.

SCHOLARS LIMITED TO SCHOOL GROUNDS.

- VII. No pupil shall leave the school grounds during school hours, except by permission of the teacher.

CLEANLINESS OF SCHOLARS.

- VIII. Personal cleanliness must be required of every pupil. Teachers are expected to rigidly enforce this rule.

GOOD MORALS.

- IX. Good morals being of the first importance to the pupils, and essential to their highest progress in useful knowledge, instruction therein shall be given in each of the schools, and the principles of truth and virtue faithfully inculcated upon all suitable occasions. The pupils shall be carefully instructed to avoid idleness and profanity, falsehood and deceit and every wicked and disgraceful practice, and to conduct themselves in an orderly, courteous and respectful manner; and it shall be the duty of the instructors, so far as practicable, to exercise a general inspection over them, in these regards, both in and out of school, and also while going to the same and returning home.

VENTILATION.

- X. Teachers shall give special attention to the ventilation and temperature of their school rooms, both in summer and winter, and see that the air is thoroughly changed at each recess and at the close of each school session.

SUPERVISION OF PRINCIPAL.

- XI. The Principal of the High School shall have general supervision of the buildings and yard in which he teaches, and shall be held responsible for all school property and for the general discipline of the schools in his building outside their respective rooms. He shall also assist the several teachers, when necessary, in the enforcement of rules of discipline and order; and it shall be the duty of the several teachers to cooperate with him in the discharge of his general duties.

CARE OF SCHOOL PREMISES.

- XII. Teachers shall be held responsible for any want of decorum or neatness about the school premises, and also for all damage done to the school property in their respective rooms during school hours. Any pupil who shall write any indecent language or draw any obscene or indecent pictures or representations on any part of the school premises shall be liable to expulsion.

BOOKS AND UTENSILS.

- XIII. Resident pupils are furnished with the books and utensils required in their respective classes, under the provisions of the statutes.

SUBJECTS TO BE EXPLAINED AND INSTRUCTION TO BE THOROUGH AND PRACTICAL.

- XIV. The teachers are required to illustrate and explain the subjects of study in such language and by such methods of their own as shall find the readiest access to the understanding of the pupils. And the instruction should be thorough, and made practical by showing to the pupils distinctly the various applications to the common affairs of life that may be made of the knowledge they are acquiring at school.

NON-RESIDENTS.

- XV. Non-residents shall not attend the schools of this town except by consent of the Board of Education and the payment of such tuition as shall be determined.

DETENTION OF PUPILS.

- XVI. No pupils shall be detained in the school room during a full session of the school; if deprived of recess from any cause, a reasonable absence shall be granted some time during the session.

GOVERNMENT OF THE SCHOOL.

- XVII. The discipline of the schools shall be of parental character; such as a kind, judicious and faithful parent would exercise in the family. Corporal punishment shall be resorted to only when other means fail.

SUSPENSION OF PUPILS.

- XVIII. Scholars will be suspended from school for persistent disobedience, and when so suspended will not be allowed to return without permission from the Board of Education.

OBEDIENCE TO PRINCIPAL.

- XIX. All pupils in the High School building are expected to obey promptly and cheerfully all rules or regulations made by the Principal for the government of the school, and shall not in any way whatever use his or her influence over any pupil or pupils in the schools in the High School building in opposition to the rules or regulations made by the Principal, and for any violation of any part of any rule or regulation they shall be considered subject to expulsion.

ABSENCE FOR HALF A TERM.

- XX. Any pupil who shall from any cause absent himself from school for half a term shall not be allowed to rejoin his class without satisfactory evidence of proficiency in the studies pursued during the absence being presented to the Board of Education.

CONTRIBUTIONS, SUBSCRIPTIONS, ADVERTISEMENTS, ETC.

- XXI. No contributions or subscriptions shall be introduced into any school; and no person shall be allowed to occupy the time of a school by giving any notice or advertisement to the pupils or teachers, and no person not connected with the schools shall be permitted to address the pupils on any subject not pertaining to their studies, except by permission of the Board of Education.

PROMOTION.

XXII. Promotions will be made at the commencement of the school year, but any pupil who shall excel in scholarship may be promoted at any time upon passing a satisfactory examination by the Board of Education. In determining promotions a yearly average of 70 per cent. of correct answers shall be required for entry to the High School and for promotion from class to class therein. But no scholar shall be promoted who shall rank less than 50 per cent. in any study. Promotions in the Grammar Schools shall be determined in the same manner, excepting that the required average shall be 66 per cent. and not less than 50 per cent. in any study. In the High and Grammar schools daily recitations shall be ranked, and considered in finding the general average, equally with written examinations, and an oral examination shall be taken at the close of each school year, and considered likewise.

DIPLOMAS.

XXIII. Diplomas shall be awarded at the close of the school year to such pupils of the High School as shall have completed the prescribed course to the satisfaction of the Board of Education. Certificates of graduation will be awarded to all pupils who satisfactorily complete the course of study in the Grammar Schools, but no such certificates will be awarded to pupils whose average per cent. is less than 70 for the last year.

COPY OF REGULATIONS TO BE KEPT IN SCHOOL.

XXIV. A copy of the regulations shall be kept upon the desk in each school room, and teachers are required to read them before the school at the commencement of each term, and allow visitors to freely consult the same.
