### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# CHIEF OF FIRE DEPARTMENT.

NEWMARKET, N. 11., Feb. 16, 1896.

The annual report of the Fire Department for the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1896, is herewith presented, with a statement of fires and alarms during the year, the cause of the same, when known; the approximate loss, and insurance paid on property damaged or destroyed; the condition of property in charge of this department, with a list of the same; a statement of repairs and improvements made during the year, and the present organization of the department.

#### FIRES AND ALARMS.

Total number of fires and alarms, 5-4 for fires in town, 1 to the at Rockingham Junction.

#### FIRE RECORD.

Diatement of details of fires and alarms, losses and manance. The amount of losses given and insurance paid are as reported to the Clerk of the Board of Engineers by insurance agents and owners of property damaged or destroyed.

FRIDAY, April 19, 1895. Call for assistance received at 6 P. M. from Rockingham Junction, for fire in depot there. Tiger Engine, with company and supply of ladders, were at once ordered to fire. The depot was destroyed, but the fire company rendered valuable assistance in saving surrounding buildings.

FRIDAY, May 10. Fire alarm was rung in at 2.10 A. M. for fire in a large pile of rubbish in rear of house occupied by Thomas Jones, on South street. In six minutes from time of alarm Tiger Hose Company had a stream on the fire, which was quickly extinguished without damage to buildings.

SATURDAY, Nov. 9. Fire alarm was rung in at 12.45 A. M. for fire in farm buildings owned by Patrick Ryan, on Bayside road. The department responded promptly, Granite Engine, No. 2, arriving first at fire, but on account of lack of available water supply and the great headway the fire had attained on their arrival, the house and barn (which were connected), with nearly their entire contents, were destroyed. Value of buildings, \$3000; insurance on same, \$2000. Value of contents of buildings, \$1500; insurance paid on the contents of buildings, \$1500; insurance paid on the contents of buildings.

Damage to building, which was quickly extinguished. Damage to building, insurance paid on same, \$53. Damage to contents, which insurance paid on same, \$25. The fire seemed to have originated between the walls of the building, but from what cause could not be determined.

#### REDUCTION OF FORCE.

On April 1, 1895, Tiger Engine Company, No. 1, organized in 1852, and Granite Engine Company, No. 2, organized in 1858, were disbanded by vote of the Board of Engineers, and the force of the department was reduced from 87 officers and men to 49, which will result in a saving of about \$300 per year in the pay of the department.

When a fire occurs outside of hydrant limits hosemen will act as enginemen.

#### NEW FIRE STATION

The old Tiger Engine House, which for a long time had been in a most wretched condition, has, during the past year received extensive repairs and alterations, and is now practically a new building. Tiger Hose, Newmarket Hook and Ladder and Tiger Engine are now quartered there. Before the alterations were made the house was only large enough for the Hose Company and apparatus. Some place had to be provided to accommodate the Hook and Ladder truck and Tiger Engine, which are now provided for.

The alterations have been expensive, as more than thirty tons of ledge had to be removed. The work has been thoroughly and substantially done, and the station is now a sedit to the town, being equal if not superior to any fire department station of its size in this vicinity.

## TEIAL OF HYDRANT SYSTEM AND NEW FIRE APPARATUS.

On Saturday, March 2, 1895, notice was received from Gen. O. A. Gibbs, President of the Newmarket Water Works Company, that 43 hydrants of the 50 contracted for by vote of the town, would be ready for trial at 4.05 g clock P. M. of that day, and an Engineers' call was rung in. Tiger Hose Company was ordered to the hydrant near the Congregational Church and Granite Hose Company to the hydrant near No. 5 mill gate. In four minutes from the time call was rung in the Hose Companies had arrived at their hydrants, had laid 800 feet of hose and had six streams on, throwing from 75 to 80 feet perpendicular streams, which was considered remarkably quick time, considering the very bad traveling and the fact that a rain and snow storm was in progress at the time. The time made by Hose Companies is given below:

Engineers' call rung in at 4.05 P.M., apparatus at their stations with doors closed. Tiger Hose Company, No. 1, arrived at hydrant near Congregational Church in 1 minute 40 seconds. Granite Hose Company, No. 2, arrived at hydrant near No. 5 mill gate in 2 minutes 5 seconds. Tigers had two streams on in 2 minutes 30 seconds; three streams on in 3 minutes 45 seconds. Granites had two streams on in 3 minutes 20 seconds; three streams on in 1 minutes.

The hydrants in other parts of the town were then tested, and all were found to be in good working condition, with satisfactory water pressure. On Exeter street, with 100 test of hose on hydrant and using a 1½-inch Callahan shut-off mosele, a horizontal stream was thrown over 200 feet. On Main treet, with 150 feet of hose, using a 1-inch plain in the continuous thrown to the top of the spire on the Congregation of Church

On Saturday, May 4, the seven hydrants needed to complete the system of 50 hydrants having been put in, they were tested by Hose Companies and found satisfactory.

#### STATE BOARD OF FIRE UNDERWRITERS.

Our Fire Department and hydrant system was inspected by representatives of the State Board of Fire Insurance Underwriters on Tuesday, March 26. The Hose Companies were called out and six streams were put on on Main street. The Underwriters expressed themselves as satisfied with the hydrant system and the Hose Companies, but recommended the immediate purchase of a Hook and Ludder truck, with full equipment; also that the Hook and Ladder Company be increased from 10 to 20 men or to have the truck hauled by horse power, and that one dozen hand chemical fire extinguishers be carried on the truck. The Underwriters were shown a picture and description of the Hook and Ladder truck which the Board of Engineers had recommended to be purchased by the Selectmen, and they said it would be satisfactory, but if a cheaper one was to be purchased they would wait and see what it was before making any reduction in insurance rates here.

The Hook and Ladder truck and equipment recommended has been purchased, and the town now has a complete outfit of modern hydrant service fire apparatus which is first-class in every respect, and has been so rated by the Insurance Underwriters, who have placed this town in the same class as the cities of Concord, Manchester and Portsmouth, with insurance rates the same for the same class of buildings. The truck has been called out but twice by fire alarms since its arrival, but the promptness of the driver on those occasions proved that he may be depended upon to get there every time.

Each of the fire companies is allowed to have five substitute members to take the place of regular members absent or sick. Substitutes are elected by the companies and appointed by the Board of Engineers. Substitutes are paid for their services by their principals.

#### TIGER ENGINE, NO. 1. GRANITE ENGINE, NO. 2.

The hand engine: have been overhauled and cylinders repacked, and they are now in fair condition. They require continual tinkering and repairing; they are of little use, but are a continual expense. Granite, No. 2, is owned by the Newmarket Manufacturing Company. This department has no further use for it, as the whole force available to send on duty out ade hydrant limits is only sufficient to man Tiger

Inguie and the Hook and Ladder truck. The equipment of engine is 1000 feet of 2-inch hose, 2 hose reels, 5 play papers, 3 lengths of suction hose. All in fair condition except hose reel of Tiger Engine.

The 1000 feet of 2-inch hose of hand engines is now available for use on hydrants, Mr. A. J. Nichols, Agent of the Newmarket Manufacturing Company, having presented the department with two reducers to use for that p rpose, and also kindly made his Hose Company of 20 men and 1000 feet of hose available for a third fire alarm, which makes the total force of department available for third alarm three Hose Companies and one Hook and Ladder Company, with 69 officers and men, 4000 feet of hose, 20 play pipes and full equipment of hooks and ladders.

### NEWMARKET FIRE ALARM.

The Congregational Church bell will be the fire alarm bell for the town. Key of church at George L. Dearborn's drug store, B. F. Haley Company's clothing manufactory and Joseph B. Bennett's livery stable. To give night alarm, arouse the night watchman at the B. F. Haley Company building, or in Joseph B. Bennett's livery stable, who will ring in alarm, which will be the rapid, continuous ringing of alarm bell until the town is thoroughly aroused. Day alarms will be given in the same manner. The rapid, continuous ringing of the bell on No. 2 mill of the Newmarket Manufacturing Company will indicate a fire on that corporation, and will at

once be followed by the ringing of the fire alarm bell.

Tiger Hose, No. 1, Granite Hose, No. 2, and Newmarket Hook and Ladder Co. will respond.

#### SECOND ALARM.

All substitute and call firemen will report to their stations. Stewards of stations will see that all reserve apparatus except hand engines is forwarded to fire.

#### THIRD ALARM.

Call for assistance from the Newmarket Manufacturing Company's Hose Company.

A second or third alarm will be rung only by order of the Chief Engineer or officer in command at fire. A third alarm will be rung only in case of great danger.

#### ENGINEERS' CALL.

Three rapid strokes of alarm bell, repeated three times (if necessary call will be repeated). Hose Companies and Hook and Ladder Company will at once report, with apparatus, in front of Town Hall or Congregational Church and wait for orders.

If, for any reason, the fire alarm bell cannot be rung, either of the other church bells may be rung for a fire alarm.
