## ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

### Chief and Clerk of Fire Department.

NEWMARKET, N. H., Feb. 15, 1898.

TO THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET:

In compliance with the law requiring the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department to make an annual report to the town containing a list of all the apparatus used for the extinguishment of fire, the condition of the same and the amount expended for repairs, the following report is respectfully presented.

#### FORCE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The regular force of the department consists of 46 officers and men, as follows: A chief and three assistant chief engineers, two hose companies of 16 men each, and one hook and ladder company of 11 men. Each company is allowed five substitute members, who are paid by their principals when acting as substitutes, but who respond as call firemen on a second alarm of fire, when they are paid by the town. By courtesy of Agent A. J. Nichols of the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., the hose company of 20 men belonging to the Newmarket Manufacturing Co. will respond to a third fire alarm, making a total force of 81 officers and men available for fire duty, all of whom are subject to monthly out-door drill except in winter. The companies are well officered, are under good discipline, have made very quick time and done excellent service at fires during the past year, as will be seen from the fire record of the Clerk of the Board of Engineers.

## FIRE APPARATUS.

The fire apparatus, a list of which follows, is all in good condition and ready for service. The equipment of the two hose companies is: two Gleason & Bailey hose carts, chain winding reels, each with a capacity of 700 feet of hose; 2000 feet Climax knit rubber-lined hose; 1000 feet Paragon hose; 8 flexible play pipes; 4 solid play pipes; 4 Callahan shut-off nozzles; 2 single hydrant gates; 3 Siamese connections; 21 Taber spanners; 6 hydrant wrenches; 18 hose and ladder straps; 4 firemen's lanterns; 4 torches; 2 fire axes; 2 crow-bars; 3 reducers; 18 fire hats; 10 coats; 4 pairs rubber boots.

Newmarket Manufacturing Co. Hose Company, (3d alarm): 1500 feet hose; 6 play pipes.

Equipment of Hook and Ladder Company: One Gleason & Bailey steel frame truck No. 2; 1 45-foot East Somerville extension ladder; 1 26-foot, 1 25-foot, 1 24-foot and 1 18-foot single ladders on truck; 1 pull-down hook, chain and rope; 4 hand hooks and poles; 2 crotch poles; 2 fire axes; 2 pick-head sledges; 2 crow-bars; 12 rubber buckets; 4 firemen's lanterns; 1 signal lamp; 1 13-inch gong. Reserve ladders—2 30-foot, 1 25-foot and 3 roof ladders.

Tiger Engine, No. 1, has been overhauled and is in good condition for service outside hydrant limits. When needed for such service it will be manned by firemen from hose companies.

## WATER SUPPLY.

There are 51 hydrants in the hydrant system, which are leased from the Newmarket Water Works Company at \$40 per year for each hydrant. The water supply is by gravity pressure from a stand-pipe, with an estimated capacity of 220,000 gallons, located on Great Hill, at an elevation of 175 feet above the level of Main street at the Town Hall; also by direct pumping from the "Blake" pumps of the Water Company, with a capacity for pumping two million, three hundred thousand gallons in twenty-four hours, which, on an

claim of fire, are at once started by a turbine water wheel. The gravity water pressure per square inch (pumps not working) taken April 14, 1897, by a representative of the New Hampshire Board of Fire Underwriters, was as follows: Hydrant near Congregational church, 80 to 90 lbs.; Exeter street, 50 to 60 lbs.; Station 1, N. F. D., 76 to 80 lbs.; Station 2, N. F. D., 68 to 75 lbs.; High School Building, (high-point in hydrant system), 60 to 70 lbs. Sixty pounds is considered a good working pressure for fire purposes. Supt. Harvey of the Water Works Co. has kept the hydrants in good condition and the service has been first-class in every respect.

## FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The Stevens electric fire alarm system in use was installed last April, and extended in October by the addition of two fire alarm boxes, two gongs, and about one mile of wire. The system cost in all \$1111.76, \$800 of which was raised by a firemen's fair held for that purpose by the members of the fire department. \$150 was donated by Agent A. J. Nichols of the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., and the balance, \$161.76, was paid by the town. The system consists of tower bell-striker in tower of Congregational church; two 18 inch fire alarm gongs, (one on outside of each fire station); one 6-inch gong at the residence of the Chief; one 6-inch gong at Kent's livery stable; two private tappers for firemen, and 11 non-interference pull street fire alarm boxes. The battery is at Geo. L. Dearborn's drug store, and in his charge. The lines, boxes and gongs are in charge of the Engineers. The system has never failed to work when needed for an alarm, and saved both insurance companies and property owners at the fire at Hallsville, July 6th last, more than double the entire cost of the system. The system should be extended to Hallsville and the private hydrant of the Newmarket Water Works Co. there located, which made it possible for the department to extinguish the fire of July 6th, should be accepted by the town.

FIRE RECORD.

Statement of details of fires and alarms, losses and insurance, as reported to the Clerk of the Board of Engineers by property owners and insurance agents.

APRIL 17, 1897. At 12.05 A. M. box 34 was pulled in. Tiger Hose Co. and Hook and Ladder Co., No. 1, arrived at box in seven minutes from time of alarm; Granite Hose arrived three minutes later. No fire was found. At 12.20 A. M. box 45 was pulled and the department had another long run for nothing, both alarms proving to be false.

MAY 10. Fire alarm at 3.45 P. M. from box 34, for fire in the house of Andrew Jackson on Exeter street. Department arrived at fire in five minutes from time of alarm. Fire was quickly extinguished. Damage to building, \$125; no insurance on same.

JUNE 22. Telephone call from Rockingham Junction received at 6.30 P. M. Out-of-town alarm then rung in and department assembled at quarters. Tiger Hose Co. was or-

dered to Junction, and in 17 minutes from time call was rung in arrived at Junction, a distance of two miles, and had a stream on. The call was sent by permission of the Board of Engineers, to test the efficiency of the department.

JUNE 23. Alarm from Box 21 was rung in at 5.20 P. M., for what was supposed to be a fire in the residence of Allen Pride, on Central street. Department arrived in three minutes, but their services were not required. No damage.

JUNE 24. Alarm from box 21 at 4.56 P. M., for fire in waste box of No. 6 mill of the Newmarket Manufacturing Co. Tiger Hose Co. laid 450 feet of hose, and with the hose company of the Newmarket Manufacturing Co. had water on in three minutes. Granite Hose Co. and Hook and Ladder Co. arrived promptly, but their services were not needed. The fire was quickly extinguished, and the all-out signal rung in at 5.12. Damage on same, \$30.00. Insurance paid, \$30.00.

JULY 6. Box 45 pulled in at 12.41 P. M., for fire in John W. Wiggin's buildings at Hallsville. Tiger Hose Co. and Hook and Ladder Co. arrived at fire in seven minutes; closely followed by Granite Hose Co. Five buildings were on fire when the department arrived, but by the hardest kind of work the large house and barn were saved. Three streams were put on from the hydrant belonging to the Newmarket Water Works Co., by the aid of the Siamese connections. Damage, \$1000.00. Insurance paid, \$365.00.

JULY 7. Alarm from box 63 at 8.45 A. M., for fire in a tenement house on the North Side owned by the Newmarket Manufacturing Co. Granite Hose Co. arrived at fire in five minutes, closely followed by Tiger Hose and Hook and Ladder companies. Fire quickly extinguished. Damage, \$10.00. Insurance paid, \$10.00.

OCTOBER 17. Box 7 pulled at 3.10 P. M., for brush fire near the residence of James R. Smith, Shackford's Hill. The fire was quickly extinguished without damage to buildings.

JANUARY 19, 1898. Fire was discovered at 4.30 A. M. in the saloon of Alex. Robarge. No alarm was rung in, the fire being extinguished with a few pails of water. Damage, \$10.82. Insurance paid, \$10.82.

### DIRECTIONS FOR RINGING IN AN ALARM.

When a fire breaks out the person discovering it should immediately run to the box *nearest the fire*, break the glass in the front of the small key box which is on the side of the fire alarm box, take out the key, which is attached to a chain, unlock the fire alarm box, open the door and pull down the hook *as far as it will go*, then let go the hook. Stand by box to direct the firemen. Don't pull in an alarm for a fire seen at a distance or out of reach of the hydrant system, but notify some member of the department, who will give the proper alarm.

*Second Alarm, 8 blows*, for reserve apparatus and call firemen.

*2 blows after fire alarm* indicates fire all out.

2-2-2 Out of town fire; companies assemble at stations and await orders.

3-3-3. Engineer's call; companies report, with apparatus, in front of town hall and await orders.

4-4-4. Call to Newmarket Manufacturing Co.'s hose company for assistance.

U. S. Observatory standard time, by Western Union Telegraph, one blow at 12.30 P. M., daily.
