ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Chief and Clerk of Fire Department.

NEWMARKET, N. H., Feb. 16, 1901.

TO THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET:

In compliance with the law requiring the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department to make an annual report to the town containing a list of all the apparatus used for the extinguishment of fire, the condition of the same and the amount expended for repairs, the following report is respectfully presented.

FORCE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The regular force of the department consists of 49 officers and men, as follows: A chief and three assistant chief engineers, two hose companies of 16 men each, and one hook and ladder company of 12 men, and driver for hose wagon, No. 3. Each company is allowed five substitute members, who are paid by their principals when acting as substitutes, but who respond as call firemen on a second alarm of fire,

when they are paid by the town. By courtesy of Agent A. J. Nichols, of the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., the hose company of 20 men belonging to the Newmarket Manufacturing Co. will respond to a third fire alarm, making a total force of 69 officers and men available for fire duty, all of whom are subject to monthly out-door drill except in winter. The companies are well officered, are under good discipline, and they always do excellent work whenever called into service.

FIRE APPARATUS.

One hose wagon, capacity 1,000 feet hose; 2 play pipes; 2 axes; 1 3-gallon chemical extinguisher. Wagon is arranged to lay one or two lines of hose at once, as may be desired. One double runner hose pung of same capacity of hose wagon. Two Gleason & Bailey hose carts, chain winding reels, each with a capacity of 700 feet of hose; 2,000 feet Climax knit rubber-lined hose, 200 feet Franklin knit rubber-lined hose (new), 1,000 feet Paragon hose; 8 flexible play pipes; 4 solid play pipes; 4 Callahan shut-off nozzles; 2 single hydrant gates; 3 Siamese connections; 21 Taber spanners; 6 hydrant wrenches; 18 hose and ladder straps; 4 firemen's lanterns; 4 torches; 2 fire axes; 2 crowbars; 3 reducers; 18 fire hats; 14 coats; 4 pairs rubber boots.

The apparatus is all in good condition, and ready for service, with the following exceptions: Four lengths of Climax hose leak slightly. The 1,000 feet of two-inch Paragon hose is eight years old; three or four lengths leak some, but the remainder is in fair condition.

One Gleason & Bailey steel frame truck No. 2; 1 45-foot East Somerville extension ladder; 1 26-foot, 1 25-foot, 1 24-foot and 1 18-foot single ladders on truck; 1 pull-down hook, chain and rope; 4 hand hooks and poles; 2 crotch poles; 2 fire axes; 2 pick-head sledges; 2 crow-bars; 12 rubber buckets; 4 firemen's lanterns; 1 signal lamp; 1 13-inch gong. Reserve ladders—2 30-foot, 1 25-foot and 3 roof ladders.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The Stevens electric fire alarm system was installed in 1897. It consists of a tower bell striker in the tower of the Congregational church; 2 18-inch electric mechanical gongs, one on outside of each fire station; one 6-inch gong, at Kent's livery stable; one 6-inch gong, at the residence of the chief, and 12 street fire alarm boxes. The system, during the past year, has well manifested the reputation of previous years, never having been found out of order when needed for an alarm of fire.

EXTENSION OF FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

Agreeable to the vote of the town at the last annual town meeting, the fire alarm system has been extended to Hallsville, and box 41 has been located near the water works pumping station. One hundred and fifty dollars was appropriated for the work, which required two and one-half miles of tripple-braid, rubber-covered wire for the lines, which were strung on Boston & Maine telegraph poles to cemetery road, and from that point to box 41 new poles were set. The work was done by members of the department, the poles being all painted white and they present a neat appearance.

WATER SUPPLY.

There are 51 hydrants in the hydrant system, the property of the Newmarket Water Works Co., which the town at the last annual town meeting voted to buy at an appraisal to be made by the Supreme Court. The water supply is by gravity pressure from stand pipe on Great Hill, at an elevation of 175 feet above Main street at the town hall. The capacity of stand pipe is estimated to be 220,000 gallons. The pump of the water works is of the "Blake "pat-

tern, with a capacity for delivering 2,300,000 gallons of water in twenty-four hours. The gravity water pressure from the standpipe with the pumps not working is as follows: At hydrant near Congregational church, 80 to 90 lbs.: Exeter street, 80 to 92 lbs.; station 1, N. F. D., 76 to 80 lbs.; station 2, 68 to 75 lbs.; high school building (the highest point in the hydrant system), 60 to 70 lbs. Sixty pounds pressure is considered a good working pressure for fire purposes.

REPAIRS.

The hook and ladder truck, the paint-work of which had begnu to show evidence of hard service through which it has passed, has been touched up and varnished, and some minor repairs have been made to other apparatus, everything being kept in first-class condition. Two hundred feet of new fire hose has been purchased to take the place of 200 feet of damaged hose, and at least an equal amount of new hose should be purchased the coming year.

EFFICIENCY OF THE DEPARTMENT.

While there has been eleven fires and alarms in this town during the past year, the records of the clerk of the Board show the total fire loss to have been but \$569.00, while the amount of property saved is many thousands of dollars. No stronger proof of the efficiency of the department could be asked, nor do I believe that any department in this state can show a better or cleaner record than that made by the officers and members of the Newmarket Fire Department during the past year.

FIRE LOSSES AND INSURANCE.

Total number of fire alarms, 11. Number of false alarms, 1. The total amount of fire loss was \$569.00. Amount of insurance paid on loss of property damaged or destroyed, \$569.00.

FIRE RECORD.

APRIL 8, 1900. Box 45 was rung in at 7.30 A. M., for a fire in the soap factory owned by Mrs. Emma Auger. On arrival, the soap house was a mass of flames. Twelve hundred and fifty feet of hose was laid from the pumping station, and the adjoining buildings were saved from total destruction. Loss ou soap house, \$300.00; insurance paid, \$300.00. Loss on barn, \$250.00; insurance paid, \$250.00.

MAY 12, 1900. The out-of-town call was sounded by Chief W. H. Small at 3 P. M., for what was represented as a fire at Rockingham Junction. Hose 3 was manned and sent to the scene of fire. On arrival it was found that the fire was beyond the town line and in a grove of pines in the rear of the railroad restaurant, but a strong wind was blowing towards the buildings. The firemen soon had it under control, and at four o'clock were back in quarters.

May 14, 1900. Still alarm. A chimney fire was reported in the stone building belonging to the Benjamin Mathes estate, and occupied by C. E. Tuttle as a cigar manufactory. The chemical extinguisher was used with good success, and the danger from flying sparks was soon averted.

JULY 10, 1900. Box 7 was pulled in at 3.50 P. M., followed by box 12, resulting in a mixed alarm, which made it hard to locate the fire, which was found to be in a grove of pines on premises owned by Mrs. Emma A. Young. As the fire was within reach of the water system and dangerously near the house of Mrs. Young, lines of hose were run out and streams turned on the fire. After a half-hour of hard

work, the fire was got under control. The fire caught from sparks from an engine on the B. & M. R. R. Damage to growth, \$11.00; paid by railroad, \$11.00.

August 11, 1900. Box 7 was pulled in by Joshua Shepley for a brush fire on land owned by the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., near Little Diamond bridge, from sparks from an engine on the B. & M. R. R. Damage very slight.

August 18, 1900. Still alarm. A slight blaze was discovered in a shed owned by the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., situated on the corner of Central and Spring streets, which was promptly put out by buckets of water. Damage very slight.

AUGUST 23, 1900. Still alarm. At 2.05 P. M. sparks caught on the roof of the blacksmith shop occupied by Lewis Walker, burning a small hole in the roof, but was soon put out by buckets of water and garden hose. Damage very slight.

AUGUST 29, 1900. An engineers' call was sent in at 2.40 P. M., for a large brush fire on lot owned by Joseph Chapinan, near the Walter Wiggin barn, on the Bay road. Firemen were despatched in teams, and by hard work in blinding smoke, kept the fire from reaching the barn, which was filled with hay. After two hours' work, the fire was checked and men were left to watch it, and it broke out the next day, but was stopped without any call on the department. As the growth had been cut off, the damage was light.

SEPTEMBER 18, 1900. Box 21 was pulled in at 10.05 P. M. for a small blaze in the saloon of Joseph Dorr, caused by the ceiling being overheated by a lamp. The department responded promptly, but on arrival found that the fire had been put out by Mr. Dorr. Damage was so slight no claim was made.

OCTOBER 4, 1900. At 3.40 A. M. one blow sounded on striker. The engineers assembled near station 1, and determined at once that the trouble was at the battery station, and on going there found, that a short circuit had been made by one of the zines becoming eaten off, thus creating a dead line. The damage was repaired at once and the board again retired.

OCTOBER 16, 1900. Box 7 was pulled in at 5 P. M. for a chimney fire located in a tenement house owned by the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., situated on Nichols Ave. Hose 2 soon had the roof well wet down and on arrival of the H. and L. Co., ladders were soon run up. The extinguisher was used with good results, and the fire was soon out. No damage claimed.

January 7, 1901. At 5.05 P. M., a dense smoke filled the rooms over the post office, occupied by Dr. Beaudet. A call was sent in from the battery station for Hose 3, which resulted in calling out the whole department, but the fire was not allowed to break out. It was located in a partition near the floor, and was thought to have been caused by rats, a large nest being found near by. Damage, \$8.00; insurance paid, \$8.00.

DIRECTIONS FOR RINGING IN AN ALARM.

When a fire breaks out the person discovering it should immediately run to the box nearest the fire, break the glass in the front of the small key box which is on the side of the fire alarm box, take out the key, which is attached to a chain, unlock the fire alarm box, open the door and pull down the hook as far as it will go, then let go the hook. Stand by box to direct the firemen. Don't pull in an alarm for a fire seen at a distance or out of reach of the hydrant system, but notify some member of the department, who will give the proper alarm.

Second alarm, 8 blows, for reserve apparatus and call firemen.

- 2 blows after fire alarm indicates fire all out.
- 2-2-2. Out of town fire; companies assemble at stations and await orders.
 - 3-3. Hose 3 call. For chimney fires, etc.
- 3-3-3. Engineers' call; companies report, with apparatus, in front of town hall and await orders.
- 4-4-4. Call to Newmarket Manufacturing Co.'s hose company for assistance.
- U. S. Observatory standard time, by Western Union Telegraph, one blow at 12.30 P. M., daily.

Hook and Ladder Co. and Hose 3 will answer all box calls.

Hose 1 will answer boxes 12, 21, 32, 34, 45 and 49, with apparatus.

Hose 2 will answer boxes 5, 7, 21, 63, 65 and 82, with apparatus.

This makes work for the collector in the early spring, a time when we like to have a brief respite from the tax gatherer. Whatever balance exceeds that sum in the treasury at the date of the town meeting, may be deducted from the usual appropriation.
