TO THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET:

In compliance with the law, requiring the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department to make an annual report to the town, the following report is respectfully submitted.

FORCE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The regular force of the department consists of a chief and two assistant chief engineers, two hose companies of 16 men each, one hook and ladder company of 12 men, and a driver for hose wagon No. 3. Each company is allowed to have five substitute members, who, when acting as such, are paid for their services by their principals when acting as substitutes, making a total force of 49 officers and men available for fire duty, all of whom are subject to monthly out-door drill except in winter. The companies are well officered, are under good discipline, and the service done by them at fires during the past year would be creditable to any fire department.

## FIRE APPARATUS.

One hose wagon, capacity 1000 feet hose; three play pipes; two axes; two three-gallon chemical extinguishers; wagon is arranged to lay one or two lines of hose at once, as may be desired; one double runner hose pung of same capacity as hose wagon; two Gleason & Bailey hose carts, chain winding reels, each with a capacity of 700 feet of hose; 2500 feet  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch rubber-lined hose; 1000 feet 2-inch rubber-lined hose; nine flexible play pipes; four solid play pipes; six Callahan shut-off nozzles; two single hydrant gates; two two-to-one Siamese connections; one one-to-two Siamese connection; 32 spanners; seven hydrant wrenches; ten lanterns; four torches; two crowbars; 12 shovels; five hoes; four fire axes; eight coats; 18 fire hats.

The Gleason & Bailey steel frame truck, No. 2, carries one 45-foot East Somerville extension ladder; one 26-foot, one 25-foot, one 24-foot and one 18-foot single ladders on truck; also one pull-down hook and chain and rope; four hand hooks and poles; two crotch poles; two fire axes; two crowbars; two pick-head sledges; 12 rubber buckets; four firemen's lanterns; four pairs of boots; one signal lamp; one 13-inch gong.

Reserve ladders, one 30-foot and one 25-foot, and two roof ladders. The apparatus is all in good condition and ready for service.

## FIRE ALARM.

One 12-inch steam chime whistle; one 2000 lb. bell and striker; two 18-inch gongs; two 6-inch gongs; twelve fire alarm boxes; seven miles of wire, and the proper amount of battery to sustain the same.

The line was inspected in the fall and put in as good condition as possible for the winter. The fact that the system of alarm has always been found in working order

when needed is a great source of satisfaction to the Board of Engineers, the superintendent of battery, the firemen, and citizens in general.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

We have been very fortunate in the past year in having only three fires, that were extinguished very promptly by the department, with a total loss of only \$1,425.00, fully covered by insurance.

The Board of Engineers have spared no pains this year to bring the department to the highest state of efficiency. We have bought one dozen smoke-protectors, which allow the firemen to work in the densest smoke without injury. We have also painted hose 1, 2 and 3, bought four lanterns, repaired the roll in No. 1 hose house, to give greater capacity for drying hose. We have also bought a new stove for hose house, the other proving too small. We had an emergency brake put on the hook and ladder truck, as it was very hard to hold on a hillside. About two years ago the town had a bill of damages to pay, caused by the ladders slipping ahead, and the driver being unable to hold the truck back, the sharp points on the ladders injured the horse quite seriously.

The incoming Board of Engineers will probably have to buy about 300 feet of hose, as some of the hose is getting quite old.

There has been some comment on the slowness of our horse-drawn apparatus in getting to the fires. We have to get our horses from Mr. Kent's stable, which is quite a distance from the hose house, consequently considerable time is lost getting them brought down and hitched up. There seems to be no way to remedy this at present. I have always recommended that the town own a pair of horses, enlarge the hose house and keep them there, also let the driver sleep in the house. The horses could be worked on the



streets during the day and would pay for their keeping. There has been considerable opposition to this. The main objection is that it would not pay. I maintain that if outsiders can afford to own horses to let to the town, that the town can afford to own them for their own use.

I have one more suggestion to offer, if the horse question does not meet with approval. I have noticed that a great many cities and towns are putting in motor-driven apparatus. About all of the cities and towns of any consequence have one or more pieces and they all speak very highly of them on account of the celerity of starting and getting to fires. They start instantly and some of them are capable of making forty miles an hour, four times faster than any horse-drawn apparatus, and the manufacturers claim they will go through quite deep snow. I have a testimonial from the chief of the Springfield fire department, where they have just spent \$20,000 for new motor apparatus, and they will spend \$40,000 more in the near future. They claim that the cost of maintenance is nothing compared to horse-drawn apparatus, and the promptness in getting to fires is remarkable. The chief says that in a small town, with a few fires, the distance traveled would be only one hundred or so miles a year, compared to a city department or private vehicles, that travel three thousand to five thousand miles per season. The repairs would be practically nothing. Where we now pay \$60.00 per year horse hire and \$50.00 for drivers, the cost would be but a few dollars a year for gasoline and oil, or practically nothing for motor apparatus.

To my associates on the Board of Engineers and to the officers and members of the fire companies, I hereby express my high appreciation of the promptness in responding to alarms and the cheerful manner in which you attended to your duties at fires.

### DIRECTIONS FOR RINGING IN AN ALARM.

When a fire breaks out the person discovering it should immediately run to the box *nearest the fire*, break the glass in the front of the small key box which is on the side of the fire alarm box, take out the key, which is attached to a chain, unlock the fire alarm box, open the door and pull down the hook *as far as it will go*, then let go the hook. Stand by box to direct the firemen. Don't pull in an alarm for a fire seen at a distance or out of reach of the hydrant system, but notify some member of the department, who will give the proper alarm.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT SIGNALS.

*Second alarm, 8 blows*, for reserve apparatus and call firemen.

*2 blows after fire alarm* indicates fire all out.

2-2-2. Brush fire. Report to the Fire Warden at Station 1.

3-3. Hose 3 call. For chimney fires, etc.

4-4-4. Call to Newmarket Manufacturing Co.'s hose company for assistance.

U. S. Observatory standard time, by Western Union Telegraph, one blow at 12.30 P. M., daily.

Hook and Ladder Co. and Hose 3 will answer all box calls.

Hose 1 will answer boxes 12, 21, 32, 34, 41, 45 and 49, with apparatus.

Hose 2 will answer boxes 5, 7, 21, 63, 65 and 82, with apparatus.

## ORGANIZATION OF FIRE DEPARTMENT.

### BOARD OF ENGINEERS.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

---

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF NEWMARKET:

I have the honor to submit for your consideration the annual report of the schools of Newmarket.

The term of my supervision has been so short at this writing that a detailed report covering the past year is impossible. I have found many features of the school work here that are deserving of commendation; it is, however, true that in Newmarket, as in any and all towns, there yet remains chance for improvement.

If the schools are to be successful in training the child through physical, moral and intellectual development to an understanding and an appreciation of right living and to a realization of the requisites of honest and efficient citizenship, a full and complete co-operation of the school officials, the teachers and the individual citizens of the community is the first essential.

Upon the shoulders of the school officials rests the direct administration of the affairs of the schools. This is a serious responsibility and one that requires deep thought and conscientious endeavor on the part of those on whom it rests. The immediate return in dollars and cents for the money spent for the maintenance of the schools is hard to determine; it is, however, unquestionably true that there is no

public investment that returns as large a dividend as does the money spent for educational purposes in doing its part to develop self-supporting and independent citizens; and the returns increase in proportion as the school authorities receive the assistance and support of the community for whom they labor.

"As is the teacher, so is the school," is an old saying, but it is as true to-day as when first uttered. The time was when about the only requirement a teacher need have was some influential friend or relative to interview the Board for which she wished to teach, in order that she enter the school-room a full-fledged teacher. Fortunate for the teacher, doubly fortunate for the community, and trebly fortunate for the children, this condition does not in general exist at the present time. No person should be allowed to step into the school-room as a teacher of children who has not by training or experience been adequately fitted for the work. It is as true of the teacher as it is of other branches of labor,—the best is by all odds the cheapest in the end.

The citizens as individuals and as a whole are very apt to lose sight of the fact that they are, in a measure, personally responsible for the character of work being done. It is only when the patrons of the schools, realizing this responsibility, work hand in hand with those actively in charge, offering information, inspiration and encouragement to the teachers, and loyalty, strength and support to the School Board, that we may hope to make the schools of the greatest worth to the community.

Our children should be developed first as individuals, and second, as members of society. Very little was heard ten years ago about the individual in our teaching or in our methods of instruction. To-day, however, there is scarcely a school-man who is not striving to find some means whereby he may more satisfactorily meet the needs of the individual pupil. School authorities have come to see that



no system of education can sufficiently develop that does not deal directly with the individual child.

We are striving to develop in the minds of our pupils the ability for sound reasoning, to cultivate a spirit of industry and thrift, and to create a desire for accurate and thorough accomplishment that they may be properly prepared to later conduct themselves efficiently and well as members of society and as citizens of the community.

Our aim is to develop the children by a careful study and by the correct treatment of each individual case; therefore it becomes imperative that the closest relations exist between the patrons of the schools and the teachers, in order that the temperament of the child, home conditions, physical conditions, and in fact all other personal characteristics of the individual may be as near as possible an open book to the teacher.

Let us all work together to make the educational advantages for the children of Newmarket inferior to none.

I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers for the quick and ready manner in which they are uniting their energies in the endeavor to improve the efficiency of the schools. The assistance and hearty support I have received from your Board and the interest the citizens with whom I have come in contact have shown in the welfare of the schools are very gratifying.
