STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket qualified to vote in Town affairs:-

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To elect by ballot such trustees as are required by Chapter 162, Laws of 1915.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to pay each member of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

Art. 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to sprinkle, oil, re-surface or repair the macadamized streets.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended under the direction of the Civic Department of the Woman's Club, for the purpose of keeping the streets clean of refuse.

Art. 6. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for concerts by the summer band.

Art. 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for state and county taxes ; to build and repair highways and bridges ; to provide means for extinguishment of fires ; to support the schools ; to maintain the public library ; to decorate the graves of soldiers ; to care for the cemetery ; to light the public streets and buildings ; to pay the town officers ; to support the poor ; to pay bonds and interest on the town debt ; and to defray all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to extend the water works through Lamprey street to connect with the house lots of Mrs. Oliver P. Sanborn.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of ten years any new mill which the Newmarket Manufacturing Company may build during the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see if the Town Meeting will instruct the Water Board to place meters on every supply pipe to all water taken through the system ; also to purchase all meters now unused at the true value and appropriate such amount of money as may be necessary therefor.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer on Exeter street to the buildings belonging to Mrs. Francena Elkins.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to lower the grade of the road on "Hope's Hill," so-called, on the Epping road, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

DIRECTIONS FOR RINGING IN AN ALARM.

When a fire breaks out the person discovering it should immediately run to the box *nearest the fire*, break the glass in the front of the small key box which is on the side of the fire alarm box, take out the key, which is attached to a chain, unlock the fire alarm box, open the door and pull down the hook *as far as it will go*, then let go the hook. Stand by box to direct the firemen. Don't pull in an alarm for a fire seen at a distance or out of reach of the hydrant system, but notify some member of the department, who will give the proper alarm.

Second alarm, 8 blows, for reserve apparatus and call firemen.

2 blows after fire alarm indicates fire all out.

2-2-2. Brush fire. Report to the Fire Warden at Station 1.

3-3. Hose 3 call. For chimney fires, etc.

4-4-4. Call to Newmarket Manufacturing Co.'s hose company for assistance.

Three blows at 8 A. M. and 1 P. M. indicates no school in public schools.

U. S. Observatory standard time, by Western Union Telegraph, one blow at 12.30 P. M., daily.

Hook and Ladder Co. and Hose 3 will answer all box calls.

Hose 1 will answer boxes 5, 7, 12, 21, 32, 34, 41, 45, 49 and 82, with apparatus.

Hose 2 will answer boxes 5, 7, 12, 21, 63, 65 and 82, with apparatus.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

NEWMARKET, N. H., Feb. 15, 1917.

TO THE HONORABLE SCHOOL BOARD OF NEWMARKET:

Gentlemen: Herewith is submitted my annual report as superintendent of your schools, which report is the third I have had the honor to submit, and the fourteenth in a series of similar reports since you first adopted the supervisory district plan.

On another page you will find tabulated, the membership and attendance statistics for the school year, 1915-16. The new form of the register prevents me from giving the same statistics for the fall term of this school year, but the following is the membership of your schools at date. Corners, 17; North Side, 36; South Side, Grade I, 42; Grade II, 42; Grade III, 39; Grades II and IV, 42; Stone School, Grade V, 34; Grades VI and VII, 39; High School, Grade VII and VIII, 42; High, 51; total 384. This total is a little larger than the reports for the several years past show were enrolled in your schools. These pupils are classified by grades as follows: Grade I, 79; Grade II, 54; Grade III, 43; Grade IV, 35; Grade V, 38; Grade VI, 33; Grade VII, 28; Grade VIII, 23; High, 51; total 384.

The following changes have occurred in your teaching force during the past year: Miss Edwina Fox was engaged to fill the vacancy in the High School, caused by the resigna-

tion of Miss Parziale. Miss Mertie Ham was hired for the North Side School in the place of Miss Madeleine Doe, resigned. Mrs. Carpenter was transferred from the Plains, where the school was closed, to Grade III, in the South Side School, this vacancy being caused by the resignation of Miss Payson. Miss Saunders has returned from her leave of absence.

The School District should be commended for the generous appropriation which was voted for repairs at its last meeting. With the exception of the North Side and the Corners School, all the buildings are now in good repair, and as well equipped with modern facilities as buildings of their age can be fitted. What little repairs need to be made on the two exceptions noted, can be done without any special appropriation. However, a sufficient sum should be voted for general repairs, if we are to keep the buildings in good condition all the time. The old adage, "a stitch in time saves nine," is especially applicable in the case of any public building, and its furnishings. Fresh paint and bright varnish greatly deter the adult or the child from any act of vandalism, and make such acts readily detectable.

The last edition of the program of studies for elementary schools issued by the state, provides for the six-two-four distribution of grades, namely, six years of elementary work, two years of junior high, and four years for a secondary school. A new program of studies for the secondary schools is to follow, based on the preparation which these junior high schools will furnish. This re-arrangement of the school work is not confined to this state, but is a nation-wide movement. Such a re-organization of public school work has been a prominent subject for discussion in educational publications and councils for more than a decade. The adoption of this new plan with various points of differentiation has received, during the last year or two, great impetus, and it is a matter of only a few years, or perhaps months, before it will be the rule and the old eight-four plan the exception. It is even now too

late for us to be in the van in inaugurating this new order, but we should be making our plans that we may not trail too far in the rear.

There is not space here to enter into a discussion of the reasons for making this re-arrangement of the school work and grades, farther than to say that it has been argued on physiological and psychological grounds, and is also justified because of its prevocational characteristics, and whatever may be the merits in the case the plan has received the endorsement of the educational world.

This new arrangement calls for a junior high school; and a junior high, to be accredited as such, will have to include instruction in both manual arts and domestic arts. To provide for a domestic arts course at the present time might furnish considerable difficulty. A manual arts course could probably be established without great difficulties. In the basement of the high school building there is a room which could easily be made suitable for the purpose. The equipment would not be a large item of expense and it is probable that some arrangement might be made with the State College for instruction in this work, which would not call for a large expenditure in salaries.

Through the efforts of the teachers and the pupils of the various schools a phonograph and a few records have already been secured by the South Side school. This is but one instance of a movement to secure these machines for school use, which is not only pretty general throughout the country, but quite specifically so in the towns and cities of this immediate vicinity. This movement has arisen from a feeling that the most valuable part of the musical education of the child, the cultivation of his musical tastes, has not been provided for in our schools. There is little if anything that we can do in the public schools in the music line which could prove utilitarian to the extent of contributing to the economic independence of the individual. Whatever the form of musi-

cal instruction our school may assume, it will still be true that but a small fraction of one per cent. of our pupils will likely, if ever, use his musical education for monetary profit. However, a thorough appreciation of the beauties and grandeurs in high-class music, is perhaps as desirable as is an appreciation of those same qualities in literature, and will reveal to the child a field of enjoyment which is to the great majority of us a closed book. In this there is an end worthy of our effort to attain. We should use this instrument, and any other which may be secured, for the cultivation of the child's music appreciation. The censorship in this department should be as strict as the censorship in our literature studies.

Though there is plenty of opportunity for improvement in our schools I feel that for the past year the work has been, and at the present time is being done in a very satisfactory manner. My opinion is based more on frequent applications of standardized tests, which are supposed to measure both the relative and absolute attainment of the pupils, than on casual impressions. The standing of our graduates in the State College for the past semester is also decidedly to our credit.

Thanking the board for their support and the teachers for their co-operation, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES.

Circulation for the year, 15,600 volumes; of these, 980 were non-fiction. One hundred and eighty-eight books were added to the library, and with the assistance of the library committee of the Woman's Club subscriptions were paid for twelve magazines.

The social work has been an important feature. Games have been provided and the library rooms opened every afternoon during the cold weather, making a pleasant and comfortable retreat for children at close of school, until the home-coming of the parents from work. Classes in English and sewing have been formed among French and Polish girls, under the general superintendance of the Librarian. Attendance, 50 to 75 in the afternoon; 75 to 150 evenings.

Books are circulated every day and evening.
