THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to vote upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year, including one selectman for the term of three years.

Art. 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration, and town hall; for Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, the fire department, moth extermination; and Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, town maintenance, the building and repair of sidewalks, street lighting, and general expense of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including decoration of soldiers' graves; for Cemeteries; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for New Construction and Improvement, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payment, including the payment of notes and bonds; for Payments to Other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes; and to pay all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to pay firemen, laddermen and hosemen twenty-two dollars in addition to that required by law.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for a town or district nurse.

Art. 6. To bring in your ballots upon the question as to whether the amendment proposed by the Convention to revise the Constitution shall be approved.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the sale of liquor for medicinal purposes.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to enable the Board of Water Commissioners to build a suitable filtering plant, the above mentioned loan and interest thereon to be paid by the earnings of the Water Works.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair of the town hall.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars for the purchase of a chassis on which to mount Hose Wagon Number 3.

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

January 31, 1923.

To the School Board of Newmarket:

The boys and girls of Newmarket are worthy of the best schooling we can give them. They will grow up to face conditions of working and of living far different from those we had to face. There will be keen competition. Whether they work in the mill or at other occupations, they will have to compete with people most of whom have had the advantages of a first-class education. We cannot afford not to give our boys and girls the best teachers and the best schools we are able to provide.

It is becoming increasingly difficult except in the larger places to get good teachers. During the last spring and summer we scoured the state and invaded Vermont, Maine and Massachusetts in the effort to find qualified teachers who would be willing to teach in Newmarket. The Normal Schools are not training enough teachers to meet the demand and would have to make a teacher out of one in every three of our high school graduates in order to meet the yearly need of trained teachers. Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey, realizing for some years that they could not supply all their own schools, have increased salaries and invited the cream of the teaching force of New England to come in. Our problem is to make teaching in Newmarket so attractive that the best teachers will be willing to come to Newmarket and stay with us. The high percentage of changes during the past few years indicates that we have not solved the problem.

Good teaching is a highly technical matter that has been largely developed and vastly improved in our generation. It is no longer to be regarded as a simple, single process that any one can carry out, but as a multitude of different processes for each one of the studies to be taught, including dozens in arithmetic, several in spelling, more in reading, and numerous others in writing, geography, history and the other studies. Each one of these processes requires a background of psychological knowledge and an understanding of child nature that only the trained and experienced teacher possesses.

The good teacher who understands her business, who can train minds and not spoil them, is worth a great deal to the community. She should be paid accordingly. Last year throughout the state, the average salary of women teachers in elementary schools including rural schools was \$915 and in secondary schools was \$1156. The federal report for June, 1922, gives the median salary of teachers in village schools of three rooms or more as \$900 for Maine and New Hampshire; \$1100 for Massachusetts and Rhode Island; \$1200 for Connecticut and New York; and \$1400 for New Jersey. This means that most of the teachers in schools like ours in neighboring states are receiving higher salaries than we pay.

At present teachers in Newmarket have nothing definite to look forward to in Newmarket. The adoption of the proposed salary schedule accompanying this report, providing for class B elementary teachers a minimum of 900 and on recommendation of the superintendent an annual increase of 50 up to 1000; for class A elementary teachers a minimum of 1000 and a similar increase to 1200; for class B high school and junior high school teachers a minimum of 1050 and on recommendation of the headmaster and of the superintendent an annual increase of 50 up to 1200; and for class A high school and junior high school teachers a minimum of 1200 and a similar increase up to 1200, or some similar schedule is needed if our schools are to have and retain good teachers. Teachers are much more likely to remain where they know what is in store for them. A trial of this schedule for three years, will, I believe, convince all citizens of its value. A carefully graded classification of teachers and salary schedule will give teachers an incentive to excel in their work and to study to increase their knowledge and improve their methods.

The anticipated congestion in the grades was avoided this year, but new accommodations must be provided for a combination third and fourth grade. As the six grades on this side are normally filled, the primary school on the north side provides an extra class that must be taken care of each year in a higher grade. The accompanying table shows the enrollment for January, 1923:

The four room high school building built in 1874 is entirely inadequate for the number of pupils attending. Additional seating capacity should be provided as well as more recitation rooms. Classes now have to be held in the cooking room, science laboratory and typewriting room, none of which are suitable. This leaves for recitation and class work only the book-keeping room and the two study rooms. The latter are filled with pupils. Many classes have to be taught with sixty or more pupils in the room, which is certainly too many for good work. The congestion already appears to be detrimental to the pupils. If an addition were built to relieve it, I believe a great improvement in high school work would follow.

The enrollment at the North Primary School indicates that it will be needed in that location for some years. In that case would it not be well to provide better toilet facilities for the small children? As several of the old time desks in the primary buildings are becoming badly worn, I should like to recommend that an appropriation be made to provide one room each year with adjustable school furniture suited to the size of the children.

In spite of the wish for improvement that I have with regard to every school in the Union, I recognize the need of scrutinizing expenses carefully. Yet I cannot see where any of the school money provided for the current year is being spent needlessly or is being squandered. I think Newmarket people may well have confidence in the School Board and depend on them to conserve the interests of the town as well as to promote the well-being of the schools.

The cordial friendliness extended to me by the people of Newmarket is highly appreciated. The friendly counsel of the School Board and the loyalty and devoted service of faithful teachers have made the year's work one of increasing satisfaction.
