## SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

## Report of Superintendent

## To the School Board and

Citizens of Newmarket:
The past year has been successful. The teachers in the grade schools have proved their worth and are again serving you faithfully. It was found necessary to add a teacher in the Primary School and Miss Eleanor Evans is assisting in the first grade.

Some changes were made in the teaching force of the High 'School and Mr. Vincent Gatto was secured as the Principal. Mr. Gatto's friends were glad to welcome him back, and great confidence is expressed that under his able leadership the school will enjoy an era of prosperity. Mr. Jesse Pellerin is the new sub-master, Miss Eleanor Batchelder, teaches the Science and Mathematics, Miss Bernice Poor has Domestic Arts and French, and Miss Helen Malloy has the Junior Mathematics and English.

The above shows that there are 19 more pupils registered this year than last. Some of the rooms are crowded with too many pupils for the teacher.

## REPAIRS

The old high school rooms were painted during the vacation and a part of the new high school was fitted with slate black-boards. The furnace at the primary school is reported to be unfit for use beyond this year and provision should be made to replace it with a new one. The furnace in the new high school building has always given trouble and something should be done to make it more efficient. The athletic field at the new high school has been graded and a good infield has been made. The outfield is still needing more grading.

The Junior High school idea is still being worked out and there needs to be more effort put in to achieve the ideals of the originators of the Junior High school idea in our school. During the 7th and 8th grade periods there should be more opportunity given to explore the new paths opening before the pupils entering these grades. The idea is to determine in what particular activity the pupils will be most successful and choices should be afforded to the pupils so that after a trial of some branch of education the teacher and pupils can determine whether more time should be devoted to the particular study, or some other study should be substituted for the one first chosen. The pupil should soon learn that any kind of an education requires work, but
that there is the incentive held up that good work is sure of adequate reward. With our teaching force it is not possible to afford a wide field of choices and another teacher should be provided.

Probably the strongest appeal of the Junior High school is that it trains the pupil to a full and worthy use of leisure time. It is the ability to use time that otherwise would be wasted for the pleasure and profit of others as well as for the pleasure and profit of the individual.

This ideal has been worked out to a degree heretofore not attempted in the Newmarket schools. Musical clubs, athletic clubs and debating clubs have been organized and very commendable progress has been made. A prize speaking contest was successfully carried out during the fall term.

With the introduction of more and more labor saving machines, people are bound to have more and more leisure, and it is necessary that young people shall be taught how to use this leisure time to secure pleasure and profit. I believe that leisure without proper and worthy employment is a curse instead of a blessing, and many of the things now offered to fill in this time are unworthy and worse than useless.

The Union District, No. 12, decided to employ a school nurse and Mrs. Anna Clow was elected to the position. During the fall term she made 135 visits to the Newmarket schools and 150 visits to homes in Newmarket for the purpose of consulting parents about physical defects of their children. She received 120 calls at the office from pupils needing attention. She examined 277 of the pupils and assisted Dr. Towle with 60 vaccinations. She accompanied 14 pupils to consult some doctor and went with six to the dentist. She also accompanied one child with its mother to Dr. Jones' clinic in Manchester.

Mrs. Clow has proved her worth and we are very sorry she cannot continue her good work among us, but the sad
accident by which she lost her two children decided the question and she does not feel able to return.

The Senior High school carried out its ambitious desire for a trip to Washington, and eleven of the class took this interesting and educational trip. On June 16 twelve pupils were graduated and of these six entered New Hampshire University and four others went to other institutions of higher education.
