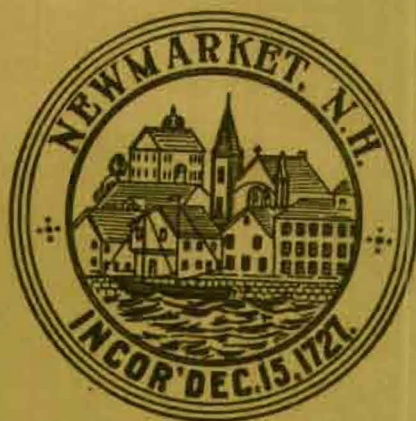

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To elect by ballot for the term of three years one trustee of the town's trust funds.

ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers expenses, election and registration, and town hall; for the protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments, including the payment of notes and bonds; for Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes; and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first.

ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to purchase two trucks for use in the highway department.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to repair the so-called Durham Side bridge and approaches thereto.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

Several changes in personnel are worthy of mention. Mr James N. Pringle became Commissioner of Education September 1st, succeeding Commissioner Ernest W. Butterfield, who accepted a similar position in the state of Connecticut. Commissioner Pringle was formerly Deputy Commissioner and is well known throughout the state by all persons connected with the schools. He has visited the schools of Newmarket within a year, as have Agents R. H. Leavitt, P. E. Farnum, C. H. Dustin, R. J. Mitchell, Miss E. M. Murphy and Miss L. M. Norton of the State Department, inspecting various phases of school work. Mrs Charlotte H. Gallant retired from the School Board at the end of the year amid many expressions of gratitude and esteem from parents and teachers for her generous and untiring efforts on behalf of the schools. She was succeeded by Mrs Anna I. MacDonald, well known as local librarian, who was elected for a term of three years. Miss Martha Patten became school nurse for Newmarket and a group of towns in this vicinity. Miss Alice Wienbeck of Lowell, U. of N. H. '30, came to take charge of the departments of Home Economics and Physics at the High School. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Molloy has been filled by the election of Miss Katherine Kennedy of Somersworth to teach in the High School. We were fortunate in having so few teacher changes.

The Stone School is not being used this year. The two sections of Grade V were combined under one teacher and housed in the Central School, which also contains Grade VI. Several of our teachers went to Summer School at their own expense for further training. Miss Saunders, Miss Farley, and Miss Flanagan attended the University of New Hampshire, while Miss Locke and Miss Young attended the University of Vermont. It is noteworthy that all our

teachers have been under professional instruction within five years. This record shows a good professional spirit and cannot help being reflected in the schools in a beneficial way.

As the public schools call for a considerable share of the town budget, and as the official valuation of Newmarket has recently decreased, it is natural that there should be a renewed interest in school costs. A recent local investigation shows that the school budget for the present year shows a decrease of 1.2 cents of the "town dollar" spent for all purposes. Six out of the 16 accounts listed show an increase in the percent of the town dollar spent, the increase amounting to 2.1 cents of the town dollar. Three accounts are the same as last year, while the schools are one of seven town accounts to show a decrease in cents of the town dollar spent. The saving of 1.2 cents on the town dollar made by the schools was nearly all saved on current expense items. The five other town current expense accounts which decreased show a total savings of .6 cent on the town dollar. In other words the schools saved twice as much as all other current expense accounts put together in cents of the town dollar.

Last year the School Board paid all bills and in addition paid \$2055.66 in notes and bills left over from previous years. Moreover, \$5,000 was paid on the principal of the bonded debt, together with \$3,628 interest on the same.

Major repairs and alterations were made and paid for, amounting to \$3516.74 and the Board closed the fiscal year with \$1,521.98 in the school treasury.

There is encouragement in the fact that our buildings now appear to have been put into good repair for some time to come. By the end of this fiscal year, two-fifths of the bonded debt will have been liquidated, leaving the balance to be paid in twelve years more. Meanwhile the interest on this debt is decreasing from year to year.

In considering school costs, we should consider *current cost* especially, or the actual expense of running the schools for a given year, as distinct from debt, interest, and permanent improvements. The fraction of the town dollar of 1929-30 represented by the current school costs of 1929-30 is 28 cents.

Is Newmarket spending too much for its schools? The best way to find this out is to compare the *per pupil* costs, item by item, with the average per pupil costs in the state at large. The following table does this.

Total current costs per pupil are seen to be much less than the state average, and total costs per pupil somewhat less than the state average.

Are our schools spending more and more, or less and less in Newmarket? The expenditure for last year was \$47,032.65. The budget for the present year is \$41,000, a saving of \$6,032.65, or 13%. Furthermore, the budget for next year, which is about to be presented to the district meeting, represents a further cut of nearly 3%, so that the budget for next year is nearly 16% less than the expenditure for 1929-30. These decreases will still further reduce the per pupil costs for this year and next. The recent trend of school costs in Newmarket is sharply downward. The

limit to which the budget can be reduced is seen in the legal requirements for standard schools: "*A standard school* is one maintained for at least thirty-six weeks in each year, in a suitable and sanitary building, equipped with approved furniture, books, maps, and other necessary appliances, taught by an approved teacher, directed and supervised by an approved superintendent, with suitable provision for the care of the health and physical welfare of all pupils." Pub. Stat. 117:20.

Is Newmarket spending more according to its ability than other towns? Only 35 towns in the state, out of a total of 244, spend less per \$1,000 of valuation on the current cost of public education for 1929-30. The exact figure for Newmarket was \$6.54. Why then does Newmarket spend more cents on the town dollar for all school costs than the average of the state? The answer is:

1. Newmarket is paying for a new, fireproof building, and so is under a heavy expense for the time being. The average town is not doing this.

2. Schools are a necessity of civic life. Families in moderate circumstances are bound to spend a greater portion of their income on the necessities of life, and so it is with towns. There are countries where more is spent on the results of non-education, ignorance, poverty, disease, crime, and extortion, than we spend for education.

3. In a period of depression there are some projects that we can put off until later. But the children are always with us. They must be cared for and educated in schools that are kept up to the level of efficiency.

After all, what enterprise in the community is more important, or more worth sacrificing for, than the schools?

In conclusion, I wish to thank on behalf of the district all persons and organizations that have co-operated with the schools in any way, and they have been many. During the previous year, Headmaster Wright, Submaster Ricciardi, and Mr Henry Jones several times used their cars without expense to the district for transporting groups of pupils to out-of-town interscholastic contests, and their action is

only typical of many instances of good-will shown by teachers and citizens over and above the call of obligation.

I transmit herewith the roll of perfect attendance for the year.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Following is the annual report of the Headmaster of the High School:

Enrollment

On Feb. 10, 1930 there were 185 pupils enrolled in the Junior and Senior High Schools. On Feb. 10, 1931, there were 198 enrolled in the same schools. Thus there is an increase in enrollment of 13 pupils over last year (1929-1930). The following table gives the details of the 1930-1931 registration:

Last year there were 36 pupils who left school, whereas this year we have lost but 16. The difference is accounted for by the fact that last year 17 pupils moved out of town, while this year but 3 have been lost from this cause. This would seem to indicate that Newmarket's school population was again becoming stationary. The following reasons were given by pupils for leaving school:

Of the 198 pupils now enrolled, 110 are girls and 88 are boys. In the Junior high school there are 57 girls and 39 boys, while in the Senior high school there are 53 girls and 49 boys.

Program of Studies

Due to the fact that but four of the High School girls elected the Home Economics Curriculum this year, it has been dropped from our Program of Studies until there is a demand for it. Home Economics is required of the Junior high school girls and Manual Training of the Junior high school boys.

The Academic (College Preparatory), Commercial, and General Scientific Curricula are offered this year. Following is the enrollment in each by classes:

The General Scientific Curriculum emphasises the scientific subjects and requires no foreign languages.

If the High School continues to increase in enrollment, the time is not far distant when an additional commercial teacher will be needed.

Teachers

There were but two changes in the staff from last year. Miss Charlotte Peaslee was succeeded by Miss Alice E. Wienbeck of Lowell, Massachusetts. Miss Helen M. Molloy's position was first filled by Mr Charles M. Smith of Laconia, but he found it necessary to resign in November, and since that time Miss Molloy's position has been filled by Miss Katherine Kennedy of Somersworth. Our Cadet teacher has been sent to us each term by the University. Mr James McCann cadeted the first term and Miss Faith Meader will fill this position until the end of the second term. These cadets are both graduates of the University.

A great many times during the year I am asked the question: "Who teaches such and such a course?", hence I feel that it might be worthwhile to include in this report a list of the courses taught by each teacher and the enrollment in each course.

Four of our full-time teachers are graduates of the University, one is a graduate of St Rose College in Albany, N. Y., one of Salem and Plymouth Normal Schools, one of the four-year course at Plymouth Normal School, and one of Dartmouth College. Three of the staff have started their graduate work for an advanced degree and one has completed graduate work and received the degree of Master of Arts.

Noon Lunches

Inasmuch as we dropped the Home Economics Curriculum from the high school program of studies, and inasmuch as it is impossible for the Junior high school girls to prepare these lunches, it was necessary to engage someone outside of the school. Accordingly Miss Jessie Wentworth was engaged for this purpose. Miss Wentworth serves hot soup, chowder or something else warm each

noon to approximately 20 children at the cost of \$.05 per day. The total cost of this project is covered by the price charged for the lunch.

Extra-Curricular Activities

School Bank. In co-operation with the Newmarket National Bank, the Senior Office Practice class operate a school bank for the purpose of caring for all funds belonging to different classes and other school organizations. The sum of \$2,080.14 was deposited in this bank last year by the various school organizations. All money is withdrawn by check, and each check must bear the signature of the treasurer of the organization drawing the check, the signature of the cashier of the bank and the signature of the Headmaster. This arrangement has proved to be efficient and practical. It also provides excellent practice for the senior commercial pupils.

Assemblies. An attempt has been made to bring before the pupils representatives of several different professions and vocations, with the purpose in mind of presenting to the pupils the opportunities offered in each profession or vocation. The following have spoken before the student body this year:

The original selling price of this machine was nearly \$500.00, but Mr James Pollard was able to secure it for us for the sum of \$150.00. It had been used very little before being put into service at the high school. Nine subjects have been shown to date, which total 17 reels. The only cost in connection with the showing of these subjects is the transportation to and from Boston or New York. This averages about \$.70 each way or \$1.40 per subject.

Athletic Association. Nearly 100 pupils are members of the N.H.S.A.A., having paid fifty cents as a membership fee, in return for which they are admitted five cents cheaper than non-members to all high school athletic contests.

To date our basketball teams have enjoyed a very successful season, both from the point of view of being victorious in their contests, and engendering good relations with other high schools in this vicinity. It might be well to say at this point, that the School District does not subsidize any teacher's salary for coaching. Any coaching that is done, meager as it may be, is done with no anticipation of financial reward. The Athletic Association wishes to thank the town for the use of the Town Hall for their basketball games.

In conclusion I wish to express my personal appreciation to the high school staff for their faithful and conscientious work during the past year; in no case has there been any lack of honest effort or co-operation. To any other individual or organization in Newmarket that has helped to make the last year and a half a pleasant experience, I wish to express the same measure of appreciation.
