

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To elect by ballot for the term of three years one trustee of the town's trust funds.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes; and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.
- ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1932.
- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.
- ART. 7. To bring in your votes for the election of delegatesat-large, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, alternate district delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to accept the terms of Chapter 155 of the General Laws of New Hampshire, approved May 6, 1931, entitled, "An Act relating to observance of the Lord's Day," whereby no permission shall be given for public dancing or horse racing or prize fights during any part of that day; or games of baseball, football, hockey, or any games, sports or exhibitions of physical skill to which admission is charged or at which donations are accepted to be held earlier than one o'clock in the afternoon, or the opening of theatrical or vaudeville performances or motion pictures earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of said day.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

This is a year of civic celebrations. Our schools have co-operated with the United States George Washington Bicentennial Commission in several ways. Colored portraits of the "Father of his Country," presented by Congress, have been hung in every building. A committee of teachers was appointed to organize the observance in the schools. This committee included Headmaster Wright, chairman, Miss McCooey, Miss Locke, and Miss Young. They have been preparing a program consisting of original features presented by all the grades. Scores of young pine trees, furnished by the State Forestry Department, have been planted on the grounds of the High School as a part of a nationwide project honoring Washington. In connection with this project, the high school grounds in front of the building were adorned with shrubbery, according to a plan furnished us by Professor Hepler of the University of New Hampshire, an expert in landscape architecture, to whom the thanks of the people of Newmarket are due.

Our schools also participated in the activities of the New Hampshire Daniel Webster Commission by distributing commemorative medals in honor of this distinguished son of our state, who was born one hundred and fifty years ago.

Information in regard to all phases of High School work is given in the report of Headmaster Wright, which is submitted herewith. The list of teachers in grades I-VI is the same as last year.

Two teachers, Miss McCooey and Mr. Ricciardi, attended Summer School last summer. Others are planning to go during the coming season. This shows a good professional spirit. A list of professional books available at the superintendent's office has been furnished to each teacher, and many such books are in circulation. Since the beginning of the year, Mr. Ricciardi has been giving special assistance in physical education in the primary and intermediate grades. This is work for which a separate full-time physical director has to be employed in many communities. This service has proved most valuable in the upper intermediate grades in demonstrating the value of orderly play, developing ideals of sportsmanship, and bridging the gap between the lower grades and the high school.

Drimany School

In the report of last year, I treated at some length the subject of school finance, comparative costs, and the trend of school expense in Newmarket. This year a reduction of $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ in the proposed budget compared with last year speaks for itself. This makes a total reduction of over 25% compared with three years ago. Last year a public meeting was called by the School Board for discussion of the budget in advance of the district meeting. The discussion at that time was free but harmonious, and was felt to be so worth while that the Board has called a similar gathering this year. Exhibits of Junior and Senior High School work were viewed on these occasions.

The meetings under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher Association have also proved valuable in acquainting the public with the work and ideals of the schools. Pupils from both the elementary and the high schools have furnished exhibits and programs for some of these meetings.

In times such as we are passing through, it seems to me that the educational system has some unusual responsibilities. They are:

- 1. To administer the public funds with unusual economy. This does not always mean that a decreased total expenditure is wise or possible. However, in Newmarket, a sharp decline in this regard has already been commented upon. Some of the helpers who will aid in making a slender budget cover as many activities as possible are manufacturers and business firms who pass along decreased prices, school officials who administer affairs with unusual scrutiny, pupils and teachers and parents who co-operate in the economical use of the school plant and supplies, and reasonable consideration by those in the community who furnish goods or services to the schools.
- 2. To minister to the health and happiness of the children. In many homes the pinch of depression may be severe enough to affect the health or spirits of the children. A more alert watch must be kept for signs of physical impairment. The work of the school nurse becomes even more valuable than ever. Our school nurses are in a position to discover need and set remedial agencies in motion. Moreover, the depression has its effect upon the spirits of the people also, resulting in apprehension and worry. We must not allow this cloud to cast its shadow upon the children. The school, as well as the home, must be made a place of happiness and good cheer, to counteract the prevalent gloom. This year our school nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, R. N., has charge of all the towns in our own super-

visory union only, resulting in greater economy of time and efficiency in administration. Her report for the school year thus far is submitted herewith.

- 3. To keep boys and girls in school as long as possible, in order that they may be preparing themselves for greater usefulness later on instead of competing in the already overloaded labor market. Our high school has a good record in this regard, having retained over seven tenths of the entering class to graduation last year.
- To emphasize the ideals of Craftsmanship 4. through the fine arts and the practical arts. Unemployment has been brought upon us largely through mass production by machinery. But the public will not be altogether satisfied with the uniformity of standardized There will be an increasing demand for the fine and distinctive output of the handicraftsman. The so-called "frills" of education, leading to an appreciation of music, fine art, and the refinements of life are of powerful economic value in creating this demand for fine workmanship in the future. We can have an overproduction of machine-made goods; but we can never have an overproduction of creative work from real artists and craftsmen. Our manual training department cannot help creating a sense of the value of the arts and crafts, even though it may lead in only a few cases to such occupations as vocations. Its associated course in home economics or domestic arts is especially valuable in times when home must be made attractive on a small margin and when the food dollar must give its maximum of balanced nourishment.
- 5. To prepare for the return of prosperity. There was never but one depression which did not result in prosperity, and that is this one. Those sections of the country which have been able and determined to maintain education unimpaired will be in the best position to take early advantage of the inevitable upward turn.

Russia is raising the salaries of its school teachers as a step in the campaign for economic supremacy in the world. While private educational institutions are undergoing tremendous expansion from the benefit of their accumulated endowments and enormous gifts from individuals and foundations, society must not allow the public schools to be shorn of features designed for the benefit of the common people, which our democracy has won for itself only in the course of a long struggle.

The Washington celebration reminds us that that distinguished statesman in his Farewell Address said, "Promote, then, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge. In proportion as the structure of a government gives force to public opinion, it is essential that public opinion should be enlightened." To recall pioneer times is to remember that our forefathers established the schools while wrestling with the hardships of the wilderness. With equal prudence and determination, this generation can carry them on.

Herewith is submitted my third annual report as Headmaster of the Newmarket Junior and Senior High School.

Table No. 1 indicates that 233 different pupils have registered in this school between Sept. 9, 1931 and Feb. 1, 1932, that 11 of this number have left school for some reason and that the present enrollment is 222, which is 24 more than a year ago at this time. This condition of increased enrollment is common all over the country this year due to the lack of employment. However a table later in this report shows this growth to be consistent with the growth of this school during the past ten years.

These figures for both years are taken from September to February.

Table No. 2 indicates that fewer pupils have left school this year than last year. There have been fewer pupils' families move away from town than last year and the year before, if discharges from school are an indication of that thing. The total number of pupils leaving school two years ago (1929-1930) was 36, a year ago (1930-1931) 27 were discharged and I would estimate that approximately 20 will leave this year. It is encouraging to note that fewer pupils are leaving school each year. We do however, lose many pupils during the summer vacations.

Table No. 3 shows the number of pupils who were promoted from each grade in June, 1931, and did not enter the next grade the following September. The following reasons were given for not returning to school after the summer vacation in 1931:

It is evident, therefore, from tables 1, 2, 3, that the greatest loss of pupils occurs at the end of the eighth and ninth years. This condition prevails throughout the country, and until the compulsory school age is raised or until school work is made more attractive to the type which leaves, it always will prevail.

Table No. 4 compares the number of tuition pupils in both the Junior and Senior High School for the last three years. While the number of tuition pupils in the Junior High have decreased this year, the number in the Senior High have increased to a new high point, 24. The decrease in the Junior High is probably attributable to the fact that parents do not feel that they can afford tuition this year when the town in which they live supports a Junior High School and is not liable for Junior High tuitions in other towns.

Table No. 5 reveals the fact that our tuition pupils are coming from a wide area surrounding Newmarket. 5 of the 12 graduates in 1930 were tuition pupils. 4 of the 18 graduates in 1931 were tuition pupils. 3 of the 19 in the class of 1932 are tuition pupils.

Program of Studies

No changes were made in the Program of Studies this year except that a full year of Sociology and of Economics are now taught in alternate years in place of a half year of each every year. Later in the report under the paragraph headed: "Prospective Program of Studies for 1932-1933," you will please note a suggested change for next year. No Home Economics was taught in the Senior High School this year because the girls elected work in other curricula. Thus we are teaching the Academic, Commercial and General Scientific Curricula this year.

I would like to call attention to the splendid opportunities offered the girl pupils of this high school in the Home Economic Curriculum. I feel that altogether too many of our girls are enrolled in the Commercial department and that many girls would profit vastly more from work in the Home Economics department. Parents, please study the Program of Studies presented later in this report and be able to give the proper guidance and advice to your children in choosing their course of study! The equipment for teaching Home Economics is excellent and it is regrettable that it lies idle 75% of the time school is in session.

Teachers

There were three changes in the High School staff this year. Miss Edmee Boulanger replaced Miss Kennedy, Miss Bertha Pellerin replaced Miss Mudgett and Miss Marion Wright replaced Miss Phelps. We have been fortunate in securing a cadet who plans to remain throughout the year. Following is a list of teachers arranged in order of length of service in Newmarket schools together with other relative information:

Miss Elizabeth Saunders, appointed 1910, graduated from Plymouth Normal School in 1894 and Salem Normal School in 1904, teaches Jr. High History, Mathematics and General Science.

Miss Mary McCooey, appointed 1928, graduated from University of N. H. in 1926 with A.B. degree, teaches French, Latin and U. S. Constitutional History.

Mr. Murray Wright, appointed 1929, graduated from Dartmouth, 1926, A.B. degree, University of N. H., 1930, M.A. degree, teaches Algebra, Geometry, Sociology, Economics, and Advanced Mathematics.

Mr. Richard Ricciardi, appointed 1929, University of N. H., 1928, B.S. degree, teaches History of Civilization, Comm'l History and Geography, Chemistry, Physics, Manual Training, and coaches all sports.

Miss Doris Cate, appointed 1929, graduated Plymouth Normal School, 1929, B.Ed. degree, teaches Shorthand, Typewriting and Bookkeeping.

Miss Edmee Boulanger, appointed 1931, graduated University of N. H., 1931, A.B. degree, teaches Biology, Jr. High English and Mathematics.

Miss Bertha Pellerin, appointed 1931, graduated Keene Normal School, 1929, B. Ed. degree, teaches Jr. High Geography, Home Economics, Junior Business Training.

Miss Marion Wright, appointed 1931, graduated University of N. H., 1931, B.S. degree, teaches Jr. and Sr. High School English.

Mr. Harlan Cleveland, cadet, appointed 1931, graduated University of N. H., 1930, A.B. degree, teaches Chemistry and Bookkeeping.

All teachers hold grade "A" permanent teaching certificates except those three who were appointed in 1931 and they will receive their grade "A" certificate after one year of successful experience in New Hampshire schools.

The Fundamentals

An effort is made to keep the fundamental processes alive. The criticism is often made that high school graduates cannot spell, write, read, do arithmetic, etc., as well as they should after graduating. During the first half of this year specific instruction was given in Place Geography to those high school pupils who were not up to standard in this subject, and during the second half of the present year, instruction is being given to pupils below standard in Arithmetic. The results of this remedial teaching are very gratifying. The fact that pupils are below standard in some of the fundamentals does not mean that they did not learn this material, but rather that it has been forgotten as a result of not having been recalled to mind

often enough to keep it fresh. Hence it is felt that a review from time to time will tend to make the fundamentals a permanent part of the pupils' knowledge.

Deficiencies

Report Cards: At the end of each six-weeks' period during the school year, a report of each pupil's progress in school is sent to the parents in the form of a report card. This card shows the quality of work done during each six weeks' period. Because a pupil receives a failing mark for the third six-weeks' period, let us say, it does not follow that the pupil is failing this course for the year, but simply for the third six-weeks' period.

Warnings: In order that parents may know definitely whether or not pupils are failing work for the year, warnings are sent out to the parents of all pupils who are failing one or more courses. These warnings are sent at the end of every nine weeks and are based upon the pupil's accumulated marks for the year. Thus if a pupil's marks for three six-weeks' periods averaged below 70%, a warning would be sent to that pupil's parents that he was failing that particular subject for the year to date. Parents are encouraged to have conferences with the headmaster and teachers and to suggest ways and means of stimulating interest in the pupil toward school work.

Personal Letters are sent from the headmaster's office when the occasion requires a personal contact.

The Class of 1931

Eighteen boys and girls were graduated June 18, 1931. This was the largest class to have been graduated from Newmarket High School, with the exception of the class of 1929, in the past ten years. Following was the class roll:

At the present time these graduates are occupied in the following ways: Keene Normal School, 1; Mc-Intosh Business College, 1; Symnes Arlinton Hospital, 1; Exeter Hospital, 1; Newmarket Advertiser, 1; Store Clerk, 2; Secretarial Work, 1; Office of Newmarket Manufacturing Co., 1; At Home, 8; Married, 1.

Extra-Curricula Activities

School Bank: Three years ago the School Bank was organized to care for the funds belonging to the various school organizations. This bank is operated by the Senior Office Practice class and has proven itself to be a safe, efficient and practical way of caring for the \$2,000 and more that passes through it each year. All money received in the School Bank is deposited in the Newmarket National Bank under the title "Newmarket High School Joint Account." The School Bank gives each of its depositors monthly statements.

Assemblies: Student speakers and student programs have taken up the time of our assembly periods this year. Each senior is asked to give a short talk before the school as a part of the graduation requirements. For the most part these talks have been carefully prepared and well delivered. The motion picture machine has been used frequently and several very excellent reels have been shown. These reels are some-

times shown in the evening so that the children from other schools in town may attend with their parents.

Athletics: Interest in basketball has grown during the past three years while the opposite is true in the case of baseball. We are unable to collect enough money at a baseball game to pay for the new ball used in the game. Many people attending the games flatly and rudely refuse to contribute any financial support to the team. We are able to collect an admission to the basketball games and this has become the financial support of baseball. The \$100 appropriation for athletics and the small profits made on basketball games have enabled us to purchase some new equipment, pay all of our bills and maintain a small balance. Our teams have enjoyed success from the point of view of winning and engendering good relations with other schools. The boys and girls of the high school have often expressed their appreciation of the fact that they are allowed to use the town hall.

Dramatics and Class Functions: The townspeople have been very generous in their support of school functions. Dramatic productions, school dances, and parties have been well supported and have made it possible for the boys and girls to enjoy the social side of school life. As a whole, I feel that the school plays and parties have been carefully planned and well executed.

Washington Trip: The wisdom of asking the people of Newmarket to finance the Washington trip this year was questioned, but inasmuch as the class had several hundred dollars in their treasury at the start of the year and inasmuch as the cost of the trip has been materially reduced, it was decided to allow the present senior class to carry their plans through to a conclusion. However, the question of the present Junior class going to Washington next year is highly

debatable and must receive serious consideration before permission is granted.

Hot Noon Lunches were discontinued this year because of the fact that there was no demand for them.

Fire Drills are held once a month. The time required to empty the building of all pupils and teachers varies from 45 to 55 seconds. Inasmuch as all stairways, walls and doors are of fireproof construction, there is practically no danger of lives ever being lost in case of fire in the High School building.

"The Howl" is published thrice yearly. Through its columns pupils are given an opportunity to express themselves in prose, verse or editorial.

The Cercle Français meets regularly and its members enjoy worthwhile programs. Membership in this club is limited to pupils in the French classes.

Prospective Program of Studies for 1932-1933

I present the prospective Program of Studies for next year in order that the parents will have an opportunity to study it and be able to better guide their children in the choice of subjects. Although this program has not been adopted by the Newmarket School Board or approved by the State Board of Education, it is reasonable to assume that it will be adopted as here presented:

Changes: There are not more than three post-secondary institutions within a radius of 200 miles of Newmarket which require more than two years of Latin as an entrance requirement. The colleges will. for the most part, accept any modern foreign language. such as French, in lieu of Latin for entrance. Dartmouth requires three years of any foreign language as an admission requirement, the University of N. H. and the state Normal Schools require no foreign languages for admission. The fourth year Latin class in our high school is always small, seldom numbering more than four pupils, and of those who take the full four years of Latin, none will ever have occasion to make use of it either in a practical way or for admission to college, unless the pupil plans to become a teacher of Latin, in which case opportunity to study Latin in college will be

offered. I do not believe that we are justified in teaching year after year, a course for which there is so little demand and need. Hence, I would recommend that the fourth year of Latin be permanently dropped from our Program of Studies.

This study should be interesting to a large number of Newmarket people. I would like to call attention to a new regulation of the State Board of Education which says that a Headmaster shall have no power to excuse tardinesses for any reason whatsoever, and that a pupil who is not in the building when school starts shall be marked tardy in the register of attend-

ance. However, pupils who are transported by the School District and have been tardy because the transporting agent is tardy, but have otherwise maintained a perfect record of attendance, shall be considered as having maintained perfect attendance. Of the 46 tardinesses during the first half of the current year, 27 were due to transporting agents being late in getting the pupils to school. It should be said in justice to the transporting agents, that in every case the tardiness of the transporting agents was due to a legitimate and unavoidable cause.

Conclusion

I have been fortunate in being associated with conscientious teachers and able superiors during my three years in Newmarket, and to them I owe a large measure of appreciation.

During the fall months 741 pupils were given a physical examination. Of this number 50 were vaccinated for small pox after the opening of school.

A heart examination was given to the basketball teams by a physician.

The Health clinic conducted by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association was attended by 28 pupils.

A Dental clinic is being held in the town. Up to date 17 pupils have been cared for and many more are awaiting their turn.

Arrangements are being made for a Tonsil and Adenoid clinic to give pupils an opportunity to have corrective work done at reduced rates.

In the early spring we hope parents will co-operate with us to have every child vaccinated who is to attend school next year. This will eliminate to a great extent the irregular attendance in the fall.

The pupils of the Primary and Central Schools are supplied with milk and encouraged to bring bread and butter sandwiches from home. THE NUMBER OF UNDERWEIGHT PUPILS OF GRADES I-VI DROPPED 50% IN THE FIRST THREE MONTHS. Much credit is due the splendid co-operation on the part of the Parent-Teacher Association in providing means for a milk lunch to the pupils who are unable to buy milk at school, and to those who have taken the

responsibility of one or more children for the school year and also the teachers who see that each child has ample time for lunch .

Total number of treatments at school, 355.

Number of pupils treated by an oculist and fitted with glasses, 3.

The number of home visits made in connection with pupils who were ill or in need of corrective work total 85.

I wish to thank the teachers, Parent-Teacher Association, Woman's Club, Red Cross Chapter and all other organizations or individuals who have helped in any way to guard the health of the school pupils.
