## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To elect by ballot for the term of three years one trustee of the town's trust funds.

ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes; and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1933.

ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

ART. 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:*

During the present year, our schools have been making headway in spite of shortened sail. The inevitable decrease in enrollment was not as great as most estimates had anticipated. The shrinkage in grades I-VI at the beginning of the year was 29.4% and in the schools as a whole 21.8%, while the number attending Senior High School was practically the same as that of last year. We now have more pupils in the Senior High School than the total enrollment of any previous year excepting last year and will graduate a banner class.

On account of the decreased elementary enrollment, the first six grades have been consolidated into four rooms at the Central School, releasing Miss Martha Flanagan and Miss Marguerite Farley, both excellent teachers who had been with us eight years. The latter accepted a position in Durham. A similar reduction in the staff at the high school obliged us to dispense with the services of Miss Edmee Boulanger and any cadet teacher. The number of teachers at the high school is now only one per grade (plus the Headmaster), while the grade teachers are carrying a heavier pupil load than would be tolerated in normal times. The Stone school was used for one term in order to maintain a clear title.

Mr. James A. Boyd, M.A., was engaged to assume the office of Headmaster, succeeding Mr. Murray J. Wright, who resigned to accept a similar position at Woodbury High School, Salem, N. H. Mr. Wright had served Newmarket three years, and had received wide recognition as a progressive and efficient headmaster. We were sorry to lose Mr. and Mrs. Wright from our community affairs. His successor is an experienced headmaster, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with a Master's degree, and has entered upon his duties with enthusiasm and general satisfaction. Mr. Robert Ricciardi, formerly submaster, left to accept a similar position elsewhere. Mr. Harlan S. Cleveland, who had served us as a cadet teacher, became submaster. Miss Mary McCooley again attended summer school.

During the last school year, 707 Newmarket pupils were examined by the school nurse, Miss Margaret MacDonald. She found 733 remediable physical defects, which were duly reported to the parents of the children affected. In 142 of these cases, the defects were corrected. The nurse co-operated in 6 clinics, one underweight, three vaccination, one dental, and one tonsil-adenoid. Another dental clinic is now in progress. Parents or pupils desiring to consult the nurse should notify the teacher.

This year for the first time, we expect to receive George-Reed Federal Aid toward the cost of the Home Economics Department.

Many people think first of the practical arts curricular when they think of economy. The following consideration should be given weight:

1. Domestic Arts, Manual Training, Commercial studies, etc., are not untried innovations. They have been a standard part of education for two generations.

2. Attendance in school to the age of 16 is a legal requirement and is desirable especially in times of labor surplus. We ought to provide a variety of studies suited to the interests, powers, and needs of various groups of pupils.

3. Owing to the large enrollment in practical arts subjects, the per pupil cost of those subjects is considerably less than that of subjects given to a few pupils only. Subjects having a supposed higher cultural value are taken by fewer pupils, many of whom will go away from Newmarket to make a career elsewhere; in most cases pupils taking the more practical

subjects will settle down in the community and give back a return for their education.

4. If any particular subjects are discontinued, others will have to be substituted in their places, in order to make a complete high school course. If all pupils had to take the same courses, classes in many cases would have to be divided.

5. Courses meeting real life needs are more important for a community with limited resources than courses merely designed to impart a tincture of "culture." The dead wood, if any, in our curriculum, is in those branches springing from tradition, rather than those growing out to meet the needs of life.

A recent magazine editorial bewailed the alleged fact that many high schools are beautiful in their appointments, are furnished with recreational facilities, and even (worst of all) have shower baths, "just like country clubs." It never occurred to the author of these sentiments to deprecate a situation where a few favored individuals have exclusive access to privileges of healthy and beautiful living which should be the birthright of the growing youth of our land. It is folly to balance a budget with the ignorance of children, for no child can grow up twice. The president of the United States, before a recent national conference of business men and educators at Washington said:

"Our nation faces the acute responsibility of providing a right-a-way for the American child. In spite of our economic, social and governmental difficulties, our future citizens must be built up now. We may delay other problems, but we cannot delay the day-to-day care and instruction of our children.
