## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the county of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1934.

ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

ART. 7. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99 Section 22, Laws of 1933.

ART. 8. Voted: that the selectmen are hereby authorized to sell either at public auction or private sale to such purchaser and for such price as they may determine any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds, and until such sale is made to administer such property in the interests of the town.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:*

The past year has seen the operation of the National Recovery Act, bringing the federal government to the rescue of the industries and institutions of America. The schools of Newmarket are learning to cooperate with the President by the study of current events from suitably graded material in every grade from the first to the twelfth. The town rejoices in the prospect of local industrial recovery. The progress of the town, however, will doubtless mean expansion in the schools, in order to care for the children of families attracted to Newmarket for purposes of employment or residence. The cooperation of school authorities with the President's "nationwide plan to raise wages, create employment and thus increase purchasing power and restore business" suggests the desirability of restoring the former level of salaries for district officers, teachers, and other employees as promptly and steadily as possible. The American Legion, at its convention in Chicago, passed the following resolution:

*"Whereas*, education is a prime requisite to good citizenship and a thorough program of education is even more essential in troubled times like the present than usual;

*"Resolved . . .* That it is the sense of this organization that education should be given its proper consideration by legislative bodies and should not be made to bear a major part of the sacrifices of economy."

The National Committee for Federal Emergency Aid for Education is proposing various forms of

educational relief for the states to distribute in needy localities. Already Newmarket has benefited by a more extensive milk distribution in the schools, and also by the distribution of health-saving cod liver oil (bottled sunshine) where it will do the most good during the short days of winter. Under the CWA, adult classes have recently been organized in cooking, sewing, arts and crafts, with an enrollment of over 35 members, taught by Mrs. Genieve DeCapot, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire. The same opportunity has been open to any group sufficiently numerous, in any subject whatsoever. Adult education is a coming feature bound to be more prominent in the future, judging from the enthusiastic response of the public in many places. Last year for the first time, the district received George Reed federal aid in Home Economics for approved work in grades IX and X. Miss Pellerin is to be commended for being able to meet the exacting standards required. Federal aid is not a dole, but brings the challenge to a wider and more efficient service to the community. The new industrial codes prevent the entrance of children into the ranks of wage-earners and make it imperative for the schools to provide suitable educational opportunities for "all of the children of all of the people."

Lee, Nottingham, Durham and Newfields are neighboring districts that have entered into contracts with Newmarket at a stabilized rate of tuition, having confidence in the merit of our high school instruction. Our Plane Geometry team placed second in the annual state-wide scholarship contest held at Keene, while the one-act play, "Hallucinations," written by Loretta Brisson and submitted by Newmarket was one of four chosen for public presentation at Laconia in a state-wide contest. Our High School received special mention in the State Secondary Report for attendance. Grades 9-12 having had 97 per cent or over in average attendance for five consecutive years, and Grades 7-8 having maintained this high standing for ten consecutive years. The State Department has also commended the Headmaster for his program of drill in the fundamentals (including arithmetic, spelling, hand writing, and place geography) and for exceeding the state standards in supplementary reading in history. According to this report, Newmarket High School has an average standing over a five-year period in respect to the

college or normal school rank of its graduates compared with those from all other schools of about the same size within the State. During the year the baseball field which has been used by the High School was acquired permanently for the District.

At the last District Meeting, the District took special action to insure the retaining of the school nurse. In addition to the regular work of physical examination and home visitation, Miss MacDonald has had charge of the health measures instituted by the Federal Relief Administration, and has cooperated with the County Relief Office in providing needed clothing. She has also conducted the dental clinics and accompanied children out of town for special treatment. During the outbreak of mild scarlet fever, she has been diligent in making daily examinations and following up suspicious absences. It was necessary to close only one room for a brief period.

In spite of a 6% decrease in the number of pupils (which would tend to raise the per capita cost) the per pupil district expense for running the schools was 40% less than that of last year, and less than the state average.

The continuous decline in costs has coincided with the advance of the depression and has probably reached the turning point. With rising prices due to industrial codes, and the deflation of the currency, the restoration of salary schedules, etc., costs will inevitably increase in moderation. This will be a part of the general national recovery, in which we hope Newmarket will have a generous share. It still remains a fact that it costs three times as much per capita to keep a criminal in prison as it does to send a child to school.

The high school grounds have been improved by the planting of young shade trees at very slight cost. These should later prove ornamental, and useful for shading parked cars. I recommend that the playground apparatus at the Central School be overhauled and put in condition, even if it necessitates erecting a fence around the ground. Through the generosity of the Parent Teachers' Association, dark curtains have been provided for the High School Auditorium, also a multi-stamp for the Central School.

Newmarket residents were saddened to hear of the tragic death of Professor Justin O. Wellman, formerly Superintendent of Schools in this place. The influence of his work still abides, and he is remembered with affection by scores of his friends in this town. Schools were closed as a mark of respect on the afternoon of the funeral, and a delegation of teachers attended the rites at Durham. His passing reminds us that we can do nothing greater or more permanent for mankind than to guide boys and girls in wholesome living within a better age.
