## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions; including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1935.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

7. To see if the town will vote to have band concerts during the summer, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

8. To see if the voters will raise and appropriate the sum of (Two Thousand Dollars) \$2,000.00 for a fire alarm whistle and new automatic batteries.

9. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

10. To see if the Town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as \_\_\_\_\_ and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ \_\_\_\_\_ ; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ \_\_\_\_\_

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

During the past year the longed-for industrial recovery of Newmarket has become a fact, bringing with it the responsibility for a more adequate provision for the increased enrollment resulting in the schools. Doubtless the excellence of the schools in Newmarket has been frequently offered in recent months as one inducement for the settlement of new residents and industries in town. We are fortunate in having classroom facilities ready for the still further expansion necessary in the coming year.

The present enrollment in the public schools is as follows:

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This is an increase of 18% over the total of last year, the increase being wholly in grades I-VIII.

The year 1935 marks the 300th anniversary of the Boston Latin School, the forerunner of the American high school, a division of our national school system that has grown by leaps and bounds in recent years until, in response to public demands, it has become (as much as the elementary school once was) the school for "all of the children of all of the people." In accordance with the announcement of President Roosevelt, suitable celebrations of the event will be held during the year throughout the country.

Last year Newmarket maintained six public schools, with nine women and two men as teachers. There were 405 different pupils registered, of whom 192 boys and 194 girls were not previously registered elsewhere in the state. The schools were actually in session 350 half-days, with an aggregate attendance in half-days of 122,545. The enrollment and average age by grades were as follows: 26 first 6 yrs. 4 mo., 29 second 7-2, 24 third 8-4, 38 fourth 9-6, 32 fifth 11-0, 37 sixth 12-6, 36 seventh 12-11, 35 eighth 14-3, 38 ninth 14-8, 37 tenth 15-7, 24 eleventh 16-11, 27 twelfth 17-5, 3 post-graduate. There were 45 pupils between 5 and 8 years of age, 189 8-14, 86 14-16, 64 16-21, and 2 over 21. The attendance statistics were as follows:

The per cent. of attendance was 96.96.

There were 196 cases of tardiness, but 49 pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the year. There were 13 non-resident pupils in grades 1-8, and 26 in the high school. Sixty-seven pupils were transported at district expense. Nine teachers held permanent certificates, while two held licenses. The School Board held 22 meetings and made several visits to the schools. Other visits included 553 by the Superintendent and 211 by other citizens.

While the examination of the School Nurse, Miss Margaret MacDonald, showed for the most part a healthy condition and normal progress in weight and stature on the part of the pupils, it also disclosed the following defects:

10% underweight .....	70

These conditions were all reported to the homes. Through the co-operation of parents and doctors, 144 of these defects were corrected. The nurse also investigated 82 cases of communicable diseases, making daily examinations when necessary. Five special clinics, including two out of town, were attended by the nurse and pupils, at which 242 treatments were given, including dental work, diphtheria prevention, tonsil and adenoid operations, and prevention of tuberculosis.

During the present year, the sum of \$244.95 was made available by the federal Child Health Recovery Program, out of which six pairs of glasses, 64 dental treatments, and 16 tonsil operations were financed, benefiting both public and parochial school pupils. The federal milk distribution of last year has been

continued, at the rate of some 1900 half-pint bottles per month.
