TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the (L. S.) county of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year, and empower the board of Selectmen to appoint all other necessary town officers.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of persons and property, including the police department, moth extermination and extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state

aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

- 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3 percent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August 1st, 1942.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.
- 7. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$295.51.
- 8. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$130.00 (Petition).
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.

- 12. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal acounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to establish a planning board of seven members, with duties set forth in sections 3-15 inclusive, of Chapter 55 of the Laws of 1935, to make a study of the town's development and report to town meeting appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the town's best development, the board to consist of one selectman and six other citizens appointed by the selectmen, as provided in said Chapter 55 of the Public Laws.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to ratify, confirm and approve the action of the board of Water Commissioners in selling and conveying to the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for \$75.00 a certain right to lay cables under ground.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for its share of the Local Observation Post maintenance.

DIVISION OF MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTING STATE TAX COMMISSION

Concord, New Hampshire

September 24, 1941

Board of Selectmen Newmarket, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

I submit herewith the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Newmarket, which has been made by the division of municipal accounting of the state tax commission in accordance with the vote taken at your annual meeting in March 1941. This audit covers the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, and the current year from February 1 to August 12, 1941.

FINANCES

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: (Schedule A) How the industrial losses suffered by the town of Newmarket during the last decade have seriously affected the financial structure of the town is clearly indicated by this statement.

It will be noted that in the year 1930, (referred to as the fiscal year ended January 31, 1931,) the assessed valuation was \$3,270,000.00, the tax levy a little over \$90,000.00 and the tax rate \$2.68 per hundred as compared to the average rate for the state in the same year of \$2.84. There were no outstanding notes or bonds at that time and the town's fiscal year closed with a surplus of between 12 and 13 thousand dollars.

Ten years later the assessed valuation had dropped to \$1,384,000.00, or a decrease of more than 50 percent; the tax levy had decreased to approximately

\$66,000.00, or 27 percent; while the tax rate had risen to \$4.58, an increase of \$1.90 per hundred or a percentage increase of 42 percent. The average state tax rate in 1940 was \$3.41 or \$1.17 per hundred less than the Newmarket rate. Thus it will be seen that while the town enjoyed a tax rate ten years ago which was 16 cents less than the average, it now has a rate which is higher by \$1.17 per hundred than the average. Furthermore, a bonded debt has been incurred which stood at \$28,000.00 at the close of the last fiscal year, while the "Net Debt" amounted to \$12,330.67 as contrasted to a "Surplus" of approximately the same amount ten years earlier.

A more detailed statement of comparative property valuations over a period of years will be found in Schedule B.

Bonded Debt — Annual Maturities: As indicated by this Schedule, outstanding bonds as of January 31, 1941, amounted to \$28,000.00. These bonds mature in amounts of \$2,000.00 annually until 1954, when the entire issue will have been paid. Annual interest requirements are also shown.

Debt Limit: (Schedule C-1) The bonded debt of the town and the school district is compared to the legal debt limit of each unit in this Schedule. The margin within the statutory debt limit, or borrowing capacity, of the town is indicated as \$13,527.00, and the school district \$12,791.00.

Comparison of Revenues, Appropriations and Expenditures—1940: (Schedule D) The analysis of revenues, appropriations and expenditures for 1940, presented in detail in this schedule, indicates a net excess of actual as compared to estimated revenues of \$9,437.40, a net overdraft of appropriations of

\$2,345.19, with a resulting net budget surplus of \$7,092.21. This, it will be noted, resulted chiefly from the sale of property by the town which has been acquired through tax deeds.

Revised Balance Sheet as of January 31, 1941: Schedule E A revised balance sheet, as of January 31, 1941, has been prepared and is presented as Schedule E. The item "Tax Titles"—\$6,953.88, which was included as an asset item in the balance sheet as originally made out, has been eliminated as it properly should be included in the "Schedule of Town Property" rather than the balance sheet.

The revised balance sheet indicates a current surplus of \$15,669.33 at the close of the last fiscal year, and a decrease in net debt of \$3,731.02.

SELECTMEN'S AND TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS

Vouchers issued by the selectmen during the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, and the current year to August 12, 1941, were examined as were also the supporting invoices and highway agents' payrolls. The cancelled checks of the treasurer, issued upon orders of the selectmen, were compared with the vouchers and found to be in agreement. The receipts of the treasurer were checked by source insofar as it was possible to do so. Totals of receipts and expenditures were verified. The treasurer's cash baak balance as of August 12, 1941, amounted to \$9,678.67. The reconciled bank balance of like date was 34 cents in excess of this amount as indicated by Schedule F.

TAXES

The tax warrants of Collector Bergeron for the levies of 1941, 1940, 1939 and 1938 were audited and summaries of these warrants appear as Schedules G-3, G-4, G-5 and G-6, respectively. The tax sale accounts were likewise audited and a summary of such accounts for the years 1934 to 1939, inclusive, included Schedule G-2.

A summary of all accounts of the Collector, as referred to above is shown in Schedule G. It will be noted that there were balances due on the tax sale and tax warrant accounts amounting to \$2,976.10, and that excess credits had been applied to the levies of 1938 and 1940 in the amount of \$1,663.94. Allowing for an adjustment on account of refund of \$26.00 due on discharge fees. The net balance due the town from the collector on August 20, 1941, was \$1,338.16. The collector had sufficient funds on hand and on deposit in the Newmarket National Bank to cover this amount, as indicated by Schedule G-1.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts of Town Clerk William E. Neal, including the issuance of motor vehicle permits, dog licenses, miscellaneous licenses and permits and collection of town hall rent, were examined for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, and the current year to date of audit. All funds received by the Clerk were accounted for either through remittances to the Treasurer or funds on hand or on deposit in the Newmarket National Bank.

TRUST FUNDS

The securities and savings bank books representing the invested principal and unexpended income of the various trust funds were examined. All funds, as indicated in the trust fund record book, were accounted for. (Schedule I). It is recommended that the trustees of trust funds furnish a surety bond as required by law, the premium expense incident thereto to be paid by the town.

WATER DEPARTMENT

Superintendent: The accounts of the Superintendent, who collects the water rents, were examined. The amount of collections and remittances to the treasurer are indicated in Schedule J.

Treasurer: The receipts and expenditures of the treasurer were audited and the cash book and bank balance reconciled as of August 16, 1941. An excess of \$3.58 in the bank balance was noted. (Schedule J-1).

LIBRARY TREASURER

The record of receipts and expenditures of the treasurer of the library was examined and cancelled checks produced which corresponded with cash book entries. The balance on Aug. 16, 1941, of \$73.05, as indicated by the cash book, was in agreement with the reconciled bank balance. (Schedule K).

TOWN TENEMENT PROPERTIES

A statement of income and expenditures of the agent in charge of town owned properties is included in Schedule L.

TOWN OFFICERS' BONDS

The surety bonds of the town officers were examined and found to be correct in form and sufficient in amount. It is recommended, however, that the superintendent and treasurer of the water department should be bonded. The matted of a bond for the trustees of trust funds has already been referred to.

GENERAL COMMENTS

At the beginning of this report it was pointed out how the removal of industries from Newmarket during the last decade with the consequent loss of valuation had seriously affected the financial structure of the town, resulting in a situation whereby the local tax rate for the current year is \$4.58 per hundred as compared with the average rate for the state of \$3.35.

Any community whose tax rate is higher by \$1.23 per hundred than the state average is faced with a serious problem and the efforts of all town officials and taxpayers alike should be bent towards remedying this situation as soon as possible.

While it may not be possible to regain valuation lost through the removal of industries and though even more may be lost through the demolition of factories, these facts should impress officials and taxpayers alike with the stern necessity of careful preparation of budgets, cautious voting of appropriations and elimination of any appropriation overdrafts. It is only by a strict adherence to these fundamentals of good government that improvement in the town's financial condition may be expected.

It has been noted heretofore that a budget surplus of over \$7,000.00 in 1940 resulted chiefly from the sale of property by the town which had been acquired through tax deeds. In as much as the town has received more than \$14,000.00 in the current year from a like source it is reasonable to assume that there will also be a substantial budget surplus at the close of this year. In arriving at the 1941 tax rate the item "Income from Sale of Property acquired by Tax Deed"—\$5,000.00 was included as estimated revenue. Therefore, it will be seen that the excess of actual over estimated revenue for this account will be approximately \$9,000.00 in the current fiscal year.

With the return of this property, which the town has been holding, to the tax rolls and the increased valuation resulting therefrom the tax payers should reasonably expect some relief from the present abnormally high tax rate. In order to accomplish this end, however, the town budget must receive the sober consideration of officials and taxpayers alike. Appropriations should be limited to actual needs and all revenues as well as surplus, if any, taken into account in the calculation of the tax rate.

A final recommendation has to do with the making of specific appropriations for the purchase of new equipment rather than to include such items in the regular appropriations for maintenance of departments. The uniform system of accounts, which is prescribed for towns by this division, requires that expenditures for maintenance purposes be classified separately from those on acount of capital outlay, i. e., new construction, land and buildings, new equipment, etc. It follows therefore that appropriations should be

made in a like manner in order to be consistent with the accounting procedure.

REPORT OF SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

The facts and figures herein presented are for the school year 1940-41, but I shall discuss events which have happened since July 1941, as well as before.

At the time of writing this report, February 1942, our country, for the second time in a generation, is engaged in a great war. This was is unlike the first war of 1914-18, which was a war of aggression on the part of a militaristic European nation, involving a number of countries before the Armistice was signed. World War II is a world revolution with major "HAVE NOT" nations, "have not" in the terms of material resources, combined to overpower all the "HAVE" nations, for the purpose of looting and for political domination.

The question arises in our minds, how could a group of nations which were lacking in resources before 1918, and completely disarmed in1918, ever rise to a position of such tremendous military power in the space of a few short years The answer is EDUCATION.

A people were sold on an idea that the one way out of their economic want and political instability was known as the Leader Principle, or the Totalitarian through complete subjection to one leader. This is State. Let me urge all of you to read in the February issue of the Reader's Digest, the article entitled "Educating for Death" by Gregor Ziemer. In which the picture of how the Nazis have been able to build up and maintain their power is ably portrayed.

The above is simply a brief summary pointing to the importance of Education. There are many trite, but true, sayings which have pointed out this truth for many years, such as "As the twig is bent, so is the tree inclined," but we must not fail to heed the lesson which we find in the article "Educating for Death", and reversing the ugly purposes, but adopting some of the earnestness of the method, start educating our boys and girls for life in a democracy.

What I am trying to say is that we must inculcate by precept and example and all of the modern teaching skills available a real enthusiasm for the Democratic Way of Life; a deep and burning patriotism and an undying determination that the basic principles of freedom of speech, freedom of worship, freedom of the press, and the equal rights of all before the law, shall be defended unto death.

This type of education can only be done by those who are themselves imbued with a deep feeling for the Democratic Way of Life. This means men and women with character. Hence, it is of tremendous importance that in the stress and strain of fighting this war of wars, we do not lose sight of the importance of the educative process and its meaning in terms of men and women (who are boys and girls today) who will carry on the democracy of tomorrow. We must be careful even if it involves sacrifices on our part, not to lessen the efficiency and effectiveness of our schools. This year the underlying theme of all of the teachers in this Union has been Educating for Democracy, and the devices that have been used by the different teachers in doing this have been many and very interesting. The morning exercises have taken on a new meaning; the pledge of allegiance to the Flag is given with a new

reverence; the Star Spangled Banner is being sung with a renew enthusiasm; plays have been given; pieces have been spoken; and in countless ways the meaning of Democracy, its great priviliges and its burdensome responsibilities have been taught. OLD GLORY IS SHINING WITH A RENEWED BRIGHTNESS.

Owing to the resignation of Miss Doran, a new elementary teacher, Miss Claire M. Sing, of Manchester was employed to teach the fourth grade. Miss Sing is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, and has taught for several years.

The new teachers in the High School are: Mr. Elmore K. Putnam from Claremont, succeding Mr. Kenney, and Mr. William M. Malone succeding Mr. McCormack; Miss Dorothy Brewster of Exeter succeeding Miss Thelma M. Shallow.

The School Nurse, Miss Margaret McDonald gave health examination to 670 pupils in Newmarket last year, and the chief defects apparent were related to eyes, teeth, tonsils and breathing. Several children were given benefit of treatment at clinics held in Manchester through the cooperation of the nurse.

The per pupil cost for elementary schools in Newmarket for the school year 1940-41 was \$67.72 compared with \$84.61 for the median of the State. The High School per pupil cost was \$71. 20 for Newmarket, the State median being \$109.94. The per pupil cost for instruction items only, was \$56.17, the lowest in the State.

I include with this report some of the features of the work of Newmarket High School, as submitted by Headmaster Austin J. McCaffrey, and also the honor roll of perfect attendance in all grades, as pupils deserve special mention of such faithful attendance.

NEWMARKET HIGH SCHOOL

Most of the high schools in our state have shown a decrease in registration due to the low birth rate which has prevailed in recent years. This has not been true of Newmarket, however as this year we have the largest enrollment in the history of the school—285. The contributing factor to this has been the influx of new families who are working in the Portsmouth area.

Among the school improvements this year has been the purchase of the Sound Projector which was paid for by funds raised by the pupils and by the School Board. This is being used for instructional aid in science, social studies and other related subjects. A screen was made by some of the senior boys which is satisfactory and an economy to the school.

The use for the first time in our school of recordings in instruction has taken place. Records in English and Commerce were purchased for special instruction.

The remedial program in spelling, arithmetic and geography has brought excellent results as our pupils have been above the state prescribed standards in the Annual Competitive examinations.

At Scholarship Day in Keene last May, Newmarket placed second in the State in Geography and fourth in Spelling.

This year two new features in our school program have been sponsored—Public Speaking and a Camera Club. A Public Speaking Contest is to be held and the winners will represent the school at the University Tournament in May.

The Camera Club, organized by Mr. Putnam provides instruction in photography. Pupils learn to take,

develop, enlarge, and color photos. This has been very enthusiastically received.

The Superintendent of Schools working with the Headmaster has devised a simple but effective program for Air Raid Precautions. This program provides for inside shelter or complete evacuation, depending upon the conditions. The average time for sheltering the pupils in a safe place has been one and one-half minutes.

The athletic Program has been extensive. Football was played on an eleven man basis for the first year and received enthusiastically. Basketball for all was continued and the spring will bring Baseball for the boys and Softball for the girls.

The school Yearbook will be published in June in one edition by the Junior Class.

The Sociology Classes have made a community survey which includes studies of housing, recreation, public safety, transportation, education, rural life, and utilities. Maps and charts have been made and a mimeographed pamphlet is to be issued. One of the main features of this work has been the Contour Construction map which was made. The State Department of Education in their December Bulletin commented on the worthwhileness of this work. It is the first time it has been so extensively worked out in a New Hampshire high school.

In addition to regular school activities the high school has done a great deal for Civilian Defense. Splints and stretchers have been made for first aid stations; pupils and teachers have qualified and are serving as Air Raid Wardens, Drivers in the Corps, First Aid Assistance and in other services. A boys division of the fire department has ben organized to be of

service in the work. Girls have taken care of children to allow adults to attend meeings to get instruction. Pupils and teachers worked as registrars for the Draft Registration. The Commercial Dept. mimeographed material which was ditributed in the homes and used in the classes. Pupils are serving in the Control Centre. These services and many others have been carried on. This is only the begining as the high school volunteers its continued services to the community for a more vital part in the Civilian defense work in the hard years that lie ahead.

We hope that during this emergency that we can keep the standards of our school high and extend upon the activities and curricula program of the school.
