TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the
(L. S.) County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say; to raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of persons and property, including the police department. For health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves, for Recreation including band concerts; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to

other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 1 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August 1st, 1947.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$47.00 in addition to that required by law.

7. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$130.00.

8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the Taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to eliminate the printing of the Vital Statistics in the town report.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to notify all Town Departments that are not under the supervision of a Board of Trustees, that all purchasing up to a certain amount of cost, this amount to be fixed by the board of selectmen, shall be done only by first receiving a pur-

chase order signed from the Board of Selectmen.

11. To see if the town will vote to change its method of repair of highways and authorize the selectmen to appoint one highway agent to have charge of construction, maintenance, and repair of all town highways. This article to take effect upon its passage.

12. To see if the town will accept Creighton Street extension, repair, tar, and maintain same.

13. To see if the town will vote to pass the following ordinance; The Selectmen are hereby authorized with the assistance of the Police Department, to regulate the registration of bicycles in the town of Newmarket, regulate registration fee, and make necessary rules as to operation of same. An appropriation of \$25.00 is requested if adopted.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to close to the public the following roads: (1) Starting at what is known as Maurice Griffin Farm, the two roads leading to the town line of New Fields, the other road known as Hershy Lane, starting point from what is known as Epping Road, going east towards Rockingham Road.

15. To see if the town will vote to increase the salary of the Tax Collector \$200.000 a year, and increase the salary of the clerk of the Board of Selectmen \$50.00 a year.

16. To see what action the town will take toward repairing the local jail and make necessary appropriation for same.

17. To see if the town will appropriate \$2,000 to purchase a new truck for the Highway Department, and to trade in one old truck toward the purchase.

18. To see what action the town will take in re-

gard to the bridge known as Haines' Bridge on the Epping Road. That is to say, to see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to repair said bridge or raise the sum of \$4250 to be matched by a like sum by the State Highway Department and Build a permanent cement bridge.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to repair the street leading from South Street to the old High School.

20. To see if the town will appropriate \$5,000 to build a garage to house the highway trucks, equipment and grader.

21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000 to repair, recover, and equip the fire-damaged primary school for the use of the Fire Department, said money to be used only if the voters turn over the building for that purpose at the following meeting of the school district.

22. To see what action the town will take to bring about tarring that section of highway locally known as the Ash Swamp road from Piscassic River bridge near the residence of Peter Hamel and extending toward Rockingham; the amount suggested as needed for this purpose is \$2,500.00 and length of time for completion perhaps three years.

C 60: s 1: PL—A poll tax of two dollars shall be assessed on every inhabitant of the state from twenty-one to seventy years of age, whether a citizen of the United States or an alien, except paupers, insane persons, the widow of any soldier, sailor or marine who served in the army, navy or marine corps in any war in which the United States was engaged, and others exempt by special by special provision of law.

C 56: s 1: 1939—The Husband of any woman against whom a poll tax has been assessed shall be liable for the payment thereof as if the tax has been lawfully assessed against him, so long as they are living together as man and wife.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

GOOD CITIZENSHIP TOMORROW IS BASED
UPON GOOD SCHOOLS TODAY

February 1, 1947.

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

I am pleased to submit my fifth annual report as superintendent of your schools.

Teachers and Finance

During the last year one of our greatest problems has been to maintain our teaching force. The usual factor of higher salaries elsewhere, plus the desire of some of the married teachers to remain at home since the ending of the war, have been the chief causes for

the need for about twenty (approximately 50 per cent) new teachers within this Supervisory Union. We have, however, been fortunate to continue and in most instances improve our teaching forces.

Teachers' salaries is undoubtedly the number one school problem throughout the country today. It is anticipated that much higher salaries for teachers will not only follow as a result of the present economic situation which is comparable to that which followed World War I but may continue after the crisis is over as a means of inducing more of the better high school graduates to look toward the teaching field as their chosen profession. The present low enrollment of prospective teachers in our teacher training institutions is indicative of an acute continued shortage for some years to come. From the state and federal levels of school finance, there is much indication that considerably more state and possibly federal money will be available (without more control) for local units. Should this outlook become a reality, teachers' salaries and other necessary expenditures could be increased to a great extent without much if any increase in direct property taxes which are in many instances too high at the present time.

The bill proposed by our State Board of Education and now pending before the state legislature would increase the amount of state aid to local towns and cities throughout the state from around \$400,000 to \$2,080,000. If this proposal is adopted by the legislature, different individual towns within Supervisory Union No. 14 would receive from two to nearly four times as much as they are now receiving from state funds.

Social Studies

The three R's (reading, writing and arithmetic) continue to be the basic foundation upon which our whole education system is based but to them other important phases have been added. In the social science field, the study of geography and history continue to stress the relationships between all peoples and nations. As set forth as the key to the Constitution, adopted in London in November, 1945, of the United Nations Education, Scientific, Cultural Organization the following statement shows the need for continued consideration of other people and places. "That since wars begin in the minds of men, it is in the minds of men that defenses of peace must be constructed." In this atomic age, we are in the midst of one of the great revolutionary periods of history and upon our generation and its successors the task is imposed of discovering and organizing and establishing a multitude of new relationships among the peoples of this planet. In relation to this but under the title of Air Age Education the president of the National Education Association has recently stated "youth should develop a sense of personal concern for the solution of our problems brought about by aviation—all pupils have an obligation to study and, in so far as possible, to help solve the problems which the air age presents. Throughout our schools, children are becoming more aware of these problems through use of modern books, current publications and in some instances the use of motion picture machines and radios.

Guidance

In order to more completely discover and develop the potentialities of each individual pupil for his own

happiness and social usefulness, our teachers are attempting to cause each pupil to progress according to his own abilities. Promotions are determined on the basis of mental, physical and emotional development as well as of grade-achievement. Consideration is on the question of what appears to be for the best for each individual child. Standardized achievement tests were administered to children above grade two during the past year and mental ability tests are administered to each child at least twice during his school years. Results of these tests are of a great help in knowing what to expect of the child and to check his progress in comparison to other children within the same age and grade groups. The proficiency of our testing program is impeded in some instances by the lack of time on the part of teachers to correct and interpret the tests and in some instances because of lack of training of some teachers in the testing field.

Books and Other Teaching Aids

We are continuing to purchase the newest books available for the various grades and subjects as the older ones become worn and outdated. An answer to the question "Why don't we get our books " is found in the following quotation from Lloyd W. King, Executive Secretary of the American Textbook Publishers Institute: "It is true that schools opened in September of this school year with a shortage of text and reference books—and because of this shortage of stock about 12½% of the school books ordered had not been delivered." Some other reasons given for this situation are: (1) limited supply and increased demand for white paper from which books are made, (It is estimated that the demands for books of all kinds in

1946 is three times the 1943 volume of production.) (2) restricted pulp supply. (3) shortage of new machinery and therefore lack of press time. (4) strikes. Mr. King continues with estimates to the effect that, because costs are continuing to increase, textbook prices will be by July 1, 1947, 40% higher than the 1942 prices. Within our area, we have renewed our book supply during the past few years to the extent that budgets for books will probably not be increased to a great extent for the coming year.

From the Twenty-fourth Yearbook of the American Association of School Administrators (1946) we quote: "One lesson from the educational programs of the armed services should be emphasized. Audio-visual aids are vitally necessary in the educational equipment of a modern school—projection equipment, radios and phonographs are essential." The moving picture projectors in Newmarket and Epping are being used regularly. Several of our school are fortunate in having continued use of radios, and victrolas.

Some of the greater weaknesses within our area and common to it at the present time are poor physical plants, education and economic inefficiency in organization in some instances, lack of satisfactory playground areas and limited curricula in our high schools. The state aided vocational offerings at the Dover High School which are free—except for transportation—are being utilized by a few students within this area. Courses in vocational agriculture, home economics, commerce, mechanic arts and beauty culture are available at Dover to any high school student who wishes elect them. These vocational courses, with other more usual high school subjects provide a full high school course, the completion of which entitles the pupil to

a regular high school diploma.

"If youth are vocationally proficient and have earning capacity, as well as the broadening educational offering which help them in their social and civic performances in life, they are on the road to being good citizens and will be well equipped to make their contributions to society."*

Physical Fitness

One of the educational trends throughout the country is general improvement of programs to develop physical and mental health. For twelve years the school has had a remarkable opportunity to join hands with other agencies in making physical fitness a major objective. Our school nurse, Miss Myrtle Fletcher, makes a careful examination of each child once each year and has a watchful eye for any physical weakness or signs of illness or disease during each visit to the school. Many of the defects are corrected through the good efforts of parents, although in some instances no corrections are made. (This fact may be more specifically noted in the nurse's report which follows.) More care should be taken by parents in follow-up work to prevent more serious situations at later dates. The organized interscholastic sports in the high schools are valuable moves toward our objective. More playground space in those communities where practically none exists at the present time is a need not to be overlooked. With the coming reorganization of housing facilities in some cases will undoubtedly solve the problems of such limited school playground areas—organic power is built in accordance with the age-old law of use which means "physical exercise."

Three major health factors; namely, sleep, rest and nutrition are taught in health and science classes; the third mentioned is being further encouraged by the government through financial aid in purchasing of milk, donation of food, and, in many instances, donations toward purchases of lunch room equipment. As our school buildings are improved or renewed to include running water, refrigeration and cooking facilities we may be able to have a school lunch program in every school.

Teachers new to the public schools of Newmarket this year are as follows:

For the third grade Miss Earline Ford of Plymouth and Plymouth Teachers College was selected to replace Miss Blanch St. Armour who was transferred to grade six. Miss Ford has had two years of successful experience in the elementary schools of Bristol, N. H., before coming to Newmarket. Mrs. Ellen Acres resigned her position last June as teacher of the sixth grade in order that she might teach nearer to her home in Milton. In November, 1946, Mrs. Jeanette Crooker was elected to replace Mrs. George in grade six. Mrs. Crooker is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and has had experience in elementary and high school work.

At the high school, Mrs. Jean Dole Hibbard of Camp-ton and Plymouth Teachers College replaced Martha Lefebvre in the commercial department. Miss Lefebvre resigned after three years of good work at Newmarket to accept a similar position at Somersworth High School. In the home economics department, Mrs. Lewilda Raymond was elected to replace Miss Hester Bickford. Mrs. Raymond is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire (1945) and

taught home economics at the Littleton, New Hampshire, High School during 1945-1946. To replace Miss Catherine Clark in the social studies field, the School Board selected Miss Fay Clement (now Mrs. Phair) of Woodsville and Plymouth Teachers College.

Much improvement is observed by having more continuity in the teaching force this year. Newmarket had an unusually large teacher turnover during the war years; such a condition is not good for any school system. Our present teachers are well trained, enthusiastic and anxious to take their part in the effective school and community program which we endeavor to operate. Mrs. Mildred Rooney, Mrs. Elizabeth Doe Marden, Mrs. Leona Foster and Mrs. Doris Holt have "stood by" to be of assistance as substitute teachers when needed.

Buildings and Equipment

After the fire in the Primary School on October 21, 1946, the children in the first four grades were transferred to the Old High School building (commonly known as the Central School). Some advantages of this building over the Primary School are noted in the larger playground area, more satisfactory toilet facilities, larger classrooms which allow for more pupil activity in class work and games during bad weather. If the Central School is to be used for more than temporary quarters it will be necessary to improve the artificial lighting and possibly to change the natural lighting and stairways. The one main disadvantage of the Central School appears to be the fact that it is located "on the hill" and is difficult to get to.

The major repair job effected during the past year is the new roof on the new High School building. Your

School Board employed Fred W. Greenlaw of Dover to lay a new "bonded" roof at a cost of \$1,787.00 (plus \$180.00 for guarantee), which is guaranteed for twenty years. The upper hall and one class room were painted during the past summer and new outside doors were installed on the front side of the building. Dennis Kelleher has continued his excellent work of past years; he not only keeps the fires and sweeps but is alert to keep all building facilities in good repair. The School Board appointed Mr. Wilbur T. Sharples as janitor of the Central and Stone schools, truant officer and census taker, upon the resignation of John Edgerly, who had held that position for over twenty years. Mr. Sharples assumed his new duties on January 24, 1947.

In order that the buildings may be in good condition and as attractive as possible, the following improvements and additions should be made:

1. New drinking fountains needed immediately in the high school.
2. New arrangement of home economic laboratory to eliminate the small antiquated sinks and to add when possible a gas stove for cooking.
3. A new 9-foot electric refrigerator to make possible the storage of foods necessary in efficient class room work and lunch program (provision has already been made to purchase this piece of equipment; the Federal School Lunch Administration has approved a request for a donation of fifty per cent of the cost from federal funds).
4. Increased cupboard space in the home economics kitchen.
5. A new adding machine for commercial department.
6. Continuation of the repainting of the interior of

the buildings.

7. Improved artificial lighting in the fifth grade room in the Stone School.

Instruction

In the elementary schools, provision has been made to give added help to those pupils who have had difficulty in learning to read. Mrs. Lillian Witherell and Miss Ellen Deem, teachers of grades 1 and 2 respectively, are carrying on special classes with a few children each morning after the dismissal of their own groups for lunch. Primary teachers have directed such special projects in conjunction with the regular work of the children, as an Eskimo Village, a Dutch Village, The Farm, Community Store, Health and Safety in Our Community and various projects in handicraft.

In the high school, it is hoped that manual training may again be offered next year to the boys in grades 7 and 8. This has been discontinued during the past two years because of the shortage of qualified teachers. We have recently received some minor items of equipment, free of charge except for costs of transportation, packing and handling, from the War Assets Administration. More is on order and if delivered will help to supplement that which we now have. Some prevocational offerings are considered to be of great educational value to boys and girls, if properly taught.

As may be noted in the following report of Mr. Andrew Crooker, Jr., Headmaster of the High School, many activities—formerly often referred to as extra-curricular—have been included in the regular school work. Brief reports of the teachers of commercial and home economics indicate the many valuable activities which are included in vocational work for girls. A high school mechanics arts and/or agricultural course might prove to be of similar interest and value to our high school boys.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is an honor and privilege to be able to submit this annual report to you. At the time of writing, I have completed two years of pleasurable and profitable work with Newmarket citizens. During this time it seems we have made progress in our aim to offer the best educational opportunity possible to the youth of Newmarket. By maintaining our cooperative effort, we can continue to provide even broader opportunities.

Newmarket High is fortunate to have a staff of teachers who are deeply interested in their work and who give freely of time and effort to assist each pu-

pil. Each teacher works diligently with our extra-curricular program in addition to his classroom assignments. Our sports, dramatic and music coaches have presented many excellent programs. Other teachers work behind the scenes with such important organizations as the Student Council, School Service Club, and the Home Economics Club. Your teachers appreciate your support.

Materials and equipment are purchased each year to keep your school equipped to perform the prescribed work in each department. New 7th and 8th grade geography texts and distionaires were purchased. Grade 12 English has been supplemented by Irson Wells and the Mercury Theatre's recordings of Macbeth. However, it would be possible for us to better execute our work if we might have an electric refrigerator for the home economics classes and the noon lunch program, an added course for the non-college student such as ninth grade science course, a shop program to include the high school boys, and physical education and auditorium facilities for our everyday use. These are items for which we may strive to secure in the future.

Last summer the main corridor and room five were painted. We should be able to complete our painting of the main floor rooms this summer. Denny has done excellent work in maintaining the physical plant of the school. It has been suggested that we should replace our broken-down drinking system with the modern electric bubblers.

Our year has been highlighted by the Lamprey again winning third place rating in the Columbia University contests. The English team representing the class of 1945 won third place on Scholarship Day. The Student

Council is fast gaining its true position in school life. Student responsibility in the everyday routine of school life is evidence of growing pride in their school. The Glee Club is to be commended on its excellent operetta; the first to be produced in many years.

The high school is certified by the state as an A-6 school. This means all six grades are approved. This year the school, having met the standards prescribed by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, was accepted as an institutional member.

The Class of 1946 reports that eight of their number are in post-secondary schools, three are in the armed services, two are married and seventeen are employed—most of them locally.

Once again we appeal to everyone to maintain our fine attendance record. Such a record is evidence of a good school. Only by punctual and regular attendance are the pupils able to profit most from school life and work.

The program of your school aims to provide situations in all phases of its organization for the pupils to live and learn through experiences in their own society. Thus do all tend to become better able to assume the responsibilities of citizenship by actually living through their mistakes and successes under trained supervisors. Parents and friends are invited to see the school in operation. We have appreciated your support during the past year.

COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT

The commercial department was very fortunate in.

obtaining five new typewriters this year. One of these machines has elite type which will give the students the advantage of being familiar with the manipulation of this type. We now have machines from each of the following well-known typewriter companies—L. C. Smith, Royal, Remington and Underwood.

With the addition of the mimeograph, which was reconditioned, the department's production of duplicated material has been increased. The Office Practice class shows real proficiency in the operation of the fluid duplicator and the ink mimeograph.

The department should have an adding machine or calculator for use in its classes — the one that we now have has become antiquated and needs constant repair. Our students participated in National Contests in Bookkeeping, Typewriting, and Shorthand. One of our students won all the awards offered by the Gregg Publishing Company in shorthand and typewriting, which is an outstanding achievement of which Newmarket High is very proud.

The Office Practice class, upon visiting the John Hancock Insurance Company in Boston, had the opportunity to see a large modern office in operation. They also attended court at the Dover Court House which resulted in a better understanding of the work required by a court stenographer, as well as court procedure.

The students of the commercial department are members of the School Service Club and through that club the department plays an important part in the life of the school.

The commercial program is consistent with modern trends in that we do everything possible to provide an employment placement service. Our aim is to provide

occasions where the girls can get actual work experience while they are taking the course. We have had several girls do part time work in the offices of professional men and local factories. Continuing our policy, we are trying to help the girls get jobs upon graduation. Newmarket girls have filled many secretarial and clerical positions in Newmarket and Durham upon completion of their schooling.

HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

The Home Economics Department is striving to fulfill its chief purpose—that of helping girls to become better family members. Our program is set up to have far reaching value. Not only does it help girls to be better members of their immediate families, but aims to establish an appreciation of the importance of home life and aid in maintaining future homes of their own.

Our Home Ec Club is an active part of the department; among its chief duties is the noon lunch program. The girls plan, prepare and serve lunch to about sixty children each day.

The foods classes did a great deal of canning in the fall, in class and also at home for a home project.

While studying the planning and preparation of breakfast, the girls prepared and served actual breakfasts in class. The same procedure will be followed for the luncheon and dinner units.

In March the Foods Class will serve at a basketball banquet given by the Booster's Club.

We have obtained the assistance of a registered nurse from the Exeter Chapter of the Red Cross to

teach the home nursing unit. This is the regular first aid course and the girls will receive certificates when the course is completed.

We realize that pupils learn best by actual experience and thus try to give them as much practical laboratory work as possible. More specific projects could be carried out if the facilities necessary were available. We are in need of a large set of china. The supply we have is small and in very bad condition.

Rearrangement of the working tables in the foods laboratory into individual working areas would be a great improvement. The individual sinks are too small to be of any practical value and leak whenever the water is turned on. Replacement of these by one large modern sink would be of practical value.

Our greatest handicap is lack of a refrigerator which is to be purchased shortly and adequate storage space. With no form of refrigeration it is impossible to plan ahead or use left-overs from one lesson to the next. There is bound to be a certain amount of waste.

We have only one small cupboard for storage space to take care of both laboratory and noon lunch supplies. It is a very unsatisfactory arrangement.

To enable a complete learning process the girls should become familiar with the use of all types of equipment. Since we need another stove, I suggest it be a gas one. This will give experience in the use of all the commonly used types of stove.

We hope to have some of these improvements

before too long and thus enable us to better fulfill our purpose.

MUSIC REPORT

Due to the School Board's interest in the High School Glee Club's performance of the operetta last year, the music department, this year, is able to give one-quarter credit to those students who fulfill the required two full periods weekly of music. Of course, some students cannot comply as their sports schedule takes priority.

This year, we are hampered by having lost the nucleus of our glee club and orchestra to last year's graduating class. Despite this we still have high hopes for an operetta that will reflect the best efforts of our department.

Shortage of music and instruments this year will prevent us from having the cast of some sixty students which participated in last year's operetta.

Since our high school mirrors the grade school progress, we of the music department have tried to lay the proper foundation with such subjects as music appreciation, rhythmic activities, creative activities and toy orchestra. In this we have been greatly hindered by a lack of facilities. Such things as a victrola and records and the renovation of the primary school piano would help to bring out the favorable results that we wish and that parents appreciate.

We of the music department realize that children have an instinctive pleasure in music. Music is invaluable in the integration of other subjects in the school curriculum.

The big aim of music all the way through is to create in the child the desire for worthwhile activities which will influence his whole life.

In the first three grades the child learns largely by imitation. A light head tone and good enunciation are stressed.

In the first grade, songs are taught entirely by rote. Books are not put in the hands of children until near the end of the year. At this time they gain a slight knowledge of music notation.

In the second grade we have rote songs, observation songs, and we also encourage independent reading of music.

In the third grade we have much the same program as in the second—except that independent music reading is encouraged a little more.

In the fourth grade we begin to teach fundamental tone, time, and theory problems — taking up different

ones each month.

In the 5th and 6th grades we review problems, and lay the foundation for part music which we hope to further develop in high school.

In the 7th and 8th grades we are hindered somewhat by the lack of suitable material. This is a delicate stage when voices are changing—especially the boys. We hope to create more interest this year by giving an assembly performance.

Our programs for the past year include (besides the high school operetta) several glee club appearances at the Woman's Club and P. T. A., a grade school operetta, and other P. T. A. performances.

The orchestra played at assemblies, Junior play, baccalaureate, class day and graduation.

We hope that some of our high school girls will participate in the coming music festivals throughout the state.
