TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defrav town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of persons and property, including the police department. For health and sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for highways and bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for education, including the public library; for charities, including the decoration of soldiers' graves: for recreation, including band concerts; for cemeteries; for interest; for new construction and improvements, including state aid and town construction:

for indebtedness, payments to other Governmental Divisions, including county tax, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

3. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 1 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August 15th 1949.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

5. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$47.00 in addition to that required by law.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

6. To see if the town will vote to change its method of repair of highways and authorize the selectmen to appoint one highway agent to have charge of construction, maintenance of all town highways and sidewalks. This article to take effect upon its passage.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a suitable piece of equipment for snow removal and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for same.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the construction of cement side-

walks on a 50-50 basis with property owners. The size, mix, and construction to be specified by the board of Selectmen.

(Approved by Budget Committee)

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Newmarket qualified to vote in district affairs:

. You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the ninth day of March, 1949, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 9. To see if the school district will raise and appropriate \$2,800.00 to be used for the refitting of schools to meet State Fire Marshall's recommendations.

10. To see if the district will raise and appropriate \$500.00 to be used for the care of the baseball field.

11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate \$350.00 to be used for installing new lights in one room in the Central School.

12. To see if the district will raise and appropriate \$835.00 to be used for installing a new fence around the Central School.

13. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to sell the land on the Exeter Road near the old Town Farm on which formerly stood the Pine Hill Schoolhouse, so-called.

14. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to use balance of money raised last year for stoker at High School (\$867.00) to install stoker at the Central and Stone Schools.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Above budget entirely as read is recommended by Budget Committee.

In Memoriam

Andrem I. Crooker, Ir.

Andrew J. Crooker arrived at Newmarket High School in 1945 to take over the position of headmaster replacing Austin J. MacCaffrey. He immediately began devoting his full time and energy to bettering the school in all its phases.

As principal, Mr. Crooker proved to be an efficient and understanding administrator. Anyone who came to the office was always welcomed with an enthusiastic and friendly greeting. His fine attitude toward his profession plus the gift of a sparkling personality made him the ideal headmaster.

As a classroom teacher, Mr. Crooker won the admiration of his students. He greatly improved the biology department at Newmarket High by bringing in a new and modern approach which helped young people acquire knowledge of value in their own lives. His philosophy of education permeated his teaching; he worked always for others and seldom for himself.

In 1947 his health began to fail rapidly, but still he performed his many duties cheerfully and well. It was Mr. Crooker who, in 1948, introduced the National Honor Society, an organization which gave students new privileges and a new goal to work for. In recognition of his loyal service, and in appreciation for his guidance and understanding, the 1948 Lamprey was respectfully dedicated to the beloved headmaster.

His death on November 27, 1948, was deep personal loss for every student, teacher, and citizen of Newmarket. Traces of his personality, his accomplishments, his ideals will linger in the halls of Newmarket High School and in the hearts of all who knew him. His legacy was a record of service and loyalty which will endure as long as the school or its students.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with pleasure that I submit my second report as Superintendent of your schools.

The major problem facing all of us today is finding the money to give our children the type of education they deserve. All phases of education are costing more money and there seems little chance of a recession. Studies show that our elementary schools will have a large increase in enrollment during the next 8-10 years and we will feel this in the High Schools after 1960. It is hoped that some form of State or Federal legislation will aid this situation financially in the near future. This item needs your active support so that the property tax will not continue to carry such a heavy burden.

GUIDANCE

No school can have an efficient instructional program without knowing what it is accomplishing. It must know what is happening to boys and girls as well as what it is teaching them. The children in your schools are being given new type intelligence tests this year that measure both verbal and non-verbal. These tests will tell what a child is thinking as well as doing. Parents are urged to consult with teachers concerning their child's school progress.

The tests are being corrected and processed in the Superintendent's Office thus saving much valuable teacher time. Standardized Achievement tests will be given next year.

TEACHERS

Miss Barbara Farrant of Boston, Mass., a graduate of Boston University was engaged to replace Earline Ford who resigned to accept a teaching position in Bristol, N. H.

Miss Mary E. Maguire of Nashua, a graduate of Rivier College with experience in New Salem Academy, Mass. replaces Margaret Riley who left to accept a teaching position in Methuen, Mass.

Dorothy Freese, Supervisor of Music, left to accept a position in Dover. She was replaced by Helen Simpson a graduate of Syracuse University with experience in Oakfield, N. Y. Miss Simpson comes from Lakeport, New Hampshire.

In December John McGrath, of Claremont was engaged to act as headmaster of the high school due to the death of Andrew J. Crooker. Mr. McGrath is a graduate of the University of Vermont, A M. Ed. degree from Boston University and teaching experience in Watertown, Mass. and Claremont, N. H.

REPAIRS

During the summer four classrooms in the Central School, one in the Stone School and one in the High School were painted in pastel colors. This makes the rooms more cheerful and improves the classroom appearance.

The old slate urinals in the boys' toilets have been replaced with enameled fixtures as recommended by the state, thus eliminating foul odors.

The flag pole at the Central School had to be removed because the base was rotten and the pole leaned at a dangerous angle. It will be replaced with one of steel.

Electric clocks have been installed in the Central School replacing old pendulum clocks.

Bulletin boards have been installed in several rooms which allow for display purposes.

There is still a great deal of work to be done to your schools to have them in excellent repair. Carpentry, painting and electrical work will be completed as far as the school budget will allow.

NEW EQUIPMENT

At the Ball Field a new backstop and new bleachers were installed in the spring. Dennis Kelleher has been caring for the ballgrounds in an able manner. Bleachers are being stored in the Central School basement during the winter months.

During the fall a new coal stoker was installed in the high school providing better heat at a saving in fuel costs. Eventually all schools should have heating improvements.

In the Home Economics room in the High School two new cabinet sinks were installed. A new electric stove was presented to the school by the Newmarket Electric Light Company. Another electric stove was purchased by the School Board at a very low price. This was accomplished under the company's educational program.

It is hoped that the Home Economics room can become completely equipped in the near future so an efficient program can be carried on.

A steel safe was purchased for the Headmaster's Office, allowing for a safe place to keep school records and valuables.

AN INVITATION

The schools are yours! Why not visit them while in session? Teachers welcome visits of parents to class as well as to public assemblies. The home and the school should cooperatively work together for the development of your children. Parents should take a little time to acquaint themselves with school problems and get to know the teachers and accept them as friends. Greater public participation in school affairs is a crying need in this community and deserves your support.

IN APPRECIATION

The administration wishes to thank all those who helped the schools during the past year. Notable was the work on the ballgrounds and the basketball jackets.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens of the community for their hearty cooperation during the past year.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first report as headmaster of Newmarket High School.

This year in order to simplify the report, and in order that you may have a better understanding of our school affairs, I have asked each teacher to outline their work and their reports are incorporated in the following information.

ACADEMIC

- A. Languages
 - 1. English

The courses in English are so directed as to emphasise that language and literature are links between the individual and the world. The students must of necessity use the traditional materials. Our teachers have endeavored to enliven and expand those materials, and to break down the apathy students have for their mother tongue. It is the opinion of the teachers that words, their histories and their meanings, are of great importance in our propaganda-ridden era, and an understanding of literature a boon and a solace to all.

II. French

In this language equal stress is given to vocabulary, reading, pronunciation, and grammar. The class has made poster displays and notebooks in order to point out the importance of France in the world today and French culture and art. III. Latin

In this course the enrollment is two students who are reading Caesar's Commentaries on the Gallic War.

IV. Mathematics and Science

This year the main aim of the mathematics and science classes is to instill in the minds of the youngsters the necessary tools to enable them to earn their living in this world.

Our chemistry class dealt with the simple things which are found around us in every day life as well as the complicated system of atoms and compounds. Detergents, paints, baking powders, cosmetics, and dyes were but a few of the common articles they experimented on.

The mathematics classes covered from General Math to Algebra II. The course included insurance, profit and loss, basic geometry, and the beginnings of algebra. The Algebra I class learned the first fundamentals of advanced mathematics, the Algebra II class studied more of the fundamentals and went on to an advanced study of quadratics.

V. General Science

The aim of the sciences is to give the students a broader outlook of scientific modern times and to enable them to cope with the world in its progress toward the betterment of humanity.

Experiments were conducted and explained in the laboratory for the Science 9 class,

covering the making of gases, distillations and combustions.

Field trips were organized in the spring to cover nature study and features of the land.

VI. Social Studies

During 1948 the geography classes were brought up to date by the purchase of three large maps of Europe, South America, and the world. The students practiced and understood civics better through the introduction of debates and speeches presented in the classes by the students themselves. The showing of films greatly augmented the teaching of all classes in science.

Social Studies offered in our high school included World Geography, Civics, Economics and American History. These courses are developed and so presented that the student may achieve a better understanding of the world in which we live and a thorough appreciation of his or her duty as a citizen of Newmarket, our state, and nation.

During these courses the teachers make extensive use of Audio-Visual Aids, which serve to emphasize and vitalize the subject matter which is being presented. Also in the classes the students are trained to prepare outline material on social subjects and present that material in class in the form of an oral report in a debate or general discussion. It is felt that this practice will help in the training of our students to the effect that they will not only know the information required, but will be able to present it in a straight forward fashion.

COMMERCIAL

The Commercial Department introduced Clerical Practice this year, to supplement Office Practice, and to offer the girls interested in doing general clerical work in offices an opportunity to acquire training.

They are proud of their new electric Burroughs adding machine which was a gift to the school from the Classes of 1945, 1946, 1947, and 1948. This machine was used a great deal during Bookkeeping and Office Practice.

Last spring a group of girls from the department went to Boston to visit the John Hancock Insurance Company. The trip gave them an opportunity to observe the organization and functions of a large business office, as well as to become acquainted with the openings for girls who have training in commercial work.

During the past year the department did various types of work for the Selectmen and the Fire Department; and they also began recopying one of the books containing town records of births, deaths, and marriages back in the 1800's.

The Office Practice class undertook as a special project the reorganization of our school library which is more fully mentioned in another section.

The girls in the Commercial Department have endeavored to do their part in helping to build a better school.

HOME ECONOMICS

Following the rotation procedure of teaching courses in Home Economics, this year we are teaching the two courses, Family and Foods and Nutrition.

The rearrangement of the foods laboratory adds much to the teaching of this course. The laboratory is so arranged that four individual kitchens are formed. They have two new sinks and a new electric stove. Eventually we hope to complete this arrangement, thus having four completely equipped units.

An electric iron, Sunbeam Mixmaster, glassware, and linen were purchased during the year. This equipment, plus that already mentioned, made the set-up much more satisfactory, and the girls took great pride in keeping their individual kitchen in order.

The Home Nursing Unit was again offered as a part of the regular Family course. This was sponsored by the Red Cross and Mrs. Charles Dearborn was the instructor. A great deal of enthusiasm was found among the girls taking the course.

The number of girls enrolled in Home Economics has been increasing each year. We are pleased that this is the situation and hope to be able to continue offering courses which they find both interesting and practical.

MUSIC

The music organizations of Newmarket High School consists of three groups. The Senior High School Girls Glee Club of about thirty members, the Junior High School Girls Glee Club, and the Junior High School Boys Glee Club. These three groups participated in a Community Christmas program held in the town hall, December 21. They will also present a three act operetta, a spring concert, and assist at the graduation exercises.

EXTRA CURRICULA

With the assistance of Mr. Holmes, Mr. Clark was able to field a formidable nine which went through a very successful season by achieving an enviable record of 9 wins and 3 losses.

They tried for first place in the South Eastern New Hampshire "B" league but were unfortunately defeated by Exeter High School in the play-offs.

Our girls also participated during the spring months in intermural and interschool softball.

So far this season, the boys' and girls' basketball squads have participated successfully in several interschool meets. A part-time Physical Education program was instituted during the spring and fall months when two of our teachers took the Junior High School students out to the playground for light exercise and games.

Our aim in physical education is at all times to develop sportsmanship, character, and physical training, or in other words, qualities which can be utilized to good advantage in later life.

The main duties of the Student Council were to set the social standards and arrange the yearly social calendar as well as proctor during lunch hours. It is hoped that more importance and responsibilities may be assigned the Student Council which they should readily assume as the student governing body.

Other clubs which are participating effectively in our school life are the Dramatics, Home Economics, Science, and School Service. They contribute and aid toward the development of a well rounded school system. Under the direction of the student Council and with the cooperation of classes in the school a successful assembly program was carried out.

The dances which were conducted by various classes helped to bring about a better understanding of an individual's social responsibilities. They were well attended and enjoyed by all.

LIBRARY

During the first week of January our library was moved from its old location to new space which was made available to us by the school board. This was a so-called "old superintendent's office". Under the direction of Mrs. Jean Hibbard, and with the help of her office practice class, the old office was completely renovated and the material in it placed in a better storage space. All books from the old library were catalogued and indexed in a card system so that now, they can be more readily found and used by the students. The additional space made available will make it possible for our library to grow, and be used effectively by all students and classes of the school.

ALUMNI

Recently a questionnaire was sent to the members of the Class of 1948. Its tabulation showed that five are serving in our Armed Forces, four are attending institutions of higher learning, and the others are all gainfully employed.

NEEDS

Although our school has many advantages there are still some outstanding deficiencies which should be corrected. The foremost among these are a new gymnasium and the addition of vocational workshops. The former so that the all important physical development of our youth may be better handled, and the latter so that boys may learn to participate in the Industrial Arts which are practiced in a world such as ours today. It is essential that we offer vocational as well as academic training. I sincerely hope that these major needs can be corrected in the very near future.

Although I have only been at Newmarket High School a few short weeks, I have enjoyed and continue to enjoy my work here very much. I found the school in fine condition from a physical, academic and disciplinary view point. I know that such conditions reflect the hard and capable work of Mr. Andrew Crooker and of his submaster, Mr. Walter Foster.

Mr. Crooker was a foremost educational leader and through his initiative many fine innovations in education have been brought to Newmarket. Outstanding among these was the greatly advanced course in Biology, the introduction of the National Honor Society to our school in order to raise the academic standards and the use of an entirely new form of graduation which credits a greater number of students at that exercise.

Since September, Mr. Foster cooperated with Mr. Crooker more closely to conduct the active duties of headmaster. Since my arrival on December 1, he has aided me in every way possible toward the aim of developing a better school for all.

In conclusion I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the fine cooperation that I have received from the school board, the superintendent, teachers, parents, and students since my arrival here. This fine spirit, I am certain, will facilitate the attainment of our common goal, which is of course, to develop our young citizens so that they may participate effectively and creditably in our world today.

Our greatest need is still Dental Aid. As yet we have not had the Dental Trailer. Dr. Dwyer promises it to us in April. Civic Department of Woman's Club is sponsoring Dental Mobile Trailer this year used only for Fluorine treatment. What we need in Newmarket is dental care in our first six grades every year.

Local Red Cross is going to help with 89 children ages 6-9 with Fluorine treatment. This will include a cleaning for treatments of Fluorine for children at Primary and St. Mary's.

Red Cross still provides milk for our underweights. Average 25 pupils per day. Fourteen school children had diphtheria and tetanus antitoxin at clinic held by State Health Department in April. They promise to return again in 1949 and hope in having a larger and better clinic.

Thanks to our local Red Cross and our fine group of teachers, also the Sisters of St. Mary's for their fine cooperation.
