THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of persons and property, including the police department. For health and sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for highways and bridges, including state aid maintenance. sidewalks, street lighting and general expense of the department; for education, including the public library; for charities, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for recreation, including band concerts; for cemeteries; for interest; for new construction and improvements, including state aid and town construction; for indebtedness, payments to other Governmental Divisions, including county tax, and pay all other necessary charges

arising within said Town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, if paid within 15 days after receipt of bill.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

5. To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$47.00 in addition to that required by law.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept, maintain and tar the extension of Rock Street which lies between Church Street and Chapel Street.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new Police Cruiser and to trade in the present one toward same and to raise the sum of \$1350.00 to purchase said cruiser.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new two-ton truck for high-

way department and to raise the sum of \$3000.00 to purchase same.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

10. To see if the Town will vote to pick up rubbish on the Packers Falls Road.

11. To see if the Town will vote to have a nine man budget committee appointed by the moderator.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150.00 for civilian defense.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 to remove the balcony in the town hall.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

15. To see if the Town will vote to publish in the Town Report Book, once every five years, the full account of the Cemetery Trust Fund, starting in 1952.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

15. To see if the Town will vote to sell a \$5000.00—23½ U. S. Treas. Bond which will realize a profit of approximately \$400.00, and to put said \$400.00 in an improvement fund for both cemeteries to be divided equally between the two; also the principal amount of \$5,000.00 to be invested in Series G. U. S. Bonds yielding 2½% annually.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan or Australian System of voting.

PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, members of the Newmarket School Board, and citizens of the town of Newmarket. It is with pleasure that I meet my first annual report as principal of Newmarket High School.

CERTIFICATION

All six grades at Newmarket High School are certified by the New Hampshire State Department of Education. The high school has been and continues to be a member of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools by meeting the Association standards.

TEACHERS

Newmarket High School has been seriously troubled by an excessive rate of teacher turnover. In June, 1949, six of the nine teachers then employed resigned to take positions elsewhere. During the school year of 1949-50, there was a change in principals, thus making the total resignation seven out of nine. In the summer of 1950, three more teachers left, representing a turn over of but

33 per cent compared to 77 per cent the year before.

In order for a school to build a solid educational foundation and customs and traditions, the rate of teacher turnover cannot begin to approach that of the past two years.

A survey of reasons as to why teachers do not stay here longer than they do would be most revealing, but will not be attempted at this time. The fact of the matter is this—the teaching load, extra-curricular activities, working conditions, beginning salary, salary increases and ultimate maximum are all factors that must be considered when making such a survey.

I feel that Newmarket is large enough to attract and hold good teachers and everything possible should be done to keep those teachers who render good service.

At the present time Newmarket High School has nine members on its staff, they are as follows:

Miss Barbara De Nute—Commercial and Girls coach.

Miss Catherine Walsh—Home Economics.

Miss Marjorie Wood—English and Foreign language.

Mr. Robert Bouchard—Music, English and Geography.

Mr. John Economopoulos—Assistant Principal and Social Studies.

Mr. Howard Jackson—Math, Science, and Auto Driving.

Mr. William Marcoux—Math and Shop

Mr. Forrest Miner—Social Studies and Boys coach.

Mr. Rexford Avery—Principal and Biology.

For the most part this is a staff young in experience, but one which works with one purpose—that

of giving the youth of Newmarket the best education possible.

Mention should be made of the fine work done by our custodian, Denny Kelleher. His untiring efforts keep the building in tip-top shape and it is a school of which all of us can be proud.

CURRICULUM

Newmarket High School is divided administratively into two parts — Junior and Senior High Schools. The seventh and eighth grades comprise the Junior High School. The program of studies for these grades consists of English, geography, mathematics, history, science, health, physical education, woodworking for boys, and home economics for the girls. This is a good program and follows the recommendation of the State Department of Education.

The High School comprising grades nine through twelve offers four programs of study or combinations thereof: College preparatory, commercial, home economics, and general. This year for the first time, we have introduced a course in Behind the Wheel Auto Driver Training, made possible through the courtesy of the A. A. A., Chevrolet Motor Company, and Great Bay Motors.

Although this may seem like a broad program, closer examination will show that there is little choice for those boys who are not academically minded. To be sure they can take up commercial work, but that field is primarily for girls.

I believe that if an extension of the seventh and eighth grade shop program could be made into grades nine and ten, that many youngsters who normally leave school at the end of the eighth year would continue, thus enabling your school to better prepare them for life and good living. This shop program would not be designed to produce finished

craftsmen, but rather give those who take it a crafts background which will serve as a foundation for occupations as well as use in everyday life.

ACTIVITIES

The activity program at Newmarket High School is quite comprehensive. We have athletic teams in baseball, softball, cross country track, basketball (girls and boys), and golf. The latter sport is a new one and was made possible by the kindness of Mr. Walter Hansen who allows the team unlimited use of the Rockingham Golf Course at no charge whatsoever.

There has been some talk of including football in the program next fall, but whether we should play a six or eleven man game is still under discussion.

CLUBS

Although there is no formal club program we have several very active clubs which add much to the social and intellectual life of the school. The Pep Club consists of loyal workers to our athletic teams. The Home Economics Club, Biology Club, Science Club all speak for themselves.

Our publications consist of the student paper "Mule News" published by the Freshman Class as an English project. The Yearbook, *Lamprey*, has enjoyed much success in nationwide competition in its class. This year, 1950, it received a third place certificate—not as good as before, but creditable, nevertheless.

The School Service Club is composed of those boys and girls who do the many daily chores—traffic patrol, librarians, office girls, or any other services pertaining to the welfare of the school.

Our dramatic program is carried on by the Senior and Junior Classes both of which present a three

act play annually. All classes and clubs present some type of a show during the year.

Music is a must in any school program. This year, the first in many, we have a twenty-five piece band. Although many of its members are beginners, it will prove itself by the year's end. Our Choral program is developed around two girl's and a boy's glee clubs.

AUDIO - VISUAL PROGRAM

Newmarket High School is very fortunate indeed in the type of audio-visual equipment in its possession. We have a sound movie projector, a filmstrip projector given by the Newmarket P. T. A., a tape recorder, automatic record player, and public address system, all purchased with the funds raised by the pupils.

The School Board supports the program and classroom teachers are free to choose audio-visual materials according to their best needs and interests.

Newmarket can be proud of its school, but it should not become complacent, for such a state does not make for progress.

I wish to thank all those who have made my work and life in Newmarket so pleasant.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

The past year has brought many uncertainties into Newmarket's educational picture. The present international and economic situation is conducive to lack of stability. Price increases in cost of living and practically all other items cannot help but be reflected in the school district's budget. It

is hoped that these factors will be given their proper consideration.

As part of this report there will be a page devoted to Return of District Revenue, which shows the actual budget that the school district is using for the current year. (1950-51)

Newmarket's share of the Supervisory Union expenses this year (divided equally between equalized valuation and average daily membership) will be approximately 27 per cent.

NEW TEACHERS

Miss Catherine Walsh was hired to teach home economics, replacing Mrs. Matilda Youngman. Miss Barbara DeNute was hired to teach commercial subjects, replacing Miss Mary Rheault. Miss Mary Mack is teaching grade two at the Primary School, replacing Miss Barbara Farrant. Mrs. Ruth Robie was hired to teach grade three at the Primary School replacing Mrs. Pauline Breck.

REPAIRS AND REPLACEMENTS

There are many little repair jobs that have developed this year. Some of these are:

1. Repairing of flashing on high school roof and boiler room roof. This was damage caused by the high winds in the Fall storm.
2. Leaking joints in high school steam pipes.
3. Building of outside incinerator for high school.
4. Installation of new lights in grade three.
5. Buying one new typewriter for high school.

DRIVER TRAINING

Through the generosity of the Great Bay Motor Company, a Driver Training car has been made available to about twenty-four students enrolled in a Driver Training Course in the high school. Mr. Howard Jackson, the instructor, has now started actual driving classes where students are given very

thorough instructions in not only driving techniques but traffic laws, etc. This course has proven its worth country wide through a very noticeable reduction in teen age traffic accidents and violations.

HOT LUNCH

The P. T. A. is now sponsoring a very ambitious hot lunch program for the pupils of the Central and Stone Schools. Through the generosity of the P. T. A. and many interested citizens a part of the basement in the Central School has been converted into what is developing into a well equipped kitchen and lunch room. Proof of the pudding is in the eating. Proof of a hot lunch program is in the number of pupils that consistently participate in that program. The results must be gratifying to those who are giving their time and efforts in support of the program.

LOOKING AHEAD

Newmarket, with its factories and shops must have a demand for boys skilled in mechanics. At present Newmarke Htigh School has no means of meeting those demands. By the addition of another teacher the High School could introduce two years of woodworking to its curriculum thereby meeting more fully the communities needs. This program should be expanded in the near future to a full four year program by the addition of a shop where a third and fourth year of machine shop and automotive mechanics could be added. Such a program would more fully meet the needs of all the boys in Newmarket.

In closing, I wish to congratulate the School Board, citizens and pupils on the apparent pride they take in maintaining the school properties. Past experience has proven that good schools invite and encourage the right people to settle and become

taxpayers in that town. Newmarket can expect to grow.

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, citizens, teachers and pupils of Newmarket for the spirit of cooperation and friendliness with which they have received their new Superintendent.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is a pleasure to submit to you my first annual report on music education in your schools.

The integrated parts of music instruction in grades one through six are as follows: Rhythm and meter, melody, creative activity, music appreciation and instrumental music.

In the first grade the teaching of time variations are expressed through meaningful terms, such as slow, fast, rest, hold; fundamental rhythm, as expressed by the skip, hop, walk and run. The correct use of the singing voice in individual or group effort, memorization of melodies, rote songs and tone drills are also taught.

Work covered in first year music is reviewed briefly in grade two. Notes of varying length, associated with meaningful symbols are introduced. Ear training without piano is begun. Rhythmic expression, tone drills, theory and appreciation are continued.

In the third grade, pupils are taught to read songs at sight by using syllables and then applying the words. Identification of modern orchestral instruments by sight and sound is introduced. Rhythmic activity and theory are continued.

Emphasis is placed on sight singing in the fourth grade. Easy songs should be readily learned. Their rote experience consists mainly of rounds and descants. Several note and rest values are taught. All previous work is carried on.

Pupils in the fifth and sixth grade receive a more advanced instruction in theory. Complicated rhythm patterns are brought out. They are given two-part songs. A study of the four families of instruments is made. Sight singing and appreciation are continued and emphasized.

The following groups comprise the musical activities in the High School: A Junior High School Girls' Glee Club, a High School Girls' Glee Club, a Boys' Glee Club, several instrumental ensembles and an Elementary Band.

Each Glee Club rehearses forty minutes weekly. Occasionally an extra rehearsal is held in the afternoon after school hours. This year the High School Girls' Glee Club with the Junior Class sponsored the Christmas Assembly and with the Senior Class recorded a Christmas program which was broadcast over Radio Station WWNH.

The instrumental ensembles receive at least thirty minutes instruction each, and they vary in number from two to five players. Once a week these instrumentalists assemble in the auditorium for band rehearsal.

An interesting display of new band instruments was held at the Stone School, High School and at a P. T. A. meeting in October. A representative from Hollis Music Supply Company in Boston was present to give information on these instruments. He also described a rental plan whereby a boy or girl could try out an instrument at the lowest possible cost.

To furnish the best data on the possible success of a boy or girl, the McCreery Rhythm and Pitch tests were given to all children from the fifth through the eighth grades. Parents whose children did exceptionally well were notified. Through these tests and demonstrations we were able to recruit a band of twenty-two pieces.

Our plans for the remainder of the year include sending representatives to the New Hampshire Music Festival at Portsmouth, a Spring Concert and Graduation Week Exercises.
