

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Town of Newmarket

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year; as may be necessary for general expenses, election and registration, town buildings, for protection of persons and property, including the police department, health and sanitation, vital statistics, sewer maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments, for education and the public library; for charities, including the decoration of soldiers graves; for recreation; for cemeteries; for interest; for new construction and improvements, for indebtedness to other governmental divisions and to pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures; in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of two percent (2%) on all taxes except poll and head taxes, if paid within fifteen days after receipt of bill.

- 5. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget committee.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$72.00 in addition to that required by law. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to permit the Newmarket Hand Tub Association to use the old fire house on the corner of South Main Street and Spring Street for storage and maintenance of the First Newmarket Hand Tub, as well as for meetings of this association, providing that said association at its own expense repair said fire-house and bear all expense of its maintenance. And to further authorize the selectmen to arrange the necessary terms as to rent or length of time for said permit, as they may deem necessary. By petition.
- 8. To see if the town will raise \$8,000.00 for the purpose of making necessary repairs to the Water Tank. Said money to be raised by notes and/or Bond issue. And that said notes and/or bonds be paid by the town. By petition. Submitted without recommendation.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to resurface and tar the section of Lang's Lane, a distance of approximately 1200 feet leading from Route No. 152 to a distance of 50 feet beyond Harold Melindy's, and appropriate the sum of \$1,350.00 for this purpose. By petition. Not recommended by the budget committee.
- 10. To see if the town will pipe surface water from Nichols Avenue to Elm Street by 8 inch transite about 250 feet at the cost of \$500.00. By petition. Recommended by budget committee.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to give the Planning Board the authority set forth in sections 16-36,

chapter 36, N.H.R.S.A. 1955. These sections give the Planning Board the authorization for the establishment of an official community map, regulate new subdivision of land, provide for the protection of the official map, enforcement of subdivision regulations and the holding of public hearings and appeals. By petition.

PROGRESS REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF THE SELECTMEN

We respectfully submit to the citizens of the Town of Newmarket, a summary of the projects that were undertaken during the past year.

The widening and surfacing of New Road has progressed to a point approximately one and a half miles from its junction with Exeter Street.

The sidewalk construction appropriation was used to purchase and install 1,233 feet and 3 inches of new curbing.

All manholes and storm drains were rebuilt and raised to the new surface. By doing this work the Town received \$13,525.00 of hot-top from the State of New Hampshire.

Ash Swamp Bridge has been completed except for grading, which will be completed this spring.

100 feet of storm drain was installed on Spring Street.

500 feet of new sewer was installed on Bay road.

Neal Mill road was regraded and given one coat of asphalt.

A 1960 2-Ton Chevrolet dump truck was purchased by bid. The bids being:

Rowe Chevrolet Company — \$5,345.00

Tacetta Chevrolet Company — \$5,371.00

Great Bay Motor Company — \$5,289.50

Hackett Chevrolet Company — \$5,386.74

The truck was purchased for the sum of \$5,142.40

The Highway Department received many items such as canvas, lights and many other tools from the Civil Defense at little or no cost to the department.

The parking between Church street and Chapel street has been changed to parellel to improve the flow of traffic in the center of town.

The Town Parking Lot next to the Library has been filled with gravel and graded.

Our regular meetings are held on the first and third Tuesday of each month. All meetings are open to the public and we welcome your attendance. We wish at this time to thank all the townspeople and town officers for their help in making the past years' work a more pleasant and gainful task.

Concord, New Hampshire Summary of Findings and Recommendations

February 18, 1960

Board of Selectmen Newmarket, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Newmarket for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Public Library, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1958 — December 31, 1959

(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$8,354.46 in 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2,

with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual

Revenues:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibits following. As indicated by the budget summary, Exhibit 4-A), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$19,378.72, less a revenue surplus of \$1,582.92, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$17,795.80.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures veri-

fied. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected takes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus — Deficit:

It is noted that the current financial condition of the Town changed from a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$6,658.91 to a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$11,095.55 in 1959, as shown herewith. An annual deficit appropriation of \$3,500.00 should be made for the next three years or until such time as the current deficit is entirely liquidated.

Appropriation Overdrafts and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$19,378.72. In other words—total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount as indicated herewith:

The amount of the overlay is determined by the Selectmen rather than the voters at Town Meeting and is therefore not a budgetary appropriation. The Town Meeting voted to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes in the amount of \$3,400.00, the proceeds of which were to finance the Town's share of the Ash Swamp Road Bridge. The notes, however, were not issued.

The Town Meeting voted to raise \$1,000.00 for the extension of the sewer line on Bay Road. However this appropriation, through error, was omitted from the total appropriations which the Selectmen submitted to the Tax Commission when the 1959 tax rate was approved.

Therefore the actual net overdraft of budgetary appropriations was \$6,343.94 (\$19,378.72 — \$13,034-.78).

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, should have petitioned the Tax Commission for a certificate of emergency to make such expenditures in excess of budgetary appropriations.

Capital Reserve Funds:

It is noted that the sum of \$3,500.00 was appropriated and raised in each of the years 1958 and 1959

for a Capital Reserve Fund for a Public Works Department Building. As of December 31, 1959, this fund amounting to \$7,000.00 had not been turned over to the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds as required by law. This should be done at once.

Chapter 35, Section 12, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, relating to this matter, provides as follows:

"Whenever the vote of the town is to raise and appropriate any sum for the capital reserve fund, the same duties shall devolve upon the town clerk, selectmen, and town treasurer, as specified in Section 11 of this chapter, except that said order must be drawn, and said sum transferred on or before December 31st following said vote."

Monthly Reconciliation of Treasurer's Balance:

The Town Treasurer should reconcile his cash book and bank balance each month when the cancelled checks and statement are returned by the bank.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Newmarket for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Annual Report of The BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

The Water Works operated without interruption or even serious equipment breakdowns during the past year as a result of the capable efforts of Superintendent Richman Walker and his men. A peculiar taste in the water was noted in March 1959 which was traced to sedimented filter beds. These were successfully completely neutralized and cleaned without delay at appreciable cost, thereby removing the taste from the water. The Water Works cooperated with the Highway Department and the old water service lines on Main and Exeter Streets were renewed prior to surfacing of these streets. This will serve to prevent digging up the excellent surface paving on these streets for water lines and the consequent patching up after repairs.

Mr. Ralph Haines has displayed a commendable spirit of public generosity by offering a permanent right of way without cost to the town over his property on Great Hill to permit access to the Water Works for repairs or maintenance to the Standpipe. Mr. C. E. Batchelder and his son Donald have generously offered a temporary right of way privilege for two years over his land at no cost for the same purpose. The Town is fortunate in having public spirited citizens who place the public benefit above their own material gain.

Through the generous auspices of the Civil Defense Unit, headed by Mr. George Hauschel, the Water Works has received and installed an emergenncy electric plant which will furnish power to operate the oil burner and lighting during periods of power failure.

The oil burner at the pumping station has been replaced with a new and more efficient oil burner for reliable operation.

The Standpipe was drained and inspected on July 24. Extensive repairs will be required during the forthcoming year to prolong the life of the tank. This is considered a critical situation and may be expected to cost up to \$8,000.00 to place in good condition.

The pumping and filtering equipment is in good condition. However, minor repairs will be required in the near future to the structure of the filter station.

The Board of Commissioners were saddened by the death of Mr. Benjamin Miller, and the serious illness of Mr. Edgar Moisan during the past year. The loss of these members was seriously felt by the remaining members.

The Water Commissioners wish to take this opportunity to express their appreciation for the excellent cooperation and support that they have received during the past year.

We would like to thank our fellow townspeople for the cooperative spirit which has made the work of our department easier, and makes for more efficient operation.

Again this year, we wish to remind you that permits for outside burning are required by law, compliance with this requirement has been excellent and saved many needless investigations last year. Use of the town dump is recommended for the disposing of trash, this often saves much personal and financial difficulty. In the year 1959 6 out of every 10 fires was caused by debris burners and careless smokers. 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children! If outside burning is the only practical way, burning permits may be obtained by calling the Fire Warden at OL 9-3286, or the Deputy Warden at OL 9-3216.

This past year a portable pump was purchased as planned for forest fire fighting. The sound of the fire alarm has been changed as many have noticed, by the addition of another horn to give alarm coverage over a wider area.

The siren was stolen from the tank truck, with the insurance payment received to cover the loss, a combination loud speaker-penetrator was obtained. This has a multiple use, it not only serves as a siren, can also be used as a public address speaker, and can be connected with the 2-way radio truck and can be heard a greater distance from the truck.

While the road paving crew was doing Main street the fire station year was repaved and breaks in the surface eliminated.

A new 30 ft. ladder was purchased and will be installed on the tank truck.

This coming year we would like to extend our fire alarm system to include New Road, pull in new wire where it is necessary, and replace an old alarm box. Some new 2½" hose will have to be bought an additional fog nozzle is needed, and other small pieces of equipment. The outside of the firehouse should be painted soon.

Judge of the Newmarket Municipal Court All members of this department wish to remember him as a close associate, friend and adviser. And in this Town year report of 1960, we wish to Honor him for his many years of service rendered this department.

In May of 1959 this department also lost the service of one of its good regular police officers, Everett R. Ryan. Needless to say we were sorry to lose him, but after a long period of illness, he was

compelled on the advice of his doctor to render his resignation.

The Town lost a considerable amount of revenue in its Court cases in the year 1959, due to the fact that we were without a Municipal Court Judge until about the middle of June. Previous to this time we were complelled to take our cases in the Exeter Municipal Court, we then made arrangements with Judge Chase of the Epping Municipal to come to Newmarket once a week to hear our cases. And of course all revenue derived from these cases, such as fines and Court expense, went to the Court before which the case was heard.

In the month of June the Governor and his Council made two appointments. Attorney Russell H. McGuirk was appointed Judge of the Newmarket Municipal Courts and Attorney John A. Edgerly, Jr., was appointed Associate Judge.

We wish at this time to congratulate them on their appointments. Our thanks to both Judge Mc-Guirk and associate Judge Edgerly, for their patient assistance and cooperation given us in the past months.

The numbers of hours put in by the regular three men on the forces adds up to a total of 7,632 hours.

The six special police officers whose duties require them to police such special events as dances, carnivals, basketball games, parades, beggers night, and hallo-ween, plus doing regular police duty for the Town. In the 301 assignments they have officiated, they have accounted for a total of 1,402 hours.

To the six special police officers who sacrifice their leisure time, that they might be of service to the department, as well as to the community, I extend to them sincere thanks and appreciation for the good service and cooperation I have recieved from them.

The commendation above also applies to the two full time police officers, who are equal and share the responsibility of the job.

To the various other departments of the Town of Newmarket, to the business men, and to the public in general, I extend a vote of thanks for making my job possible, with the good relationship extended to me and my department, I thank you.

REPORT OF NEWMARKET CIVIL DEFENSE

To the citizens of Newmarket:

I submit my first annual report as Civil Defense Director of the town of Newmarket. The facts and figures presented here are for the fiscal year 1959.

At the time of this report there are many people who do not realize the meaning of Civil Defense. To the citizens who have worked with CD and to those families that have prepared for an enemy attack it means self preservation and survival of those who have prepared for an emergency. How many people in Newmarket are in this category of preparedness. One must realize that we are no longer living in a world of isolation and an enemy can attack at any time. Without knowledge of what to do and how to cope with any arising situation many lives will be lost. Do YOU as a citizen and taxpayer know that there is an active CD group in Newmarket that have put in many hours of work without pay to prepare for an emergency of any type, regardless of the time, place, or situation.

It is because of this threat of enemy attack that the Federal Government has made available to the cities and towns surplus equipment for use in emergencies, not only arising from enemy attack, but for local disastors, floods, fires, accidents, storms, etc.

During the fiscal year 1959, Newmarket purchased \$9,254.49 worth of surplus from the state CD agency in Concord with a \$500.00 budget.

The following is a list of major equipment purchased in 1959:

1. A new 15KVW generator for use of the water works for \$150.00, cost to the government \$4,160.00.

- 2. A new 7½ horse outboard motor for use on the police boat, cost to us \$30.00, cost to the government \$225.00.
- 3. A panel truck worth \$1,575.00 for \$25.00 for use of the fire department. This truck is equipped with a portable pump, generator, resuscitator, scott air pack, gas masks, canvas, rope, and wrecking bars. Most of this equipment was carried on the fire trucks previous to the purchase of the emergency truck. This equipment is all on one truck which is a great advantage to the department.
- 4. A new generator through matching funds for \$143.00 for use of the fire department. This is for use in any existing emergency and will run the furnace and lights in the fire house. This generator can also be taken to the scene of accidents, fires, etc.
- 5. 60 cots which cost the town \$30.00, cost to the government \$450.00. These costs have been distributed among the various departments.

Also many small tools, for use of fire, police, and highway departments.

This equipment must be accounted for by your local CD Director, and can not be sold or traded at any time. The state CD agency has a complete list of all equipment issued to the town and they must know how it is being used.

At this time I wish to thank the members of the Newmarket CD unit for their faithful attendance and enthusiasm shown during the past year. Not one member has let your local Director down when asked to perform his duty. The town of Newmarket should be proud to have an organization like this.

For this reason an article in the Town Warrant has been drawn up to allow the Planning Board Authority to control future development, insofar as land use is concerned.

Through the efforts of Frank Schanda, we were able to secure an up-to-date map of the entire town, plus a blow-up of the center of town.

The Board's 1960 program is to secure all available information on Federal funds available for the town's departments.

A Planning Board must have the aid and cooperation of everyone in order to function to the best advantages of the town, for this reason we invite the ideas of the community.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1958 and June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$14,162.33 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

(Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School Dsitrict during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Estimated and Actual Revenues

(Exhibit D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibit D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D) a net revenue surplus of \$5,209.38 plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$952.95, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$6,162.33.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket I herewith submit my report on the status and needs of our schools:

The schools are providing an adequate education education for the pupils at the present time. This I believe is due in large part to the staff. However, they have not received the help they should have, nor do they have all the aids and guides they need to better provide for the various learning experiences that should be presented in the classroom. This is not the responsibility of any one in particular but the fact is evident and therefore we should analyze it carefully.

To begin with, just what type of education do you want for your children? Are you satisfied when they will be able to read the newspapers or magazines, to keep an account of money earned and spent, to be able to write a letter; or do you desire that they might be given the type of education to be able to go to college or other school of specialization. Do you wish them mass educated, or do you hope for some specialized and individualized type of education? Do you want them trained to cope with a home and job or educated to work, think and act as an alert free citizen? Answers to these questions are important because they provide the School Board and Superintendent, as well as the staff with a framework within which to work. Where do our schools fit in relation to the previous questions? Presently I would say somewhere in between. There are things being taught in the classroom that could just as well be learned at home. This means homework and time spent at

home with your children learning what material was presented at school, as well as giving the child information in conjunction with it. You, the parent, are a teacher as well as the person at school. There are things that should be presented in the classroom that are not presently provided. This is due to many factors, such as classrooms too large to provide individual attention, teachers not having a specified area in which to work and many more.

By now you have an idea of what my philosophy is. To state it a little more clearly, I would like to see each child prepared to cope with the complexities of twenty years hence and to be able to sift the good from the bad, be prepared to make decisions based on past knowledge and skills and provide a worthwhile home, as well as provide civic responsibilities as called upon. It isn't necessary to review the terrific progress of the last twenty years to create a concept of what the next twenty years will be like. This is being done for you every day. Children should have a more specialized and individualized education to withstand, understand and help formulate the future.

What are some of our needs? Those that should be provided as soon as possible are:

- 1. Reduction of class size to 25 or a maximum of 30.
- 2. The development of a program of minimum essentials This would provide criteria for promotion or non-promotion and assist in the establishment of a certain block of work for the year.
- 3. The development of a program of studies in each subject area and in each grade This will help to unify what is taught from grade

to grade as well as act as a guide for the teachers.

- 4. The development of a basic series in reading, arithmetic, science, social studies, English, spelling, etc. This will eliminate gaps in learning and provide better basic material for the pupils.
- 5. A study and re-valuation of our reporting procedure. Does this present method tell you, the parent, what you really should know? I personally do not feel that it does.
- 6. The development of an adequate permanent record system.
- 7. Adequate supervision of staff and schools—
 It's humanly impossible to cover this area adequately. An addition to the staff is necessary to carry on adequate and thorough assistance for the staff. I have averaged 2,000 miles a month between 8:00 a.m. and midnight, attempting to make the rounds.

I have found it necessary to recommend a helping teacher. This person could carry on some of the office functions I am presently doing, thus permitting me to be in the schools more frequently, and as the New Hampshire R.S.A. 186:11 states "to give helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils and parents... as a constructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children, solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adopting the program of studies to meet the needs... bring resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, parents and community."

The following should be studied and considered:

- 1. A class for the mentally retarded.
- 2. A better guidance program.
- 3. Classes for the academically superior.
- 4. A program for inservice training for teachers.

To conclude, I will exert every effort to see that the best is provided for your children within the framework you create. It will be a pleasure to continue working for you as I have confidence that you want your child to be able to compete with any other child, regardless of the place or community in this shrinking world of ours.

TIME SCHEDULE

The school day commences at 8:25 a.m. and classes and at 2:50 p.m. The school days consists of six one-hour periods with twenty minutes allowed for lunch.

TEACHERS

On the opening day of the school year there were many changes in our teaching staff. Mr. Keith Bond replaced Mr. Willis Cobb as our advanced math instructor. Mr. Peter Mooney replaced Mr. Joseph Crotty as Biology instructor. Mr. Dean DesRoches came to us from Henniker replacing Mrs. Cobb as Music Supervisor. Miss Susan Keene, home economics teacher, was replaced by Mrs. Denise Skillings, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, Mr. Antonoplos replaced Mrs. Ashton as a teacher in the Junior High. Mr. Melvin Cross replaced Mr. Thomas Makris as coach and Physical Education director and Miss Marcel Houle replaced Mrs. Carney as English instructor. Mrs. Shirley Walker was given the position as Girl's Coach and Physical Education instructor.

CURRICULUM

Newmarket High School for the first time in many years has finally been recognized as a fully Comprehensive High School and is fully accredited. Courses that were added this year are as follows: History of Art, Sociology and French III. Mr. Wade, Superintendent of Schools, and your Principal, will go over the present curriculum in the near future

and make a complete study to find out if we can economize in future years.

This year for the first time in many years we offered Adult Education Courses at night and we hope to continue this practice in future years.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND ATHLETICS

Mrs. Shirley Walker has been hired as Physical Education Director for the girls. This has helped Girl's Physical Education to a great extent. Mrs. Walker is also the girl's coach.

Mr. Cross has replaced Mr. Makris as the Boys' Physical Education Director and also as Varsity Basketball Coach.

Each student in high school, if posible, takes physical education two times a week. These classes consist of calisthenics, learning of different rules and regulations and group games.

Once again I wish to thank the members of the School Board, Superintendent and staff for their wonderful help and co-operation which they have given me this past year.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with great pleasure that I submit this, my third annual report as principal of the Newmarket Elementary Schools.

TEACHERS

The teachers at the Stone School remained the same as in 1958-59. Mrs. Mildred Rooney in Grade 6 and Mrs. Ruth Robie in Grade 5. There were three personnel changes at the Central School. Mrs. Jean Lancaster replaced Mrs. Carolyn Reed in Grade 1, Miss Ann Hutchins replaced Mrs. Frances Nesbitt in Grade 2, and Mrs. Naomi Charest replaced Mrs. Irene LaBranche in Grade 3. Mr. Edward O'Connor remains as teacher in Grade 4.

CHANGES and IMPROVEMENTS

This year, at the Stone School, a new flourescent lighting system has been installed, as well as five storm windows on the second floor of the building. The door on the rear of the building has been replaced by a new one.

At the Central School, the steeple, which was hit by lightning, has been removed. We are also in the process of renovating a downstairs room into a teachers' room.

New equipment that has been purchased for the school consists of a tape recorder, two television sets, one for the Stone School and one for the Central School, and new desks for Grades 3 and 4. We have now replaced all the desks from Grades 1 to 6 over the last three year period. A new Ditto duplicating machine was also purchased for the school.

TESTING

Both intelligence and achievement tests are to be administered in all grades this year. This program is now being put into effect on a union wide basis.

Intelligence testing will take place in February, and achievement testing will be done in May.

I wish to extend my appreciation and sincere thanks to the Members of the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers and all others who have assisted in making this a successful school year.

GUIDANCE REPORT

"Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free."

To the School Board and the Citizens of Newmarket:

The duty of publicly supported educational institutions, especially those that operate under the compulsory attendance law, is to help all pupils no matter what their intellectual level might be.

Just as the guidance program is expected to be of service to teachers, administration, and others, so also are the contributions of these persons important for the most effective functioning of the guidance services. All persons who are in positions to make constructive contributions constitute the guidance team. Each is an important member of the team and has a definite contribution to make to the effectiveness of the total guidance program. No one group of persons, however, is the exclusively important key to the guidance situation. All are important. Their responsibilities and work must be coordinated, and they must work constructively and cooperatively toward the attainment of a goal which should basically be to:

- 1. Know thoroughly each individual pupil as a total, functioning person.
- 2. Explore the economic and social nature of the community.
- 3. Organize and make available all this information so that school experiences can be created to meet the above mentioned.
- 4. Provide personal conferences with each pupil in order to assist (not dictate) the pupil in the area of his choices, plans and adjustments.
- 5. Help each pupil understand himself thoroughly.

- 6. Make available systematically to each pupil information that has a bearing on the choices, plans and adjustments that he must make.
- 7. Make available an orientation program which starts when the pupil enters school, continues through school and later leaves school.
- 8. Check regularly to see whether a pupil is succeeding in his plans and adjustments.
- 9. Evaluate constantly the school activities in light of the changes in the school, community and the world, and in light of the successes and failures of the individuals who are in, or have gone through the school system.

The detailed presentation of these functions outlined above should be the content of "our" guidance program.

To fulfill these objectives certain means are utilized. The testing program this year has been expanded to include the following.

It is perhaps worthwhile to repeat once again that parents are invited to ask for a conference with the guidance director concerning the results of these tests, their child's future plans and present competence. The importance of this cannot be impressed too much as *you* are the primary architect of your child's future. Do not wait until the child is in the latter stages of his high school education — plan early. To help your child you must know him.

NEEDS OF THE DEPARTMENT

- 1. More, and better, career and general guidance pamphlets, brochures, etc. Much of our present material is long outdated.
- , 2. A pleasanter atmosphere for guidance and counseling.
- 3. A definite and systematic organization of high school subject matter and career planning.
 - 4. Group guidance opportunities.
- 5. Consultation with prespective employers in all fields to discuss their expectations of future and present employees.
- 6. Incentive programs for future college students such as cholarships, grants, loans and bequests.
- 7. An awareness of the value of a college education by all concerned.

ACCOMPLISHMENT THROUGH THE YEAR

This year 47 students were administered the National Education Development Test, 12 students the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and every student from Grades 7-12, some form of intelligence, aptitude or achievement test. New cumulative record folders are being utilized this year in an effort to coordinate the administrative and guidance records. A bibliography of all material in the department is now available to any interested student, for-

mer student or parent. Requests have been made for monetary assistance under Title V of the "National Defense Act of 1958". Assistance obtained through the State Department of Education and the University of New Hampshire on our testing program made helpful reductions in the cost of this program.

In conclusion, I would like to extend sincere appreciation to the faculty, administration and school board for their assistance and cooperation in carrying on this program. It is hoped that the objectives, as stated, have been accomplished and that in future years the program will continue to expand and assist your children to prepare themselves and find a place in the world.

MUSIC REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

Music has always been a significant influence in the lives of people, individually and collectively. Its power to stir the emotions and to modify human behavior, known throughout history, has gained wider and more varied applications in modern life. The capacity to enjoy and to benefit from the many opportunities for musical experiences as a listener, participant or producer will depend in large measure upon the kind and quality of music education offered in the public schools.

The goal of our music education program is to help children find happiness now, and to grow into well integrated adults. To accomplish this goal the following activities have been carried on:

ELEMENTARY PROGRAM

Beginning with the First Grade this program has included many and varied opportunities for singing; listening; responding to rhythm; playing instruments; originating rhythms, words and melodies; selecting and organizing programs. With the assistance of the Grade School Teachers the following activities have been channeled specifically to each level:

Grade I — 1. Rhythm band. 2. First formal acquaintance with music.

Grade II — 1. Individual participation. 2. Basic note reading and terminology. 3. Program planning.

Grade III — 1. Building a singing repertoire 2. Playing instruments (piano & flutophone). 3. First approach to part singing.

Grade IV — 1. Acquaintance with the music masters. 2. Square and folk dancing.

Grade V — 1. More intensive rhythm activities. 2. Advanced instrumental work. 3. Music listening activities.

Grade VI — 1. Advanced instrumental work 2. Two and three part songs. 3. Appreciation of "the world of music."

The Grammar School Chorus consisting of approximately 50 members has as its objective to deal with more advanced music (terminology, part singing, training of voices, and basic choral experience). We have spent a good share of the year on "Songs of the Civil War Period."

JUNOIR HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

Newmarket should be rightfully proud that they offer the Junior High School 3 periods of music per week (2 chorus and 1 general music). The chorus has made much progress and its graduating members will be an asset to our high school chorus next year. All 75 members have had advanced work in harmony and sight-singing and now have a commendable repertoire of music. The General Music Class in the 7th Grade for the first half of the year has delved into all aspects of music (listening, participting, anaylzing, etc.). The second half of the year was devoted to a study of "America and Its Heritage of Music." The Eighth Grade General Music Class also delved into all aspects of music during the first half of the year including a formal unit on basic musical knowledge. The last half of the year was devoted to the "Influence of Music and Musicians from the Past."

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

In September, 67 members of the high school enrolled as members of the glee club and planned the following program of activities: (1) Annual Talent Show, (2) First Annual Christmas Concert, and (3) First Invitational Festival. Other activities were also engaged in during the year.

Chorus, the same as any other activity or formal class, should be a learning experience. Thus, it is basically imperative that there not be just singing, but understanding and appreciation. To make this possible an assortment of classical, standard and popular choral music has been utilized. Through their rehearsals each week the chorus has progressed quite well. It is hoped that each member realizes that this is a "course" which demands self-discipline. Only

through this method may we realize the utmost in our potential.

Music and Art Appreciation, offered to members of Grade 11 and 12, was instructed by Mr. Kasiaras, whose vast knowledge of the subject(s) gave a pleasing atmosphere to the course.

To offer a well-rounded education in musical activities, Band was initiated for High School and grammar school students. After much discouragement on the part of students, parents and supervisor, this activity finally came to be. It is hoped that next year through a more efficient recrutment program that the band will become a recognized fixture in the school curriculum. At present there are 2 suggestions for its betterment: (1) definite practice facilities for the grammar school, and (2) an awareness by all concerned that this activity has a place in our educational system.

Appreciation should be shown to the teachers, administrators, school board, parents group, and others for the many kindnesses they have shown to me in my first year in Newmarket.

SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM — 1959

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with sincere pleasure that I submit this, my second report of the school health services of this community.

As good health is vitally important to the scholastic abilities of a student, it has been recommended by the state that all students receive a complete physical examination every three years.

Newmarket schools have adopted such a program. It was started this year, and will be carried on every year hereafter. We are very fortunate in having Dr. Irving E. Brown, Jr., appointed as school physician.

Grades 1, 4, 7, 11, and all students participating in athletics will receive physicals this year. Urine tests for sugar and albumin and blood hemoglobin will be done at the same time.

Pre-School Clinics

Two clinics were held in the spring to examine and register children who were to enter school in September. Physical examinations were given by Dr. Brown. Ten children were vaccinated. The number attending were: Central School, 17; St. Mary's School, 30.

Parents who have children who will enter school in September, 1960, must have their child vaccinated before school begins. The child must be 6 years of age before January 1, 1961. Please see your family doctor about polio and booster innoculations if you have not already done so.

Dental Clinic

Again this year there will be no dental clinics. Parents are doing extremely well in seeing that their

children visit their dentist at least once a year. Good food and proper care at home are also important to the growth and durability of your childs' teeth.

Innoculation Clinics

February through May, 1959

A series of free clinics were held during these months under the joint sponsorship of the Newmarket Womens' Club and the P.T.A.

The following innoculations were given:
Triple-toxoid (diptheria, tetanus, whoop. cough) 93
Double-toxoid (diptheria, tetanus) 32
Booster (double and triple) 152
Vaccinations (smallpox immunizations) 48
Polio (first, second and third shots) 83

Hot Lunch Program

The hot lunch program is being favorably received again this year at the Central School. It is under the sponsorship of the P.T.A. and the town and directed by Mrs. E. Dearborn.

The children look forward to delicious meals served from a clean kitchen by Mrs. B. Miller and Mrs. M. Cashman.

Health Inspections

These are the routine examinations given by the school nurse periodically throughout the school year. They include height and weight; hair and skin inspections; nutrition; and vision and hearing tests.
