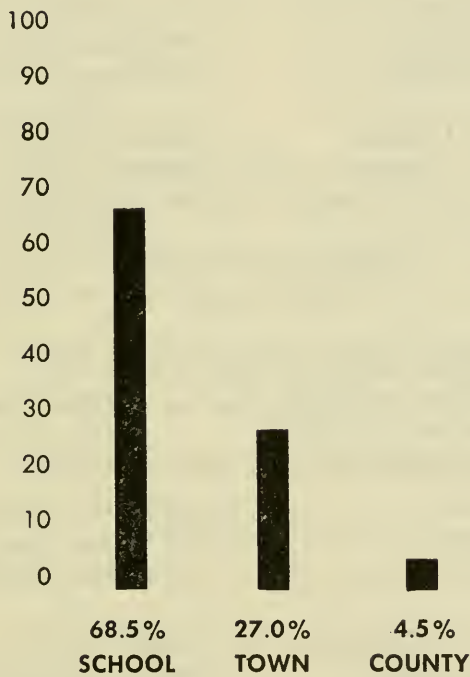

The meeting was called to order by Ronald Lemieux, Moderator.

The moderator then read the Warrant for this Special Town Meeting. He then declared the polls open and that they would close at 6:00 P.M.

At 6:00 P.M. the moderator declared the polls closed and the balloting was reported as follows:

**W A R R A N T**  
**STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

**Town of Newmarket**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 5th day of March, 1974, to act on the following subjects:

(POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 6:00 P.M.)

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year; as may be necessary for General Government including Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, town buildings, for the protection of persons and property, including the Police Department, for health and sanitation, vital statistics, general expenses of the departments, for education and the public library, for charities, including decoration of soldiers' graves, for recreation, for indebtedness to other governmental divisions and to pay all other necessary charges arising within said Town.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures; in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two percent (2%) on all taxes except resident taxes, if paid within fifteen days after receipt of bill.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee.

6. To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the Fire Department One Hundred Twenty-two dollars (\$122.00) in addition to that required by law. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

7. To see whether the Town will vote to join the Strafford-Rockingham Regional Planning Council and authorize the Towns' representation to the Strafford Regional Planning Commission to act as delegates to that council. (Recommended by the budget committee.)

8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Fund the sum of Three Thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for the senior citizens to acquire a Drop-In-Center. Such appropriation would be applied toward the rent and utilities for a building of their choice. (Submitted by petition.) (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds, to install a surface drainage system in Maplecrest. (Submitted by petition.) (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to create, establish, and maintain a Mosquito Control District. (Submitted by petition.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to seek the assistance of the N.H. State Department of Revenue Administration, to make a complete reappraisal, of all real estate within



the Town and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) therefore. (Submitted by petition.) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the State of New Hampshire to re-assess all property in the Town of Newmarket, and to authorize the Selectmen to pay for said reappraisal over a three year period, starting in 1975. Said appraisal to be paid from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

14. To see if the Town will vote to have the list of all taxable property, including land and buildings, and their 1973 assessed valuations, included in the 1974 Town Report and to appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$350.00), to cover the cost of so doing. (Submitted by petition.) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

15. To see if the Town will vote to require the Public Works Department to clean and repair the catch basins and sixteen inch line that drains the surface water from Elm Street and Nichols Avenue. (Submitted by petition.) (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to allocate Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds to the Newmarket Day Care Center. Said funds to be used to purchase and install Kalwall windows for the first story of the Day Care Center building. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to be granted to the N. H. Division of Welfare for the purpose of obtaining a Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollar (\$7,500.00) Federal match for a total of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to partially support the expenses of

operating an outreach program at the Newmarket Health Center. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be used to purchase channel marker buoys for the Lamprey River. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property of the Town acquired by Tax Collector's deeds, as the result of tax sales, by sealed bids and/or by public auction.

20. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen to withdraw Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) from the Public Works Capital Reserve Funds for the purchase of a dump truck. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds, for use as set-offs, against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated, or take any other action hereon:

General Expenses, Public Works Department

22. To see if the Town of Newmarket will authorize the Water Board to spend the sum of Thirty-one Thousand Dollars (\$31,000.00) for the development of a gravel packed well and pumping station building at the site of the

present water supply at the Plains. The sum of Nineteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$19,500.00) to be borrowed by notes or bonds and be repaid over a five (5) year period out of Water Revenue. The remaining cost of this project will be paid out of the Water Revenue Surplus of 1973. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

23. To see if the Town of Newmarket will authorize the Water and Sewer Commissioners to place all special fees, tapping fees, and/or entrance fees, so-called in a trust fund to be used for the replacement, improvement and/or expansion of the present and future respective systems. (Submitted by petition.) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

24. To see if the Town of Newmarket will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept Federal and/or State aid relative to disasters.

25. To see if the Town of Newmarket will authorize the Selectmen to enter into negotiations and agreements relative to an area recycling and incineration program. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

26. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote to authorize the purchase of a new pumper for the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) and to raise Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund of the Fire Department toward said purchase. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

27. Shall the provisions for Absentee Ballot for the election of Town Officers be adopted by this Town? (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

28. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote pursuant to New Hampshire PSA 31:105 and 31:106 to indemnify and save harmless for loss or damage, any of the Board of Selectmen and the Town's Administrative Staff

or Agencies, from personal financial loss and expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person, or accidental damage to, or destruction of property or violation of the Civil Rights of a person, if the indemnified person at the time of the act or accident resulting in the injury, damage, destruction, or violation was acting on the scope of his employment or office.

## ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

It is our pleasure to present the progress report to the townspeople of Newmarket. We also wish to take this opportunity to thank all of the department heads, employees and fellow citizens of Newmarket, who through their cooperation, hard work and tolerance, have made the job as Selectmen a pleasant and rewarding experience throughout the year.

The tax anticipation loans were awarded to the Indian Head National Bank, Newmarket Branch.

The low bid for our new police cruiser was awarded to Great Bay Motor Co., Inc.

The fuel and gasoline bids were awarded to H. R. Haines Co., Inc.

The town's hot topping program was continued with the use of federal revenue sharing funds. Spring Street, South Street, Creighton Street, Prescott Street, Tasker Lane and Lamprey Street were re-surfaced during the year.

The Gerry Avenue project was partially completed, the project will be finished in 1974.

Hersey Lane was the project selected for the use of Town Road Aid funds.

The Bandstand roof, the Town Hall roof and snow guards for the Town Hall roof were awarded to the Therrian Roofing Company of Manchester. These jobs were started and will be completed in 1974. This project will be paid from Revenue Sharing Funds.

The town has been funded, under the Federal Public Employment Program, for the following non-budgeted positions. Dump custodian, police dispatcher, water treat-

ment plant operator. We have also been authorized to hire an assessor under this program.

The selectmen are in the process of assembling an employees policy manual.

The town's entire insurance program has been studied, with the hope of combining the various policies under a single master policy.

The new fire alarm system has been installed by the fire department. It was purchased with federal revenue sharing funds.

The re-building of the town clock will be completed this year. The Selectmen wish to thank the Kingston-Warren Corp. for the donation of men, material and equipment to this project.

We would like to take this opportunity to encourage all interested citizens to attend our Selectmen's meetings. They are held in the Town Hall Office every Wednesday evening, starting at 7:00 P.M.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

The well on the Plains has produced 51,100,00 gallons of water in the past year and the Water Board now feels that this area has proven itself as a good water source so we are recommending that the existing five points now in the ground be replaced by a gravel packed well. An article is being submitted in the warrant to authorize the expenditure of \$31,500.00 to install this gravel packed well and to build a house to enclose the pump and other equipment. The cost of these improvements will be paid from water revenues.

The new well-site will give the Town a good secondary source of water which can be used if we need repairs to our main plant or if we have a breakdown at our main plant. It also provides better water and cheaper water than our main plant because it requires no filtering or chemical treating.

The water commissioners have also investigated the need for repairs to our existing tank on Great Hill as well as the replacement of the existing 225,000 gallon tank with a 1,000,000 gallon tank. We plan to have some recommendations on the storage tank by the town meeting in March of 1975.

The Board is also looking into some proposals made by the Engineering Firm of Weston & Sampson for improvements to the water treatment plant but these are considered secondary to the well and the storage tank.

There will be a change in the billing effective April 1, 1974.

The Water Commissioners meet the second Monday of every month at the Newmarket Water Works on Packers Falls Road at 7:00 p.m.

## LIBRARY REPORT 1973

Once again a very active year for the Newmarket Library.

In complying with new regulations for Federally Funded Libraries, we added a new librarian. Mr. Robert Stone of Newmarket. The library is now open a total of 25 hours a week, it is also open 6 days for the convenience of our patrons.

The Newmarket Girl Scouts planted 100 tulip bulbs, acquired thru the County Extension Service, at the library in November.

Mrs. Carrie Gray and Mr. Isabelle Dearborn have again given much time in volunteer services and the library and librarian thank them.

More repairs are anticipated for 1974 to really put the library in good condition. A complete painting of the interior is needed. We hope the towns people will feel it worthwhile and be proud that we have such a fine building.

This year the Newmarket Fire Dept. purchased a new Gamewell Central Office Control Switchboard, which transmits all fire alarm boxes that are on our system. This system is approved by the National Fire Protection Association. This new system will allow us to increase the amount of street boxes that we have on the line. We have added two new boxes to the system and they are Box 38 which is at Great Hill Terrace and Box 141 which is at Rockingham Gas Company. We are planning on an addition of two new boxes this year which will be box 67 at the Newmarket-Durham town line, and box 57 on Packers Falls Road and Lafayette Street. This new system is replacing the system that was installed in the Fire House around the year 1890.

This year we have purchased more new equipment to bring our department up to date. This includes three new monitoring radios, and one new portable radio. We purchased 200 ft. of 1½ inch hose, replaced six pairs of boots

for fire personnel and replaced most of our old metal helmets with the new type helmets.. We also bought a water thief and have purchased a cascade system for refilling our air cylinders without relying on other towns to do this job for us. Two new fire alarm boxes were purchased to replace boxes on the system that were far out of date. The 1,000 gal. tanker that was donated by Richard Gallant to the fire department has been put to good use at the dump during the summer months. With this piece of equipment we do not have to put one of our first line pieces of equipment in the dump area. This truck will be painted this year and made to look more like a fire truck.

Again this year, men from our department attended Fire Training School.

Just a reminder on the state wide regulation governing all outdoor burning. All fires must be before 9:000 a.m. or after the hour of 5:00 p.m. The following are the names and numbers to call for a permit.

## NEWMARKET CIVIL DEFENSE – 1973

Your Newmarket Civil Defense Director has the following to report for the year 1973.

The P and A (personnel and administrative) program is now in effect and has worked well for the first year. The total Civil Defense budget is \$2500.00, of which the Federal Government pays the town \$1,250.00 and \$1,250.00 is raised in taxes. A complete breakdown of the Civil Defense expenses appears in the breakdown of the budget.

Major programs for 1973 were the following:

Distribution of booklets on “What To Do In A Disaster”. Help in the installation of new fire alarm wire from the fire house to the whistle in the tower. Two walkie talkies were bought: one for the Highway Department and one for the Ambulance Corps.

All Departments have been finally linked together on the local radio frequency; this system allows your local government to operate on an independent basis by itself and not bother other towns unless help is desired thru mutual aid or the sheriff’s department.

Other notes of interest are:

A centrally located base station and antenna will be erected near the Day Care Center on the old Public Service pole; units will then be operated by remote control from the various departments.

Five hundred sand bags were given to the town of Newmarket at no charge when the dam burst at the Water Works.

All departments have brought their Civil Defense annex reports (showing departmental structure) up to date to keep us on the surplus list.

Two bull horns were purchased, one for the fire department and one for the police department. These can be used for crowd control, lost persons, etc.

At the end of this report is the organization chart of your local Civil Defense structure.

Once again, thanks to all for your cooperation in 1973.

## AMBULANCE CORPS REPORT

As another year closes the Ambulance Corps, like all other Town Departments, finds its services increasing daily. During 1973 the Corps responded to 148 calls, traveling some 2,900 miles. The number of calls increased by 25%, as compared to the previous year.

The Corps sponsored two Red Cross Courses during the year. Ten people took these courses and joined the Corps. Present membership in the group now numbers twenty-one, of which nine are Emergency Medical Technicians. Everyone in the Corps is a volunteer. No one in the Corps is paid for his or her time. The good will of the people in the Ambulance Corps is what is supplying the citizens of Newmarket with Ambulance service twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

One of the most noticeable changes in the Ambulance Corps is the new orange and white color of the ambulance. The vehicle truly looks like an ambulance now.

## OYSTER RIVER HOME HEALTH ASSOCIATION

The Oyster River Home Health Association is a Visiting Nurse Association incorporated February 12, 1967, to serve the towns of Durham, Lee, Madbury and Newmarket. The Board of Directors consists of five residents from each of the towns; standing committees include representatives from related professional fields.

Because our fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30, we are reporting statistics and projects for the year July 1, 1972 thru June 30, 1973. Each report in your town report from now on will be based on a July 1 to June 30 year.

In the past year we have made great strides in the field of Maternal and Child Health. Our Well Child Conference continues to be held at the Newmarket Fire Station on the third Monday of each month. The number of patients grows as does the quality of service, due partly to a Grant from the State of New Hampshire to help finance these services. Total attendance at the Well Child Conferences for 1972-73 was 281. (Durham - 40; Lee - 28; Madbury - 19; Newmarket - 194.) In addition to the Well Child Conference, this Agency participated in Hearing and Vision Screening Clinics in Newmarket and Durham schools; measles immunization clinics in Newmarket and Durham last winter when the measles epidemic was declared; and Tine Testing in the Lee Cooperative Nursery School and the Newmarket Day Care Center.

We have a contract with Dover Family Planning whereby they refer expectant mothers in the Durham, Lee, Madbury area to us for pre-natal assistance as well as post-natal visits if necessary. In addition, we continue to make a free visit to each new baby and mother in our four town area.

The Aftercare Program, involving follow-up of patients



released from the State Hospital in the Newmarket area, was not funded in 1972-73. However, we do expect funding for 1973-74. This program involves not only visits to the released patients, but many meetings and conferences attended by the Administrative Nurse regarding progress and care of these patients.

Additional services for the past year included a Diabetic Screening Clinic in Newmarket and Durham; a Pap Smear Clinic at the Newmarket Health Center; teaching program on the "Application of Pressure Dressings" at the Little People's Center and "The Function of a Home Health Agency" presented to the Newmarket High School Health class.

Along with all our expanded services, we continue to visit any patients referred to us by a physician. The working day for our Administrative Nurse is 8:00 to 4:00. The phone (868-5055) will always be answered between 8:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. It is also possible to reach the Administrative Nurse after Noon providing she does not have any meetings or educational functions to attend. Our Physical Therapist is available for this service with a doctor's order. Statistics on visits and nursing hours and patient categories follow this report.

The Association is supported by tax deductible contributions from organizations and individuals, by memorial gifts, memberships, nursing fees, and funds voted by the four towns. In addition, we have received grants from the State and Federal government for specific programs for specific periods of time. Continued support from the towns at the 1974 Town Meetings is anticipated.

Our nurses spent a total of 3,688½ hours on the job. 73% of this time was spent visiting referred patients, recording charts and conferences and phone calls with physicians regarding these patients. The other 27% was devoted to clinics, community projects, staff development and in-service education, vacations and holidays. The Agency Staff is made up of one full time Administrative Nurse and two part-time nurses. There is a Physical Therapist, under contract, and a part-time bookkeeper-secretary.

In our total of 1616 Skilled Nursing Visits (does not include Physical Therapy) the patient data was as follows:

Age Range: Under 28 days - 64; 28 days to 1 year - 74; 1 yr. to 5 yrs. - 107; 6 yrs. to 20 yrs. - 79; 21 yrs. to 44 yrs. - 215; 45 yrs. to 64 yrs. - 165 and 65 years and over - 912. As you can see, the balance of our daily work involves patients who are over 65.

We made 261 Health Promotion Visits (Disease Prevention and Disease Intervention) and 1355 Disease Control Visits.

We had 346 Admissions; 61 Readmissions; 1171 Revisits and 315 Discharges.

There are five categories for paying fees. We made 569 No Charge or Free visits; 555 Contract Visits (Medicare,

insurance); 224 Visits where the patient paid the full fee charged; 208 visits where the patient was only able to pay part fee and 60 visits were made to patients unable to afford any fee.

These statistics are kept by the Agency as a requirement of the State. They are submitted to the State bi-annually and the State compiles the figures from all of the Agencies all over the State.

## NEWMARKET DAY CARE CENTER REPORT

September 1, 1972 to August 31, 1973

In September 1972, when the Center opened for the Winter Program, there were 75 pre-schoolers enrolled (more than one-half from Newmarket) as well as 10 after-schoolers and a waiting list of 15 children. The goals of the Center were then, and are now, to provide a homelike atmosphere for children and to offer varied experiences so that they will: (1) learn to be with other children, (2) develop an interest and joy in learning, (3) develop security and a feeling of success, (4) develop self-expression and creativity, (5) develop self-control and responsibility and, (6) develop respect for self and others.

The program operated on a 49-week basis, five days a week, from 6:30 A.M. to 5:15 P.M. There were 18 paid staff who guided and encouraged each child with the aid of volunteers and U.N.H. students. The quality of the program and the condition of the building did depend, and still does, upon the funding and from where it comes.

The Center received a donation of \$5,000.00 in 1973, which was put up as the State's share for Federal matching funds through Title IV A. It is the hope of the Center to be able to continue to raise tax deductible matching funds through local support and thus be able to keep the control of the Center in the hands of local people.

The Council, which is the governing board, has representatives from the community, parents and staff. It has accomplished many improvements on the building in the past year and has plans for all new windows this coming year. Continued support from towns and individuals will determine how much they can do. Membership on the Council is open to all interested persons.

## **Report From The**

### **NEW HAMPSHIRE SEACOAST REGIONAL**

### **DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION**

During the past year the New Hampshire Regional Development Assn. has endeavored to work in harmony with its 32 member towns and cities, local Chambers of Commerce, the N.H. Council of Regions Association, and the N.H. Department of Resources and Economic Development, in publicizing the Seacoast Region, promoting tourism, and assisting prospective buyers of land, homes, and businesses.

We have answered some 2,000 individual requests from people in 40 states and 8 foreign countries, for information on dining, accommodations, snowmobiling, recreation opportunities, real estate, camping, hunting and fishing, State Parks, mobile homes, taxes, church services, colleges, universities, and schools, historic sites and homes open to the public, museums, hospitals, antiques, and bus schedules.

We have provided hundreds of youngsters with maps and facts about New Hampshire for their social studies classes. We have sent bulk information to 81 travel agencies, automobile clubs, libraries, colleges, universities, conferences, travel shows, and Pease Air Force Base.

In January we arranged for a freelance writer/photographer to come up from Maryland and do a picture story for a national sporting magazine on ice fishing at Great Bay. While here the writer was the guest of Director G. Newton Weeks and Mrs. Weeks of Greenland.

We did publicity for the Stratham Fair this summer, the Region's only annual country fair, and had a booth there for three days where free literature on the Seacoast Region



was available to the thousands of fair visitors. We also worked in the N.H. booth at the Camping and Outdoor show in Boston.

The Association has worked on the renovation of the State Map for 1974, and inspected all the facilities and attractions in the Region which appear on the map to ascertain the maintenance of high standards of courtesy, operation and cleanliness. We helped the State in compiling the annual Recreation Calendar, sold advertising to fund printing of the N.H. Accommodations and Dining Directory. 250,000 copies are printed and distributed by the State each year. Three Seacoast Region Newsletters were sent out.

We are now putting together a new issue of the SEACOAST REGION GUIDE. Twenty to thirty thousand copies will be printed and distributed free from this office as well as all State outlets, including the Montreal and New York Vacation Travel Centers, highway rest areas, DRED offices, and all travel and camping shows at which N.H. has a booth.

The SEACOAST REGION GUIDE for 1974 will have new and exciting pictures, town and city profiles will be brought up to date, and much new material will be added. because we are in business to promote the Region, we felt that the GUIDE should be published within the region, and N.H. PRINTERS, INC., of Somersworth has been given the contract. The GUIDE goes to press in January.

The need for financial support from member towns is very great, if we are to enlarge our services to the Seacoast Region. We maintain only one employee, the Executive Director, whose salary is a modest \$60 a week. A temporary person has been hired to sell advertising for the GUIDE, but this is on a commission basis. The Director gets no commissions.

With the rising costs of mailings (one of our major expenses) paper, office rental, supplies, etc., we have had to



cut corners consistently. The position of Executive Director mandates much time spent outside the office doing promotional work, attending meetings, hearings, etc. Some expense will be involved in covering the telephone in her absence.

Our request from the Town of Newmarket is \$75. This is not an exorbitant sum, and we hope that your interest in the Seacoast Region as a whole will be reflected by your approval of our request, and its subsequent appearance in the budget or Town Warrant.

The Board member who represents Newmarket in our Association is Arthur Beauchesne.
