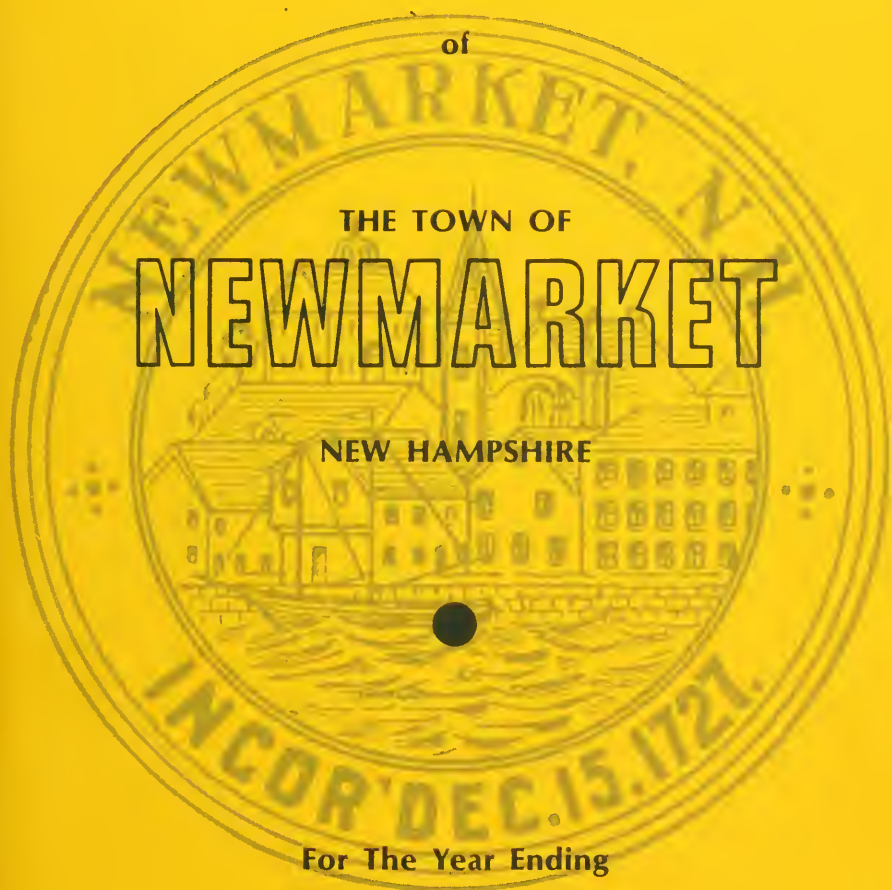

## NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS

Every Spring you receive an INVENTORY to be filled out and returned to the Selectmen by April 15th. Until now this has been somewhat optional.

The 1977 General Court passed RSA 74:7-A making it MANDATORY that the inventory be filled out and returned by April 15th each year. The penalty for failure to comply shall be one percent of the property tax bill. In no case will the PENALTY be less than ten dollars (\$10.00) or more than fifty dollars (\$50.00).

The penalty will be added to the current year's tax bill.

It is also MANDATORY that you file your inventory EACH YEAR in order to receive your veterans exemption even if the permanent application is on file.

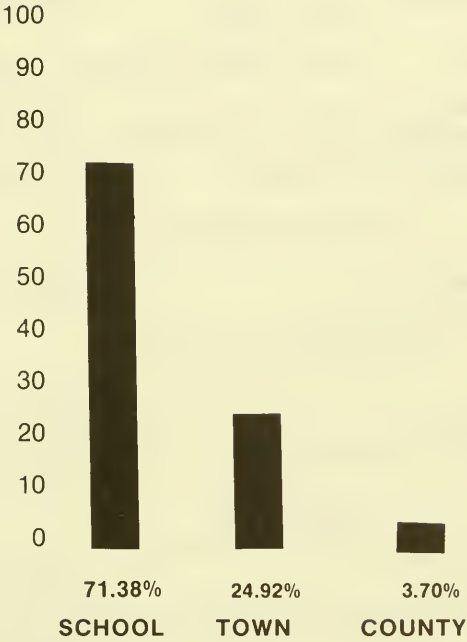

## **ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN — 1978**

The Selectmen respectfully submit to the citizens of the Town of Newmarket a summary of some of the projects that have achieved fruition and a few reflections on the past year.

Through a strong effort by all Town Commissions, Committees, and Boards, along with a successful Town Meeting, a modest but positive reduction in the town's tax rate was achieved, leveling at \$29.70/\$1,000 assessed valuation. A special "well done" to the Budget Committee is in order.

We are pleased to report your new Public Works building is near completion and formal occupancy is expected soon.

Utilizing the Town Road Aid Program, further resurfacing and straightening of Bay Road has been accomplished and it is anticipated completion of this project will occur sometime this summer.

Negotiations for the ambulance garage on Gerry Avenue have been successfully completed and await your decision regarding purchase.

Upon the retirement of Richman Walker who served the public unselfishly for nearly twenty-five years, we were pleased to announce the appointment of Mr. Earl Brill of Holden, Maine as the Town of Newmarket's new Public Works Superintendent.

Two events of historic significance occurred in the Town of Newmarket in 1978 — the One Hundredth Anniversary of Saint Mary Church Parish and the One Hundred and Fiftieth Anniversary of the Newmarket Community Church were celebrated. We salute and thank both churches for their many years of service to the town.

In 1979 we look forward to even more citizen participation on various committees, commissions and boards and therefore urge you to add your name to the volunteer list at the Town Office should you have a particular talent or interest you wish to share with all of us.

Remember the Selectmen meet every other Wednesday at 7:00 p.m. Our first meeting for 1979 was January 3. The dates for each meeting are posted at the town hall office. We welcome your thoughts and support. Please attend whenever you wish.

## REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSIONERS

In 1978 the Water Department produced a total of 127,856,060 gallons of water, an increase of 9,707,450 gallons over last year. 48,641,060 gallons were pumped and processed at the Water Works, and the remaining 79,215,000 gallons were taken from the Bennett's Well. The pump there is controlled automatically by the water level in the storage tank and operates an average of eighteen hours per day at a pumping rate of 200 gallons per minute.

In the past year permission was granted for water service for 148 housing units.

A 10 inch water main was run from the storage tank to the water system in the Great Hill Estates to improve water flow to the hydrants at the higher elevations. Due to the age and small size of the water main running along Exeter Street from Great Hill to Rockingham Junction, water flow in Great Hill Estates development did not meet expectations when the system was fed from that direction.

The installation of a new pump in the old well in Follett's Brook was not accomplished in 1978 as planned, and will be carried over as a goal to be achieved in 1979.

Other projects planned for the new year include repairs to the water treatment plant, renewal of some of the worn out equipment and new gravel for the filters. The cutting of brush and cleanup along Follett's Brook is planned and renewal of the gravel intake filter in the brook.

1978 has seen the retirement of Richman Walker after twenty-five years as Superintendent of Public Works. The Water Commissioners wish to express their appreciation for those many years of dedicated service.



We also wish to welcome Earl Brill, who succeeds Mr. Walker as Superintendent of Public Works; and hope that his stay with us will be long and pleasant.

## REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET SEWER COMMISSIONERS

During 1978 the plans and specifications were submitted to the State for approval for the proposed Secondary Wastewater Treatment Plant, the Bay Road Pumping Station and new sewers. A smoke testing program was completed to determine sources of stormwater inflow to the sewers. A flow monitoring program was performed to determine groundwater infiltration into the sewer system. From these two testing programs it has been recommended that thirteen sections of existing sewer and four existing manholes be rehabilitated by pressure grouting, seven catch basins be separated from the sanitary sewers and eight sewer defects be repaired by excavation. It is anticipated that the pressure grouting program for sealing sewers and manholes will be performed in 1979, but construction of sewers and treatment facilities may be delayed until 1983 by a lack of enough federal and state money to construct all the pollution abatement programs presently proposed in New Hampshire.

**— AUDITOR'S OPINION —**

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and groups of accounts of the Town of Newmarket, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1978 listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The Town of Newmarket has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

In addition, the Town has not capitalized the cost of property and equipment purchased by the Enterprise Funds (Sewer and Water Departments). Likewise, no depreciation expense is recorded on these funds. Generally accepted accounting principles require that property and equipment of enterprise funds be capitalized and depreciated over the useful lives of the assets. The Town's records do not permit the application of adequate procedures to enable us to determine the cost value of capital assets or related depreciation expense on them. Also, we did not physically test check the inventory to comply with generally accepted auditing standards.

Because of the material effect of the omission of fixed assets and related depreciation on the financial



position, we do not express an opinion on the financial statements of these Enterprise Funds.

In our opinion, the financial statements listed in the aforementioned table of contents, other than the financial statements of the Enterprise Funds (Sewer and Water Departments), present fairly the financial position of the various funds and groups of accounts of the Town of Newmarket, New Hampshire at December 31, 1978 and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental schedules included in this report, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations of such funds and group of accounts, are presented primarily for supplemental analysis purposes. This additional information has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the aforementioned examination of the basic financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The increased number and complexity of the financial transactions of the Town is continually growing. We feel that consideration should be given to utilizing some type of mechanical accounting system which would perform multiple accounting functions in a single operation, thereby eliminating duplicate record-keeping and facilitate monthly and year-end reporting.

### **Employment of a Full-Time Accountant Recommended**

At the present time, we feel that the Town does not have a qualified bookkeeper or accountant. Because of the size and complexity of the financial operations of the Town, we strongly recommend that the hiring of a full-time accountant should be considered in order to administer and coordinate the overall daily operations of the various departments.

We would like to extend out thanks to the officials and office staff of the Town of Newmarket for their assistance during the course of the audit.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

12. To see if the voters will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a gasoline or a L.P. gas driven

electric generator, for use as an emergency power system for the Town and to authorize the withdrawal of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, as amended in 1976, for this purpose.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have a fire detection system installed in the Town Hall and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of three thousand three hundred dollars (\$3,300.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, as amended in 1976, for this purpose.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

14. To see if the voters of the Town of Newmarket will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Town owned, old school building, off Granite Street, for a price to be arrived at by an independent appraiser. The proposed use of this building would be as a privately owned, subsidized elderly housing.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend up to seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000.00) to build a public safety building. The money to come from the sale of the Town owned "Old School Property" off Granite Street.

**NOT RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) for equipment for the new Town Garage and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Town Garage Capital Reserve Fund.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive, and expend Federal Funds from the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (as amended) in an amount not to exceed four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000.00) after the Selectmen have held at least two public hearings on the proposed use of such funds. Submitted by petition.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Board of Fire Commissioners, Durham UNH Fire Department, for the purpose of having the Town of Newmarket's dispatching handled by the Durham UNH Dispatch Center and to appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for the cost of this service and the one time expenses involved in making the necessary changes to the Town's Equipment.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to participate in the N.H.M.A. Workmen's Compensation Group and the unemployment compensation group.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to spend fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) for the coastal management study to be carried out by the Strafford/Rockingham Regional Planning Group.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of sixteen thousand three hundred forty-nine dollars and ninety cents (\$16,349.90) from the Public Works Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to be used towards the purchase of a truck.

**RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

22. To see if the Town will vote to take over the C.E.T.A. funded, Newmarket Dispatch Center. Said C.E.T.A. funding to end March 31, 1979, and to appropriate the sum of thirty-one thousand eight hundred forty-five dollars and eighty-five cents (\$31,845.85) to run said dispatch center for the balance of the year.

## TOWN OF NEWMARKET

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### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

##### ***Fund Accounting***

The diverse nature of governmental operations and the necessity of determining compliance with legal provisions requires modification of accounting systems commonly used by commercial enterprises. Rather than establishing a single unified set of accounts to record and summarize all financial transactions, the accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered a separate entity with self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund balance, revenues and expenditures or expenses, including interfund obligations and transfers.

Operations supplying the basic services of a general government nature which are controlled by legal budgets are accounted for in the General Fund and Special Revenue Fund.

In addition to the general category of operations listed above, a further distinction from accounting in commercial enterprises exists with respect to capital expenditures. Capital expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts primarily for control purposes. The Town has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

Fiduciary activities of the Town are accounted for in Trust Funds.

## ***Budgetary Accounting and Encumbrances***

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations.

## ***Basis of Accounting***

The accounts of the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds and Debt Service Fund are maintained and reported on a modified accrual basis. All other funds included in the financial statements are maintained and reported on the accrual basis.

Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded in cash, except in cases where they are both measurable and available, and therefore are resources which may be appropriated. Expenditures, except for interest on general long-term debt which is recorded when it becomes due, are recorded when certain goods or services are received and actual liabilities are incurred.

## ***Investments***

Investments in all cases are recorded at cost.

## ***Enterprise Funds***

### ***Water and Sewer Departments***

The enterprise funds follow the practice of charging the purchase of property and equipment against operating expenses in the year purchased which is not in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

In addition, no depreciation expense has been recorded on these assets.

**Note 4 -** Serial bonds and long-term notes on the statement of general long-term debt consist of the following:

### ***Sewer Bonds - Original Issue \$497,000***

Bonds payable to The First National Bank of Boston, 3.10%, principal of \$30,000 is due annually on February 1, from 1979 to 1985. Interest is payable semi-annually on February 1 and August 1.

### ***Sewer Bonds - Original Issue \$852,000***

Bonds payable to The First National Bank of Boston, 4.75%, principal of \$45,000 is due February 1, 1979 and the final payment of \$50,000 is due February

1, 1989. Interest is payable semi-annually February 1 and August 1.

***Water Works Notes - Original Issue \$31,000***

Notes payable to the Durham Trust Company, 5½%, final payment of \$3,100 is due on December 15, 1979. Final interest payment of \$85 is due on December 15, 1979.

***Water Works Notes - Original Issue \$19,500***

Notes payable to the Durham Trust Company, 4.55%, final principal payment of \$3,900 is due on December 1, 1979. Final interest payment of \$89 is due on December 1, 1979.

***Sewer Study Notes - Original Issue \$15,000***

Notes payable to the Indian Head National Bank, 4%, final payment of \$5,000 is due in April, 1979. Final interest payment of \$200 is due in April, 1979.

***Water Tank Notes - Original Issue \$148,000***

Notes payable to The Exeter Banking Company, 4.10%, principal of \$14,800 is due annually on September 15 from 1979 to 1987. Interest is payable semi-annually on March 15 and September 15.

***Industrial Park Notes - Original Issue \$75,000***

Notes payable to The Exeter Banking Company, 4.10%, principal of \$7,500 is due annually on September 15 from 1979 to 1987. Interest is payable semi-annually on March 15 and September 15.

**Note 5 - Retirement and Pension Plans**

Certain full-time town employees and the police department employees are covered under the New Hampshire retirement system. Contributions are deducted from the compensation of the employees at various predetermined rates according to employment compensation. The plan is completely administered by the State of New Hampshire.

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## REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

— 1978 —

This has been a year of change for the Newmarket Public Library. Early in the year, our librarian for nearly ten years, Mrs. Winifred Harding, was forced by health reasons to curtail her activities, and later in the spring, to resign her duties as librarian. Mrs. Margaret Nash did an excellent job of taking over these duties in the interim period and we could not have gotten along without her very dedicated and efficient services.

In May, after many weeks of interviewing some well-qualified candidates, the Trustees selected Carol Lincoln of Durham as our new librarian. Mrs. Lincoln received her Associate of Arts degree from Lasell Junior College in Auburndale, Mass., her Bachelor's degree from the University of New Hampshire, and in December she completed her Master's Degree in Library Science at the University of Rhode Island.

In July, a reception was held to honor Mrs. Harding. In addition to her many friends and library patrons, representatives from the district and state library system also attended. The Trustees presented Mrs. Harding with a check in appreciation for her faithful service over the years. The reception was organized by Mrs. Helen Mitchell, assisted by Mrs. Kathy Haviland and members of the Newmarket Women's Club. We, the Trustees, wish to thank Mrs. Harding again for her valued work for the Library and the town during her years as our librarian.

Mr. Robert Stone continues to serve as our assistant Librarian and has been most helpful during the period of transition this year, assuming extra duties and re-arranging schedules until we finally got settled with

our new librarian. Mrs. Alice Dawes serves faithfully as custodian and keeps the library clean and bright.

Mrs. Lincoln has been busy attending meetings, planning new programs and, of course, managing the library. In September, she attended the New England Library Association meeting at Wentworth-By-The-Sea; in October, a Book Discussion Group at Kingston Public Library; District Advisory Council meetings in June at Stratham and in October at North Hampton; meeting of the Seacoast Library and Media Services, for public and high school librarians. She also spoke to the PTO and to the American Legion Auxiliary about the library and its services. We are very pleased to report at this time that the American Legion Auxiliary of Post #67 has taken as a special project the development of a Children's Room at the Library. This is something Mrs. Lincoln has been working on, and the additional help from the Auxiliary is really enabling us to set up a nice area for the youngsters, to encourage early and regular use of the library.

Some special projects were a Film Festival in August, in which free films were shown every Wednesday; a story hour every Thursday in October; and special displays on such topics as Crafts, Cook-books, and Travel in New Hampshire.

Mrs. Joan Donnhauser did the story hours and JoAnne Reed helped out as a weekly volunteer this year. During the summer we also had Judy Chiarito and Maureen Bucknam helping as volunteers. The library is very fortunate to have these people taking a personal interest and offering their services, for we could not have hired extra personnel for all the tasks which they have performed.

October 17 was Senior Citizen's Day at the library, with a special coffee hour for any and all senior

citizens who wished to drop in and browse and get acquainted or re-acquainted with their library.

On October 24, Congressman Norman D'Amours came to the Library and presented the Trustees with a new flag, which had been flown over the Capitol in Washington, D.C. As soon as an electrician has set up a night light, this flag will be flown at all times from the library flagpole out front.

Latest notes as this report is being written are that Mrs. Lincoln has purchased a new paperback collection and many new pre-school books, and set up a crafts table for children; she also hopes to have a section available on health soon. -

We have been trying new hours to try to accommodate all the people, and at this point have not definitively decided on what the final schedule will be; it is safe to say, however, that there will be an earnest attempt to cover some morning, afternoon, and evening hours, to accommodate all patrons. This is difficult to do when we only have funds to be open 25 hours a week, but we are doing our best. Our old faithful furnace is apparently going to need replacement one of these days, and, as usual, we had some storm damage this year both to the interior and exterior of the building. Each year the elements seem to find a way around to some place not damaged before. Irving Edgerly repaired the roof for us and Bob Stevens then restored the interior plaster and paint to normal. We also had extensive work done on the chimney by Bert Gooch; the chimney had lost many bricks due to wind and weather and age, and was leaning dangerously, so it was made completely safe and sound again.

## REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Probably one of the most gratifying experiences is being able to see the results of your endeavors.

This year's report reflects the decrease in crimes against the person, notably burglaries and larcenies.

I think the major reason for this decrease is the increasing awareness of the citizens to call the police when they observe suspicious persons or unusual conditions.

Over the past year we have received many more calls from concerned citizens than ever before, partly I think, because of the convenience of a twenty-four hour dispatch service, and partly because of the increasing use of scanners. All fire equipment was maintained and updated wherever deemed necessary. Box 15 on River Street has been added to our Fire Alarm System. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all the members of the department for their time and effort in helping to maintain and keep this system updated.

Mindful of the energy crisis, we have added insulation to our building and installed storm windows.

Fire schools were attended by both officers and men of our department in keeping with our policy of maintaining modern firefighting methods. Within our own department he have carried on training sessions regularly at our monthly meetings.

The Board of Engineers would like to state that we have found the Newmarket Dispatch Center a great asset to the Fire Department and found the Dispatch Center indispensable in our day to day workload. This is noted by the number of telephone calls handled by the Dispatch Center in our breakdown of fire reports.

Once again the Board of Engineers would like to make a request of all property owners. Due to the rapid growth of the Town of Newmarket, we request that all property owners make sure that all buildings are properly numbered and made visible from the road. This is a great help in all types of emergency calls. We wish to express our thanks to those who have already done this.

*State of N.H. Forest Fire Permit Law:*

Fire permits shall be obtained before having any outdoor fires, and only before 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. This does not pertain to charcoal fires above the ground.

Charcoal cooking fires are “not” allowed on fire escapes or second means of egress (decks) in apartment buildings. Charcoal cooking fires are to be at ground level only.

## REPORT OF NEWMARKET CIVIL DEFENSE

All necessary reports have been filed with the State and Federal agencies that are a part of the Civil Defense program.

This year the Newmarket Dispatch Center played an important role in being able to dispatch and direct emergency personnel upon receipt of any emergency call. With the 24-hour coverage there was no time delay in reaching the proper authorities. The Dispatch Center is a vital link between the residents of the town and emergency services. As we mentioned last year, with the decline of public interest in the Civil Defense program, the Federal Civil Defense Agency is reorganizing its structure in hopes that the public will again take an active interest in this crucial area.

One important statistic: Russia has fallout shelters for 100% of its population. We have approximately only 20-25% of that protection.

## REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET HOUSING AUTHORITY

The Housing Authority provides clean, safe and sanitary housing for the elderly and low to moderate income families. The project at Great Hill Terrace has thirty-eight family units and twelve units for the elderly. There are also twenty units for the elderly in our Section 8 Program.

The twenty units of Section 8 existing housing are scattered throughout the town. The tenant is charged 25% of his income as rent. This amount is paid by the tenant directly to the landlord and the Housing Authority subsidizes the balance with monthly checks to the landlords. The program has been most successful and it is hoped that more units will be available in the future.

Great Hill Terrace is governed by a Board of five Commissioners and administered by an Executive Director. As in the Section 8 Program the rents are based on 25% of a tenant's income. There are twelve one bedroom units, sixteen two bedroom units, twenty three-bedroom units and two four- bedroom units in the project. Waiting lists are maintained for each type unit.

Recently smoke alarms were installed in each unit and grab bars were installed in the bathroom of each apartment occupied by an elderly person. Last summer an outside painting program was started and some of the buildings will be painted each year.

We are proud of our project and work constantly to keep it neat, attractive and in good condition. Anyone having questions or wishing to apply for housing is encouraged to contact Mrs. Ruth Sanborn at the office

## 1978 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR

In 1978 Newmarket had another booming year in the building industry. Construction cost exceeded all previous years since the town began keeping records in 1973.

Total construction cost in 1978 was \$2,961,266.00, an increase of 12% over 1977 and 60% higher than 1973.

A total of \$2,512,065.00 was spent for 128 dwelling units; 44 homes, 1 duplex, 72 new apartments, 6 converted apartments and 4 trailers.

The total construction costs from 1973 thru 1978 was \$9,227,080.00

Since 1973, building permits were issued for 413 dwelling units; 144 homes, 1 duplex, 184 new apartments, 57 converted apartments and 26 trailers. In addition to the 413 units, the Planning Board has approved 430 units for future construction, and is considering approval for another 69 units.

We are always looking for new members and will give you the necessary training. Anyone 18 years of age or older who is interested in joining may come to our business meetings which are held the first Monday of every month, or our training sessions on the third Tuesday of every month; the meetings begin at 6:30 P.M. ## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET DISPATCH CENTER

The Newmarket Dispatch Center has provided professional coverage of all vital emergency services for the Town of Newmarket through 1978, including Police, Fire, Ambulance, Public Works and Animal Control Departments. The federally funded Dispatch Center handles all emergency calls and communications 24 hours a day as well as a large volume of day to day transactions for several departments. The Newmarket Dispatch Center personnel are trained and skilled, having attended several schools for dispatching for all phases of emergency service.

The problem of providing 24-hour, dependable and inexpensive coverage of the community's emergency services is a statewide issue, especially in fast growing communities such as Newmarket. With an increase of population and emergencies, the methods of communication used in the past have become outmoded and sometimes dangerous. There are many towns with growth rates equal to Newmarket that have Central Dispatch Centers which have been in successful existence for several years. Dispatch Centers have proven to be the most effective, dependable and economical means of providing several departments with professional coverage without losing quality in service.

All of Newmarket's departments are able to cope with growing workloads with the assistance of the Newmarket Dispatch Center. We are able to free the Police Officer, the Fireman, the Ambulance Corpsman, the Public Works Dept. and Animal Control Officer to spend more time out in the field. If a resident of Newmarket needs assistance of any type, they are entitled to receive prompt professional service.

Our center could not be what it is today, an attribute to the residents of Newmarket, as well as an exemplary Dispatch for other communities, without the assistance and guidelines of all the departments we serve. We extend our appreciation and thanks to all the departments for their continued support.

We extend to every resident of Newmarket an invitation to visit the Newmarket Dispatch Center which is located in the Fire Station on Main Street.

The following is a summary of all calls for the departments we serve for 1978. The summary includes all emergency calls as well as daily transactions calls. The total transmissions are for all departments. Each call and transmission handled by dispatch is recorded in our daily log. Total log entries, which include all calls, transmissions and useage totaled 51,743 for 1978.

## NARRATIVE FOR TOWN REPORT NEWMARKET INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION

THE NEWMARKET INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION has actively pursued the development of the Newmarket Industrial Park. Following a positive 1977 Town Meeting vote, the Commission purchased the 41 acre Ham property and leased with option to buy the 65 acres Waugh property off Route 108 in Rockingham Junction. These two pieces will be the nucleus of the proposed park. The firm of Wright-Pierce has been retained as an engineering and planning consultant and, after completing field surveys, submitted preliminary development plans for Phase I construction. This Phase consists of approximately 26 acres located between Route 108 and the Boston and Maine Railroad. It is envisioned that 4 to 6 industries can be placed within the Phase I development.

In an effort to secure Federal financing of the Park's construction, the Commission has initiated applications to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for an Urban Development Assistance Grant. The Grant, if received, would provide full financing along with providing incentives for the location of industries in the Town of Newmarket.

## REPORT OF THE RECREATION AND PARKS DEPARTMENT

The Recreation and Parks Department has been through many changes and adjustments during 1978. The Department was without a director from March until June and despite this setback, the Department was able to develop a successful summer program. Youth Soccer, Fine Arts classes, organized games and sports, Horsemanship, Beginning Gymnastics, Tiny Tot Fitness, Womens' Softball as well as Girls' All Star Softball were among the many activities offered. The aim of the program was to have something for everyone and through many trips, contests and demonstrations this goal was met. To add to the wonderful celebration during Old Home Week, the Department started a County Fair where residents displayed their many talents through handicrafts, woodworking and cooking.

The Park Foreman cared for Newmarket's many ball fields and recreation areas, especially the new Leo Landroche Memorial Field. Approximately thirty different Newmarket teams played this summer on this outstanding field. Little League, Pony League, Girls' Softball, Girls' Minor Softball, Girls' All-star Softball, Mens' Softball, Mens' Baseball and Womens' Softball were all extremely successful due to the sponsors and the dedicated individuals who put in many hours of invaluable instruction and supervision.

Through the tremendous cooperation with the School, Churches, Library, Businesses and supporters of Newmarket Recreation, a solid foundation for the future has been laid down. Newmarket Night Education Program co-sponsored by the Department and the High School, offered many courses to adults in town from Dog Obedience and Exercise to Christmas Crafts.

Tiny Tot Classes and Preschool Classes, both free to Newmarket residents, began in the fall of 1978. After-school Arts and Crafts, Football, Boys' Elementary Soccer and a Boys' Seacoast Basketball Team were extremely successful programs meeting the needs of over one hundred school-age children. Jogging courses, Womens' Volleyball, Mens' Basketball League and Youth Center Tournaments, provided leisure-time activities for other Newmarket residents, while weekend and vacation activities added extra cheer to the Holidays. The Lamprey Village Players enjoyed a tremendous year, delighting entire families with their excellent, professional performances. They demonstrated a great deal of talent and dedication repeatedly to packed halls and spent their free time studying in workshops and classes.

For 1979, the Recreation Department added even more leisure activities to an already ambitious 1978 schedule. A new class of Creative Movement has been added for the 5 and 6 year olds. Elementary children are taking part in Beginning Ballet, Modern Dance, Baton Classes, Martial Arts and a Saturday instructional Hockey Hour. A free after-school program for handicapped children in our area will commence in February, with games, music and arts and crafts. Junior and Senior High School students enjoy Fine Arts Classes, Modern Dance, Martial Arts, Ski Club, Saturday Instructional Hockey Hour, Youth Center Tournaments and a Teen Night for handicapped teenagers. Offered through the Newmarket Night Education Program were Disco Dancing, Exercise, Basketry, Dog Obedience, Sewing, and Typing. Other new additions included a morning Modern Dance Class, Adult Tennis Club, Womens' Basketball Team and "Mondays", an exciting adult program offered free of charge and geared primarily for senior citizens. This 2-hour weekly program provides entertainment with a musical group or speaker and film, and a short session of exercises.

This comprehensive recreational activities list will hopefully make all of our residents aware of what is happening in town. There is something for everyone. Leisure activities are an important part of everyone's life, whether it be a solitary walk in the woods or participation in a group sport. The Recreation and Parks Department and the Recreation Commission care about your recreational needs. We'd like to thank the many, many individuals who participated in and supported Newmarket Recreation during a very successful 1978.

## REPORT OF ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

Most people have the idea that the Dog Catcher is the big, bad man who takes pets away from children. This image must be put aside; briefly we will explain what we do.

Stray dogs are picked up and kept for seven days at the local pound. After that, if still unclaimed, they are turned over to the SPCA in Stratham, where they are either adopted or humanely disposed of.

We answer cruelty-to-animals cases upon receipt of a complaint. Regular patrols are made to check the streets for stray animals and to enforce the Town Ordinance and State laws. Injured animals are taken to veterinarian for care until the owners are found. If an owner is present and so desires, the animal is taken to a veterinarian of the family's choice.

We answer complaints of animal bites, stray cats, horses, skunks, and any type of complaint involving an animal problem.

Dogs chasing deer pose a big problem in the winter months, when the snow is too deep for the deer to get away from the dogs. Dogs chasing and killing domestic animals is another problem that is forever haunting us.

We work with the Fish and Game Department, the local Police Department, and the SPCA, to try to keep order in the animal world. The Fire Department helps out when needed, supplying ladders, rope, and necessary tools to rescue injured and trapped animals.

We check dog licenses and rabies certificates, check on animals taken from the SPCA for adoption by local residents. Shelters and leashes are periodically looked

at and if there is a violation, we offer advice on how to properly correct the problem.

This past year, David "Butch" Pierce was appointed Assistant Animal Control Officer on a non-salaried basis. Butch has been a great asset to us, and his devotion of time to the residents of this town enables us to give you 24-hour coverage.

The Dispatch Center has been of great help in taking all our complaints and then locating us with the information, keeping a work sheet on each call and log of all calls for future reference. Such accurate records could not be kept at this time without the services of Dispatch.

As always, we would like to be able to say that the complaints are down in number, but with more housing and more people in Newmarket, there are actually more animals and therefore increasing problems.

We would like to report on the following activities undertaken by the Conservation Commission this year.

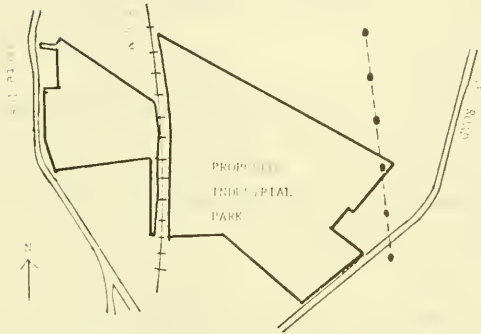

## REPORT OF THE OYSTER RIVER HOME HEALTH ASSOCIATION

The Oyster River Home Health Association's eleventh year, which ended June 30, 1978, was marked by a continuation of the steadily-increasing demand for home health care services from residents of the four towns of its coverage area — Durham, Lee, Madbury and Newmarket.

Home visits for skilled nursing care, accounting for the great bulk of the agency's work, rose to a new high of 2,271 for the year, up nearly 10% over 1976-77. Part of this increase was attributable to a broadening of Blue Cross benefits to pay for various kinds of home care as an alternative to hospitalization.

Other public health activities, aimed at disease prevention, as distinct from care, were also on the rise.

ORHHA is a voluntary, non-profit visiting nurse association, founded in 1967, and governed by a 20-member Board of Directors. There are five directors from each of the four towns served.

In 1977-78 the agency spent \$3,300. of its own funds to renovate and equip two offices in the new Durham Town Hall, in space provided rent free by the town. The offices are open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekdays, and those interested in the agency's services should call 868-5055 during those hours.

In its home care activities, the agency's professional staff carries out the orders of its patients' physicians. Typical services include personal care, physical rehabilitation, evaluation of patient condition, change of dressings, medical treatments, blood tests, diabetic care, and teaching aimed at helping patients and their families to cope with medical problems.

Under a new program begun in 1977-78, funded by a grant from the New Hampshire Council on Aging, the agency was able to provide free occupational therapy and social worker services to certain patients aged 60 and over. As a result of this program, which was undertaken in cooperation with other Strafford County home health agencies, ORHHA hopes to gain occupational therapy certification and to make this service available in the future to patients of all ages.

The ORHHA staff consists of an administrative nurse, two other full-time registered nurses, three part-time registered nurses, a registered physical therapist, and a bookkeeper-secretary. The staff maintains professional competence by attending frequent training conferences of many kinds.

In 1977-78, about 20% of the agency's patients were unable to pay any or all of the agency's fees, which reflect the actual cost of rendering home care. In each of these cases, the fee was met from the funds appropriated to the agency from the four towns. No patient is ever turned away for financial reasons.

In addition to fees and town appropriations, the agency is funded by Medicare and Medicaid fees, other insurance payments, donations, bequests, and government grants.

The agency cooperates with other health and community organizations in providing a wide range of special services, which in 1977-78 included:

1. CHILD HEALTH CONFERENCES. Clinics held twice a month at the Newmarket Fire Station, providing free physicals and inoculations for children up to first grade age. Funded in 1977-78 by \$3,693 in the state Maternal Child Health Program grants and by \$2,167 in agency funds drawn from town appropriations. Staffed by agency nurses, by

Joanna Munger, M.D., and Judith Hallisey, Pediatric Nurse Practitioner.

2. DENTAL SCREENING CLINICS. Semi-annual dental examinations by state dental hygienists, for children aged 3-6 who are patients in the Child Health Conferences, with follow-ups by local dentists.

3. NEWBORN VISITS. Free visits to the homes of all newborns, to provide whatever help and teaching might be needed and sought. There were 90 such visits in 1977-78.

4. TUBERCULOSIS CONTROL. Monitoring of patients, in cooperation with the state Department of Health and Welfare.

5. PRE-SCHOOL VISION AND HEARING CLINICS. Assistance to Oyster River and Newmarket school nurses.

6. SCHOOL SERVICES. Assistance to school nurses on special projects, as needed. Also, services to the Little People's Day Care Center and the Forest Park Day Care Center, through various programs, consultations and educational efforts.

7. PEDIATRIC CARDIAC AND CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S CLINICS. Staffing of state-sponsored clinics.

8. FOUR-IN-ONE SCREENINGS. Testing for glaucoma, high blood pressure, oral cancer and diabetes. Held most recently in May of 1978, in cooperation with the Newmarket Regional Health Center, and attended by 74 persons.

9. BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENING. Federally-funded clinics open to all. Held at various locations

10. W.I.C. Nursing screening services for the Strafford County Women, Infant and Children—Supplementary Food Program, which provides vouchers for specific foods of high nutritional value.

Our fall registration and enrollment was at a full capacity of 124 children with a staff of 30.

This includes the two group child care centers, for 3-11 year olds, and the family program, which serves those children under 3 and school-age who attend individual homes with fully licensed staff in a much smaller ratio standard factor.

The annual "Old Home Week" Side-Walk Fair in August proved to be very successful, with the fine cooperative efforts of the Newmarket Service Club. Combining the efforts seem to be an excellent working relationship.

The new home for child care in Newmarket has served us with a warm, safe and cheerful environment, conducive to the philosophy of children's rights everywhere.

Continued support from the citizens of Newmarket help keep this and other like services available to many, we the Newmarket Community Action Council for Day Care Centers, Inc., thank you for these efforts and assistance.

## REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center has made great strides in 1978 towards improving services for the residents of Newmarket. The number of people utilizing the services offered by the Center continues to grow at a rapid rate. In 1978 a total of over 16,300 rides were provided to area senior citizens by the Senior Citizen Transportation Service — an increase of 32% over last year. In addition, the number of people using the Center's medical care services has increased beyond the record levels of 1977.

In November the Center moved its base of operations from its overcrowded second floor location on Main Street to a newly renovated building at 14 Elm Street. The building is ideal, being centrally located with ample parking space for patients and staff. All of the Center's services are located on the first floor, and are easily accessible to handicapped individuals through the use of a wheelchair ramp. The medical clinic has expanded to include four fully equipped examination rooms (three adult and one pediatric), separate laboratory facilities, a counseling room, receptionist's station, and extra waiting room space.

The Center's medical services are provided by Dr. Sarah Oxnard, a pediatrician, and Mr. Michael Lewis, Registered Physician's Assistant. The medical team also includes a Health Aide who performs the bulk laboratory procedures at the Center, and assists the medical providers. The Center's Community Health Workers work closely with the medical staff to ensure proper continuity of care for its diverse patient population. In addition, they coordinate preventative screening clinics to detect potential health hazards, hold informative workshops open to the public, and

act as a liason between the medical provider and the patient. To find out more about the medical services offered at the Center, call 659-3106, or toll-free at 1-800-582-7279.

The Senior Citizen Transportation Services provides regularly scheduled bus service for the elderly of Newmarket and other area communities. Transportation to medical care, dental care, social services, food and clothes shopping, and day-long excursions to social events are but a few of the many activities available to Newmarket seniors. Over 3,500 rides were provided to Newmarket seniors alone in 1978 — more than double the number of rides in 1977. To find out more about the Senior Citizen Transportation Service, or to arrange a ride for a senior citizen, call the program at 659-2424.

The Info-Center (funded by the N.H. Division of Welfare) is a county-wide information and referral program designed to help you. If you are in need of information about social services, or want to find out who to contact when you have a problem, call the Info-Center toll-free at 1-800-582-7214. The Info-Center can put you in touch with every available social service and human resource in the county to help you solve your problem. We are as close as your telephone.

## REPORT OF

### MOSQUITO CONTROL COMMISSION

The Mosquito Control Commission has the following to report:

For the first time since the mosquito control project was started a few years ago, Newmarket had the County spray on a regular schedule for mosquito control. From all reports, the spraying was effective and the residents of Newmarket were able to enjoy many outdoor activities. The program was run by the Rockingham County Mosquito Project in co-operation with the Extension Service.

*There are two methods of control:*

**LARVICIDING.** An effective mosquito control program utilizes larviciding as a prime means of control. The larval stage is effectively controlled with a minimum of disruption to the environment. Larviciding should begin in early April and is completed in late September in the marshes of the Great Bay area. This destroys the larvae so that they never hatch into adult mosquitoes.

**ADULTICIDING.** This effective control method is directed against adult mosquitoes. It is used as a supplement to the larviciding program. Adulticiding provides a quick but temporary reduction of the mosquito population. The adulticiding unit is driven all over town at a speed of ten miles per hour, and delivers two gallons per hour of a fine spray mist. Adulticiding is done between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 1:00 a.m., to correspond with the increase in mosquito activity.

We hope that this program will continue in 1979.

## REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

In July of 1978 the term of Richard LaBranche as Health Officer expired and in his place George Hauschel was appointed Health Officer for the Town of Newmarket.

The Health Officer's job is to enforce public health laws and regulations, most of which are outlined in the New Hampshire State Statutes. The Board of Selectmen constitute the local Board of Health, and the Health Officer is the executive officer and secretary of this local board.

In 1978, several complaints were investigated, consisting of animals in food establishments, garbage odors, rats, improper garbage containers, improper septic systems, contamination of water supply, inadequate heat in apartments.

Generally speaking, the Health Officer's duties are concerned with the abatement of nuisances. If you have a problem or see something that bothers you, call the Health Officer.

## REPORT OF THE LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

Since the approval of the agreement for the formation of the Cooperative voted by the twelve cooperating towns at their annual and special town meetings of 1978, the representatives formally established their organization to promulgate the administration and activities of the Cooperative as set forth in the approved agreement. The Joint Board of Directors consisting of one representative from each of the twelve communities selected a Chairman, a Secretary-Treasurer, and a three-member Operational Committee to carry out the day-to-day work of the Cooperative. These officers, with the full cooperation of all the Directors, have been working diligently and effectively to implement the terms of the agreement since its establishment on June 22, 1978 as a formal and legal organization. The names of the Directors and Officers are listed at the conclusion of this report.

The Cooperative, through its Operational Committee in July of 1978, initiated interviews with prospective private engineering firms for the purpose of planning and designing the incinerator to be constructed on the University campus. This resulted in the selection and engagement of the firm of Camp Dresser and McKee, Inc. of Boston, Massachusetts, from the eight firms considered, in August of 1978. The engineering firm began their investigations in early September and have conducted detailed studies of the site, including subsurface explorations as well as evaluations of possible types of incinerator units to be purchased. The preliminary design phase of the engineering study is now complete and a report with recommendations, is being prepared concurrently with the development of plans and specifications soliciting quotations for the incinerator units. The receipt of bids



for these critical elements will be received in early March. At the same time, the engineering firm is proceeding with the final design of the building and allied facilities with beginning of actual construction planned for May of this year. Depending on the delivery time of critical equipment, which will be determined by the quotations submitted for the incinerator units, every effort will be made to complete the plant construction and place it in operation in late 1979 or early 1980. The Board, through its officers and committees and acting as a committee as a whole, has participated actively in moving this program ahead in accordance with the schedule established for itself at the time of its formal organization.

Concurrently, with the carrying on of the Cooperative's activities, the Directors as a whole, again through its officers and committees, has been working actively with each community to assist each of them in developing plans for the collection and transportation of its solid waste to Durham when the plant becomes operative. At the same time, plans are being made to conduct the ongoing required handling of their waste being generated during the interim period. The Cooperative also prepared a preliminary agreement with the University which was submitted through the University of New Hampshire President's Office to both the University's Physical Plant Development Committee and that of the Board of Trustees, and finally to the Board of Trustees, all of whom approved the agreement or "Declaration of Intent" between the University and the Cooperative, enabling the Cooperative to move ahead in the planning and design of the project.

The Cooperative has made every effort to explore funding assistance through State and Federal agencies. These efforts include correspondence and inquiries through our congressional delegation as well

as personal testimony in Washington before appropriate government agencies and formal applications for all presently known possible sources of funding. To date, no special grants or funds have been obtained.

The Treasurer has received approved funds from the cooperating towns for a total of \$159,778.22 and has invested them carefully except for those necessarily needed to meet the ongoing expenses of the Cooperative. Due to the funds made available by the communities, the town of Durham has not been required to issue the primary bonds, thereby eliminating substantial interest costs until the total bond issue is needed. The town of Durham plans to raise the authorized \$2,420,000 to be made available to the Cooperative in February of this year.

The Directors of the Cooperative wish to express their deep appreciation for the assistance given its efforts by officers and staff of the University System and the University of New Hampshire, as well as the officers and staff of all of the cooperating towns. Every effort will be made through continuing correspondence and news releases to keep all of the residents of the twelve towns informed on the progress in the development of their solid waste disposal and energy recovery plant.
