This sum if applied towards paying the war debt, would have reduced it over twenty-two hundred dollars. It will further appear by the Inventory of the Farm, that we have 11 tons of pressed hay and other products on the farm, for sale, together with cash in hands of the Treasurer for sale of Cemetery lots, more than enough to pay the amount due him. There is one more outstanding note against the town, to Robert Smart for labor on the farm in 1864, on which there is due one hundred dollars and interest on the same one year.

While the closing year reminds us that a report of the condition of the Public Schools is demanded from those in authority, by every one interested in the subject of education, the success which has attended the zealous efforts and unwearied labors of our teachers, together with the co-operation and sympathy of the public, conspire to make the duty pleasant.

No changes have occurred in the Primary, Intermediate or Grammar schools during the year, in respect to teachers. Gentleness, kindness, the power of winning the affections, and long experience prove these teachers to be peculiarly adapted to their positions and deserving the full confidence and esteem of those for whom they labor.

The High School emerged from the apathy and listlessness which
