ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Chief and Clerk of Fire Department.

NEWMARKET, N. H., Feb. 15, 1902.

TO THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET:

In compliance with the law, requiring the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department to make an annual report to the town, the following report is respectfully submitted.

FORCE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The regular force of the department consists of a chief and three assistant chief engineers, two hose companies of 16 men each, one hook and ladder company of eleven men, and a driver for hose wagon, No. 3. Each company is allowed to have five substitute members, who, when acting as such, are paid for their services by their principals.

FIRE APPARATUS.

One hose wagon; one double runner hose pung; two two-wheel hose carts; one hook and ladder truck; 2200 feet 2½-inch rubber-line, knit hose; 1000 feet 2-inch Paragon rubber-lined hose; 8 flexible play pipes; 2 two-to-one Si-

amese connections; 1 one-to-two Siamese connection; four Callahan shut-off nozzles; 4 solid play pipes; one chemical extinguisher; 2 single hydrant gates; 20 spanners; 7 hydrant wrenches; 8 lanterns; 2 torches; 2 crowbars; 6 shovels; 5 hoes; 2 fire axes; 3 coats; 18 fire hats.

The Gleason & Bailey steel frame truck carries 1 45-foot East Somerville extension ladder; 1 26-foot, 1 25-foot, 1 24-foot and 1 18 foot single ladders; 1 pull-down hook and chain; 4 hand hooks; 2 crotch poles; 2 fire axes; 2 crowbars; 2 sledges; 200 feet of rope; 4 lanterns; 1 signal lamp; 2 torches; 1 13-inch gong. There are also held in reserve 2 30-foot, 1 25-foot and 3 roof ladders.

The apparatus is generally in good condition, but the 1000 feet of Paragon hose is 10 years old, while 2000 feet of the rubber-lined knit hose is in its eighth year of service, when it was only warranted for four years.

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply is from 52 hydrants, which are now owned by the town. The water pressure is good and the hydrant system is all right, so far as it goes, but additional hydrants should be at once put in as follows: Two hydrants on Main street, between the end of the present system and residence of Frank Durell, one at Rockingham Junction, and one opposite the residence of Charles Leavitt on the Junction road. The hydrant opposite the Congregational church, also the one near the town hall, should be taken up and in their places should be installed hydrants with three openings instead of two as at present. The change would be of great benefit in case of a big fire in the business section of Main street, as it would give six streams where now there are only four hydrant openings. The hydrants taken out would be all right to put in the Rockingham Junction section, a change which would cost very little but would give some fire protection where now there is none. It was rather humiliating

for the department to stand and see the dwelling of Joseph Watson on the Rockingham Junction road burn up last October with no hydrant within 2000 feet, but with a 6-inch water pipe running by the house. The same thing is likely to happen in that section on Main street between the end of the present hydrant system and Durell's Corner, where are fifteen buildings without fire protection.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The fire alarm system has been greatly improved during the past year by the purchase of a 2000-pound bell at a cost of \$215, which was mounted on a special steel frame tower located near the high school building on Zion's Hill. The tower cost \$125; the cost of erecting, blasting ledge for foundation and the hanging of the bell making the total cost of bell and tower \$440. The records of fire companies show that the bell is doing all that was expected of it as a fire alarm. The last time the Congregational church bell was used as a fire alarm (Filion's store fire, July, last,) nearly half the department failed to respond, but since the 2000-lb. fire alarm bell has been in service, practically every member of the department has responded promptly. The installation of the present fire alarm system was commenced in April, 1897. The first section put in consisted of about 4 miles of wire, 9 fire alarm boxes, 2 18-inch gongs and tower striker to Congregational church bell. In October of same year the system was extended by the addition of one mile of wire, two fire alarm boxes and one 6-inch gong, the total cost of system being then \$1111.76, of which amount \$800, was raised by a fair held for that purpose by the fire department, \$150. was donated by A. J. Nichols, agent of the Newmarket Manufacturing Co., and the balance, \$161.76, was paid by the town. In 1899 the system was extended to Hallsville, 2 miles of wire was used and fire alarm box 49 was located near the pumping station, \$150 having been voted by the town for

that purpose, so that at present the system consists of one 2000 lb. bell, mounted on steel tower; 2 18 inch fire alarm gongs; 1 6-inch gong; 12 fire alarm boxes, and a little over seven miles of wire. The cost figures as follows :

Which is the best value and the best fire alarm system that any town ever got for the money. The system is in first-class condition and enjoys the distinction of in nearly five years of service never having failed to work when needed for a fire alarm, which is something that cannot be said of any other electric fire alarm system in this section. The Newmarket fire alarm system could not be duplicated to-day for \$2000.

SUMMARY OF THE COST OF FIRE DEPARTMENT EQUIPMENT.

The first of the present fire department equipment was purchased in December, 1894. It consists of 2 hose carts: 2000 feet of hose; 6 play pipes; 4 shut-off nozzles; 2 hydrant gates; 24 spanners; 6 hydrant wrenches, and the total cost was \$1325.00. The Gleason & Bailey steel hook and ladder truck was purchased in 1896, and cost with equipment, except 45 foot extension ladder, \$528.00. The extension ladder cost \$130.60. In 1897 3 Siamese connections cost \$43.50, and hose pung cost \$75.00. In 1899 hose wagon 3 was purchased and for purchase price and fitting

up cost \$100, and 200 feet of hose cost \$100, making the total cost of fire department outfit \$2302.10, which is less than one half of what a single first-class steam fire engine and equipment would have cost. Add to \$2302.10, the total cost of fire alarm system, which is \$751.76, and you have \$3053.86, the sum total which the town has invested in apparatus to provide means for the extinguishment of fire.

IN GENERAL.

The past year has been the lightest year, so far as fire duty is concerned, which the department has had since its reorganization in 1895, but since 1895 there have been 79 fires and alarms in this town, which resulted in a fire loss of \$14,044.32. Amount of insurance paid on loss \$11,325.32. The amount of property saved by the department is difficult to estimate, but it amounted to a great many thousands of dollars.

Having served nearly eight years on the Board of Fire Engineers, I am not a candidate for re-election. Since 1894, the Boards of Selectmen, under the chairmanship of John H. Griffin, Alanson C. Haines and Samuel H. Greene, have all worked harmoniously together with the Board of Engineers, the officers and members of fire companies, to make the Newmarket fire department what it is to-day, second to that of no fire department of any town in this state. If it shall be considered that I have performed my share of the work and done my duty with the others I shall be content.

FIRE LOSSES AND INSURANCE.

Total number of fire alarms, 8; number of false alarms, 1; number of still alarms, 2. The total amount of fire loss was \$989.10. Amount of insurance paid on loss of property damaged or destroyed, \$989.10.

FIRE RECORD.

JULY 22, 1901. Box 21 was pulled for blaze in rear of J. Filion's grocery store, which started in bales of husks, which were removed and the fire put out. The building was scorched and damaged. Insurance paid on same, \$38.00; insurance paid on stock, \$114.40.

AUGUST 7. Box 12 was pulled for a blaze in tenement of Mrs. Brainard, situated on Main street and occupied by a Canadian family above and Chinese laundry below. The rooms were full of smoke, but little fire could be found. It was found that the wall was smoking around the funnel, which was choked with soot and ashes. No damage to building or contents.

OCTOBER 23. Box 12 was pulled for a fire at residence of Joseph Watson, near Smart's bridge. No hydrant being within 2000 feet, men and truck were sent, and a hard fight was made with buckets of water, but the house could not be saved. By constant work the out-buildings were saved. Insurance paid on building, \$705; Insurance paid on contents, \$131.70.

NOVEMBER 25. Box 21 was pulled for small fire in grocery store of N. Brisson. While passing the store, Lieut. Albert Smith saw a flash of light and rushed into the store to find an oil stove had exploded, which he promptly pulled out doors, avoiding, perhaps, a serious fire. No damage done to anything but oil stove.

DECEMBER 2. Box 7 was pulled for a brush fire in the lot owned by Mrs. Emma A. Young, near Shackford's cross-

ing. The department responded promptly and hose was laid to protect the house near by. The fire was soon put out with no damage.

DECEMBER 29. Still alarm at 9.30 P. M. Fire was found in chimney of post office building and rooms were filled with smoke. The chemical was used and fire put out without a general alarm and with little or no damage.

JANUARY 9, 1902. False alarm. The fire alarm struck 4 blows, giving what the firemen took for one round on box 21. The alarm struck one blow of second round and quit. The department responded promptly but found on arrival that the box had not been opened. The sounding of the alarm may have been the result of the storm acting on the wires.

JANUARY 23. Still alarm at 10.30 P. M. A fire was discovered by Mr. George F. Rice in building under office of electric light company. When found a bed mattress was on fire under which was found a lot of charred paper. The mattress was placed against the wall, which was also on fire. Mr. Rice, with the help of others, promptly put out the fire. The fire is believed to be incendiary, and the fortunate discovery no doubt averted what would have been a more serious fire than Newmarket has seen for many years.

DIRECTIONS FOR RINGING IN AN ALARM.

When a fire breaks out the person discovering it should immediately run to the box *nearest the fire*, break the glass in the front of the small key box which is on the side of the fire alarm box, take out the key, which is attached to a chain, unlock the fire alarm box, open the door and pull down the hook *as far as it will go*, then let go the hook. Stand by box to direct the firemen. Don't pull in an alarm for a fire seen at a distance or out of reach of the hydrant system, but notify some member of the department, who will give the proper alarm.

FIRE DEPARTMENT SIGNALS.

Second alarm, 8 blows, for reserve apparatus and call firemen.

2 blows after fire alarm indicates fire all out.

2-2-2. Out of town fire; companies assemble at stations and await orders.

3-3. Hose 3 call. For chimney fires, etc.

3-3-3. Engineers' call; companies report, with apparatus, in front of town hall and await orders.

4-4-4. Call to Newmarket Manufacturing Co.'s hose company for assistance.

U. S. Observatory standard time, by Western Union Telegraph, one blow at 12.30 P. M., daily.

Hook and Ladder Co. and Hose 3 will answer all box calls.

Hose 1 will answer boxes 12, 21, 32, 34, 45 and 49, with apparatus.

Hose 2 will answer boxes 5, 7, 21, 63, 65 and 82, with apparatus.
